

• Activity sheets and pens, or craft materials to make something – lots to keep children happy!


Finally, you won't be piled high with books the moment you walk in — leaving your hands free to actually drink your tea or coffee!

MILBORNE ST. ANDREW CHURCH NOTES

THE Benefice Fete held in the grounds of Athelhampton House on August Bank Holiday Monday was a splendid occasion. After a very grey morning the clouds parted, the sun shone warmly and plenty of people came during the three-hour event. There was a very happy atmosphere and approximately £2,700 was raised. Many thanks to all those from Milborne who helped either by manning the stalls and the gate or by providing goods for sale.

Branching out in the churchyard

Visitors to St. Andrew's churchyard may have noticed that some work has been done regarding certain trees. We received permission from NDDC (because the church is in a conservation area) to remove three large branches that were hanging over graves. One laurel in front of the church has been cut down. It had splayed out very badly and had become unsightly; it will shoot again from the base. We are very grateful to Maurice Fox for dealing with both these jobs.

There will not be a 9.30am service at St. Andrew's on Sunday,

11th October, but, instead, a special Benefice Celebration Service will be held at 6.00pm. This is to celebrate the fact that Sarah Godfrey has completed her seven years of training and is no longer to be called an assistant curate but will have been licensed the previous day in Salisbury Cathedral as Associate Priest.

Yes! Christmas is a-comin'!

St. Andrew's Christmas Market will be held a week earlier than usual this year, on Saturday, 21st November. We will be most grateful for any offers of help on the day or providing items that can be sold. Contacts are Pat Tribe (Tel: 837684) or Linda Wright. Full details about the arrangements will be published in next month's *Reporter*.

We have agreed to hold our second Christmas Tree Festival this year. The theme will be "Christmas Around the World". Eva will be contacting the various organisations in the village that so enthusiastically joined in our 2006 festival. Look out for further details in the *Reporter*.

Improvements to St. Andrew's

There will soon be changes being made inside the church, albeit of a temporary nature. We hope to make the church more "user friendly" and, for this reason, have applied for, and been granted, an Archdeacon's Licence to remove one long pew at the front and one at the back of the church, together with the short pews along the north side. Removing the long pews will make much more of the church accessible for wheelchair users. Taking out the short pews will allow far more flexible use of that area. The licence gives us permission to do this on a temporary basis only and is on condition that the pews are stored somewhere dry and secure. This is being arranged. The licence allows the pews to be out until next September but we can apply for this to be extended if necessary. It will be interesting to see how many different ways we find of using

We hold a coffee morning in church every first Thursday in the month, the next meeting being on 1st October at 11.00am. This is an ideal opportunity to visit St. Andrew's and have a chat with some friendly people over a cuppa and home-made cake. For instance, you might like to come along and discuss our ideas for improvements to the church. The coffee morning in followed at midday by Communion in the Lady Chapel. Everyone is welcome.

Land Registry . . . and church security

The Government requires all properties to be recorded at the Land Registry by 2012. We have sent the necessary forms to the Diocese and the Diocese Solicitor will be acting on our behalf, as this will save us a considerable amount of money. The Parochial Church Council has agreed terms of finance for this.

You may have seen in the newspapers how many churches throughout Dorset have been broken into. It has been mainly money that has been taken. We do not leave money in St. Andrew's and, as we would still like to keep the church open during the day, may we ask everyone to be watchful whenever they are in the area. Thank

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Have you met . . . Maurice Fox

Maurice is a familiar face in Milborne St. Andrew, although he is a very private person, we are very pleased that he has agreed to tell us a little about himself. As he says:

I was born in Halstock, the other side of Evershot (in West Dorset) a long time ago!

My father worked in the agricultural industry, so we tended to be

where the work was. Schooling was at Maiden Newton, and then to Dorchester (the Modern School, now Thomas Hardye School), and finally to Beaminster School. I walked to school, five miles, and wouldn't see a soul on the entire journey. When the family were at Maiden Newton, the whole class would go to Charminster to haul wheat at harvest time, also, when I went to school in Dorchester, we would go to Woodsford to pick the potatoes. Only after all this was done, would we all go back to school again. Mind you, I wasn't always on a farm, when I left school, just 14 years old, I joined Francis Buglers in Beaminster as an apprentice mechanical engineer.



Moving to the village

We moved to the village in 1951 with my father to work at Gould's Farm. There used to be one of the largest dairy herds locally at the farm, a 100 cow dairy, with a high yield, and it all used to go up to the milk factory. I once took three heifers to the market in Dorchester (Thomas Ensor had a cattle market where Charles Street car park is), and sold them for £1,000 each, this was in the 1960's – an amazing amount! Then the farm was asked to pay £100 per cow to use the sewer, rather than pay such a relatively large amount, they opted to sell them all, I remember that the auction was carried out in the bigger barn, all the cows went, and the following day someone from the Rural District council came and concreted in the sewage pipe. From that time we only had steers.

We used to take down some of the herd to Exeter show, and sleep overnight between the cows (yes, on the straw, it was nice and warm), one night, after some "celebrations", someone shouted "Look out, the bull's out!" Everyone woke up remarkably quickly, and moved just as quickly, just in case, which was not a good move after the night before.

My family

My wife, Sybil, was born in the village and went to the local school, also

we married in the local church, and celebrated 56 years of married life this year. We've got 2 children, 3 grandchildren, and 1 great-grandchild, Connor, who was in last month's magazine.

Living in Milborne St. Andrew We like to live here because it is central to many places, like Dorchester, Blandford, and the coast.

> We are fortunate to have a village shop, a Post Office, the school and now the pub. Did you know there used be a bakery at the back of the shop, delivering all around the local villages, Charlie Morby and Frank Cooper used to work there. There is a downside to living in Milborne though, young people who were born in the village have to move out because they can't afford to buy, or rent here. And I do think that some of the planning issues seem to be influenced by people with holiday homes.

> I like to think I've done my share for the village, in my time here, I have served on the Parish Council, been a school governor, served on the Parochial Church Council, and the Village Hall Committee, where I got

roped into being chairman! I've also been Church Warden and sacristan at Winterborne Whitechurch. Years ago I played football for Winterborne Whitechurch; we went up two divisions in about five years! I used to go to work on Saturday morning until 12noon, and then go off to play football, travelling all over the place, from Bournemouth to Bridport and Portland, then come back home, usually by bus, and go back to work until 8.00pm (the cows needed milking).

My fantasy dinner date? I would have to say David Attenborough, I love his programmes, if he's on the TV, I have to watch him.

As for my hobbies and interests, well, both Sybil and I enjoy travelling; we've been to most of France, Belgium, Holland, Switzerland and, our favourite, Bavaria. Towns and villages in that part of Europe seem to be all so well kept, and spotless, people have pride in their surroundings and they have a more relaxed view of life.

Heather and Sue would like to say an especially big thank you to Maurice, we had a very pleasurable afternoon, with tasty fruit cake and tea, talking about old Milborne. We could have written a whole magazine on all the things that Maurice remembered!

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
In your Garden

Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of Designer Gardens Lighting in the garden

AUTUMN is approaching fast and the nights are drawing in. You have worked so hard in the garden over the summer and there are still some interesting features that you could enjoy - if only it wasn't so dark and it seems a shame not to be able to see the garden. You will be able to see through those dark windows that act like a mirror in the evenings and prolong your enjoyment of your garden by using well positioned lighting. You can create drama and atmosphere where you want and a balanced view of the garden that is easy on the eye. Now, that doesn't mean 500W halogen spots that turn night into day and blind everyone in sight in the process, but a more subtle kind of lighting. When using garden lighting it is important to avoid glare which would instantly ruin an otherwise well lit garden. You don't want to have to squint through the glare of a badly positioned light to the focal point, or upset the neighbours.

Conservatories particularly can become a 'black mirror' at night and overhead lights are reflected brilliantly in every pane of glass. It is much better to use discreet downlighters, or dimmer switches so that the garden lighting becomes more visible and the windows transparent.

A well designed garden lighting plan isn't just about selecting light fittings, it is important to decide what features need to be lit. For example steps will be lit in a different way from a specimen tree, or a seating area. Make sure that lights are carefully directed only at the objects you want to light and not for example at the compost heap or the children's swing or any other area that will spoil the ornamental view. Consider too, where you will be viewing the garden – the kitchen window, the sitting room, the conservatory or from an upstairs room.





There are so many lights to choose from - uplighters, downlighters, spotlights, floodlights, lighting for safety and so on. Make a list of the essential features that need to be lit – steps or a path to the front door; access to the log store; access pathways to sheds or outbuilding, and then consider the more ornamental lighting. Coloured lighting can create extra interest and you can get spot lights that actually change colour gradually - for a bit of fun.

You can start small and gradually increase the areas you light up. This is especially important in a new garden where you are waiting for the plants to cover the walls and fences - otherwise you will only see a well-lit fence! You may want to start by illuminating focal points and particular structures while you are waiting for the planting to mature. When you do feel that you want to add more lights, don't illuminate every shrub and tree – remember the old adage "Less is more". Water whether moving or still, is the one feature in the garden that really benefits from lighting. It also plays an important role by illuminating the water's edge. An advantage of lighting from beneath will show you where the firm ground ends.

In winter there is no need to light up the herbaceous borders which will have died down, but grasses and dead stems can be left in the borders and these will complement the evergreen planting and the bare branches of deciduous trees. By clever use of lighting you can lead the eye through the garden to your desired focal point. It would be great if you could liaise with your neighbours to highlight features that would benefit both of you.

Decide where you want the lights to be and the type of lighting you want, and then employ a qualified electrician to install the system for you.




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News from Milborne St. Andrew WI September 2009



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
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The Royal Oak reopens

THE Royal Oak was packed to the rafters on opening night. A buffet was laid on in the refurbished skittle alley and the fine evening provided a perfect opportunity for drinkers to relax in the newly-landscaped garden and children to play on the new equipment.

New landlords Andy and Sarah were thrilled with the response, estimating that there were upwards of 200 people over the Friday evening. 
There were some lovely painting and drawings displayed by all members which include total beginners to more experienced artists and viewers made some very positive comments.

Friends of The Practice Transport

For those of you who use Friends of the Practice transport to come to the surgery we have been asked by the drivers to remind you of the following:-

There is a charge of 35p per mile. Please ensure you have this with you and pay the driver at the end of your journey.

To ensure that this service does not become overloaded please only use it if you have no other means of getting to us i.e. a family member or neighbour who is able to bring you. If you have a family member or friend who works during the week but is available at weekends you may like to take advantage of our Saturday morning surgery.

Some drivers have also reported that they are having difficulty in finding some patients houses. If you live in a location that is difficult to find please give directions to the receptionist and ask them to pass it to the driver when booking.

ROPE BARRIER in the Milton Abbas reception area

You may have noticed the appearance of a rope barrier in our reception area and many of you have been puzzled as to its purpose.

This has been placed at the reception desk in response to patients remarks about other patients standing too close when they are at the reception desk, especially if they are trying to discuss a personal matter. It is a temporary measure as we are expecting to redesign the reception area in the near future to improve both confidentiality and access for disabled patients.

Chlamydia Testing Packs

Chlamydia is the most common sexually transmitted infection amongst 15 - 24 year olds, with about 1 in 10 young people infected. Most people will not be aware they are infected until they are trying for a family, by this time it may be too late. However, if detected early, treatment is a simple course of antibiotics. You may notice the appearance bins in the surgery waiting rooms containing Chlamydia screening packs. This the part of Chlamydia screening programme for young people. Anyone up to the age of 25 can get tested and is welcome to take a pack from the bin (blue for boys and pink for girls). Just follow the instructions in the pack and post your sample in the pre-paid envelope which is provided. This service is completely confidential and you can be informed of the result by text message. If your test is positive you will be contacted and offered treatment by the Dorset Chlamydia Screening team.

August and summer weather in our village

TOTAL rainfall in August was 85.2mm which was 129% of average. The highest daily rainfall in August was on 6th when 23.3mm fell with a thunderstorm in the morning. Rain was recorded on 19 days of the month which was higher that average but an improvement on August 2008 when rain was recorded on 23 days.

The total rainfall during the June-August period was 238.2mm making it the fifth wettest summer in 39 years in Milborne. The wettest summer was in 2007 when 300.7mm rain fell. 296.8mm fell in 1997, 278.7mm in 1980 and 259.9mm in 1974.



The Met Office has received many complaints that the 'Barbeque Summer' that was forecast did not materialise but, in fairness to the Met Office, their forecast for the 2009 summer made no mention of a 'Barbeque Summer'. That was the interpretation put on that forecast

by journalists and presenters. For the summer of 2009, The Met Office suggested that rainfall was likely to be below average and that temperatures were likely to be above average and that was largely correct up until the second week of July but then the Jet Stream unexpectedly moved further south bring fronts across the UK and the Met Office revised their forecast for the rest of the summer on


The weather is a law unto itself at our latitude and long range weather forecasts here are unlikely to ever be much more than an **Pluvius** inspired guess.



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It's a dog's life . . .

IT'S a fact that the greyhound, one of our most graceful breeds of pedigree dog, is the second fastest land animal (behind the cheetah, of course). This is probably the reason why greyhound racing is so popular worldwide, since cheetah racing could possibly be quite dangerous.

A less than welcome fact is that 10,000 greyhounds are retired from

racing each year, all requiring a loving home. The ex-racers can be 'retired' as young as a year old if they don't perform on the track or if they've picked up an injury that makes them uneconomical to continue in the sport. The Retired Greyhound Trust (RGT), a charity that was established in 1975, re-homes dogs from the racing world to new owners throughout the UK from its 73 branches. Since forming, the RGT has found new owners for 45,000 dogs - some of these retirees have found their way to homes here in Milborne.

One such owner and advocate of the RGT is Sue Potts. She has two ex-racing greyhounds, Paddy and Betsy, both homed from the Devon branch of the charity. Though Sue had had dogs in the past, she says that she'd always liked and wanted a greyhound. As the time was almost right – as she was about to move to Milborne – she decided to visit the RGT kennels in Devon. There were about twenty greyhounds there, all needing homes and all excitably letting anyone and everyone know it.

All except Paddy, that is. "They say that dogs pick you, and Paddy picked me", Sue says. Unlike all the other dogs, he didn't make a fuss he was completely indifferent. Sue says, "He didn't get out of his bed, didn't get up - just looked over, put his ear up, as if to say to me 'oh, not another one looking around, bet you don't pick me'. That really

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appealed to me". After a walk with him, she realised how easy he was on a lead despite his size and how gentle he was. This sealed it for Sue.

It is a common misconception that greyhounds need an enormous amount of exercise, though the converse is actually true. Two twenty minute walks a day are all the RGT recommend as being necessary as,

> being natural sprinters, the greyhound uses energy in short bursts. But that's not to say that longer walks are out of the question though. So the greyhound is an ideal dog for the working person to keep, not least because they enjoy a great deal of lazing around during the day. As Sue says, "they just sleep, they're real couch potatoes – all they need is a soft bed".

> The greyhound's natural gentleness also makes it an ideal family dog, being generally good with children. The breed is typically intelligent, affectionate and even-tempered and is usually easy to walk, without pulling

on the lead. With coats that are short and smooth, they tend to pick up less mud and dirt than their longer-coated cousins, so they return from muddy walks (which will be with us soon!) relatively clean. And for a thoroughbred, they don't suffer from many ailments, other than the odd joint complaint which may be a consequence from their racing

The Retired Greyhound Trust holds regular fundraising events and has an annual show at Poole Stadium for both ex-racers and all other breeds. Though most of Poole Stadium's ex-racers find their way to RGT's Devon kennel, relations with the stadium are surprisingly good. Other than donations, another way to help out the Trust is to become a foster home. The RGT asks of all its new owners to call on them in the first instance if they experience any problem with their new greyhound. For example, if an owner has a change of circumstance or has to go into hospital, the RGT will look to their foster carers to provide temporary

This was how Sue Potts first met her second greyhound, Betsy. The elderly owner had to go into hospital, so Sue offered Betsy a foster home for the duration. Unfortunately, the elderly lady died whilst in hospital two weeks later. However, for Betsy it was a happier ending as Sue decided that as the fostering period went so well, she opted to keep Betsy permanently. For Sue, greyhounds are unique. She says, "I've had lots of different dogs during my life, but I've never experienced anything like a greyhound . . . they're just beautiful".
