AS the original plans for flower/shrub borders, a seat and a rubbish bin have foundered along with the funding, a compromise is being sought.

Two containers like those at The Royal Oak have been suggested. Andy, the pub landlord, has agreed that he could make them.

The Garden Club are happy to fill them with compost and plants such as heathers and evergreens under planted with bulbs. These can be supplemented with seasonal plants as the year goes on. The Club may have discount vouchers to use at Garden Centres for this. The maintenance would be minimal and the cost met by the Parish Council.

The County Council approve in principal but require a plan and then will attend to the fixing of the planters.

A site for the seat and bin will be found after a walk around the village. Any helpful suggestions will be welcome.

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# Treeguy airlifted to hospital

BRIEFLY, on Wednesday 1st December, our village was on the regional television, and, the following day, the front page of the Echo. You may have heard the helicopters on that day. We were "famous" for all the wrong reasons, a very unusual and horrific accident took place. "Treeguy", Chris Baxter and his workmate Dan, had been working for several days reducing the canopy on an enormous copper beech tree in the old rectory garden in Chapel Street. On that Wednesday they were elevated in the bucket of the cherry picker (mobile lifting platform), when something happened to cause it to topple over, from the height of the canopy of the tree, right down to the driveway at the base of the hill. The fire service, in their report, said that they assisted the ambulance personnel to attend to the casualties, and to ensure they got to hospital as quickly as possible. We believe that both the air ambulance and the police helicopter were used to take them to hospital. Two of the nearby residents were in their gardens at the time, and heard the shout, one alerted the emergency services and, it is understood, went to assist, helping to keep one of the injured still to avoid further injury. The other resident went to make sure the couple who live in the rectory were OK, they were very shaken, and their daughter came in

the afternoon to give support. them understand that Dan is now at home, with his leg pinned, and Chris is still in hospital, where he may be for a few weeks. We've been told that he will mend, but it will take a while.

#### Final Letter . . .

Dear Friends

As I come to the end of my time as Vicar, I am very grateful for my time here.

Over the last five years or so, we have been on a journey together in modernising our approach to presenting the Christian Gospel, while respecting the historic forms of worship which are so special to many of our regular church members.

Across the Benefice, we have developed new ways of worshipping together alongside our more traditional services, including placing Family Services in the less formal surroundings of village halls and schools, and it has been great to see ordinary people in the pews playing a greater part in leading worship.

In a time when statistics show that the Church is perceived to be less and less relevant to everyday life, it has been wonderful to see two of our four churches in the Benefice grow in size, and worship develop in our Middle School to include regular Communion Services with around half of Year 5's each year choosing to be admitted to communion.

And so as I move on from here, I do so with a sense of privilege at being able to serve with you, and journey with you.

But I also think that the Church of England as a whole, has not fared as well in recent years, and I worry that as a church, we are losing touch with more and more people because of our own reluctance to embrace change.

Increasingly we are living in a society that is not rooted in the Church and faith which we profess. And increasingly, people see the Church as out of step with the national cultural values that have been developing in recent years.

Well publicised arguments about women bishops, and homosexuals in the church are making the Church seem increasingly irrelevant in a society which by and large has embraced the concept of equality in a way which the Church has not.

This is not only unfortunate for the church, but it is also contrary to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

- A gospel where the first people entrusted with the news of Jesus' resurrection were women, not men.
- A Gospel which proclaims that in Christ we are all equal, and where "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." Gal 3:28.
- A Gospel which says "God is love, and those who live in love, live in God and God lives in them." (1 John 4:16) yet the Church appears obsessed with denying homosexuals the fulfilment of mutual, self-giving, loving relationships.

In a recent YouGov survey, only 10% of the general population were opposed to women bishops and 27% against gay bishops, which shows just how out of step the church is. Even more disturbingly, among younger people (25-39's) this fell even further to 7% and 16%.

Sadly the picture which the Church is giving to many people, is one where being a Christian means having to be anti-equality and anti-gay. In the words of one teenager in our Benefice recently "Why should I listen to the church, while they are condemning my friends?"

Unless the Church of England faces up to this discontinuity, my fear is that we will be less and less a Church for the nation, and become instead a chaplaincy for an ever dwindling group of people.

In this Benefice, however, I feel that we have made significant progress in addressing these issues over the last few years. When I came here five years ago, there were some sections of the Benefice where the ministry of women priests was not welcome. Yet today, through Sarah Godfrey's faithful and gifted ministry, these misgivings have largely melted away.

I have been grateful to those who have continued to work with me, despite not agreeing with my inclusive approach to sexuality, even when that has been publicised in the national press. I am also grateful to the many members of our congregations who have expressed their support for a more open, inclusive church.

It is my hope and prayer that this Benefice will continue to grow in openness to others and in modernising its ministry to make the Church relevant to our whole society - excluding no-one - and drawing everyone to the joy and peace of Christ's love. - Samery Ho. 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# **Charles Morby** 1918 – 2010



CHARLES was born in Dudley, in the West Midlands, on 25th August, 1918, the fifth child of Charles and Ruth Morby.

Charlie, as he was affectionately known to all, was stationed at Bovington Camp in the early days of the Second World War. After meeting Cissie, he and his pal, who happened to be courting Cissie's sister at the time, would cycle from Bovington to Milborne, often in the dark, to meet the

girls. Occasionally they would stop on the way to shoot roosting pheasants by moonlight, thus providing a tasty supper for the family. This was often followed by a jug or two of ale and a sing-song from 'Nigger' Brown around the fireside of 'The Royal Oak', with landlord Pop Higgins and his wife.

During these wartime liaisons, love blossomed for Charlie and Cis and they were married in St. Andrew's Church on 24th April, 1943.

When they were newly married, they planned to live in the Midlands and in fact their furniture and other effects were actually en route to the Midlands, when Charlie received an offer of employment with Grays Stores in the Village, which he accepted, so a "u" turn was made and they relocated to Milborne.

Their marriage was blessed with five children, the eldest, Ruth, tragically dying in childhood from Polio, aged six years, Rita, the second born, sadly passed away some eleven years ago, leaving her son Mark, now married to Karen. They have a family of four children, Jessica, Sapphire, Charlie and Savannah.

Son Roy was next into the Morby family and he has two daughters, Lisa and Hayley. Christine, the third girl is married to Phil and they have a daughter Kerry and a son, Steven. Last, but definitely not least, their fourth daughter Barbara arrived and the family was complete.

Charlie was never unemployed. He was a hard worker all his life, honest and conscientious, having had a variety of jobs over the years, Charlie was a delivery driver of coal and later bread and cakes, employed by Grays Stores, covering all the surrounding villages, where he became a well-known figure. He also worked as a storeman for some years at Blakell Engineering, who were based at the old 'Butlers' garage site at The Causeway, before becoming a paint sprayer in Blandford for John Ballard, finally retiring at the age of seventy-two.

He was involved in many aspects of village life and the community in general, for instance, he was part of the team who painted the inside of the church some years ago. He was caretaker of the Village Hall for over twenty years and he assisted in running the weekly bingo sessions held also in the Village Hall.

Charles was a big man in stature, a proud man, rarely seen without a collar and tie, footwear always gleaming, but also a quiet man, modest and unassuming, respected and well-liked by all who knew him. He was for many years the Standard Bearer for the Royal British Legion, attending Remembrance Day parades regularly, this duty filling him with enormous pride.

Prior to Charlie's death he had been living at home with the help of daughter Barbara and the support of Milton Abbas Surgery which the family were very grateful.

Through his passing, the world has lost a good man in Charles Morby, a devoted Husband, loving Father, Grandad and Great Grandad, truly one of life's gentlemen, who adored his loved ones and in return was adored by them.



#### Dear Editor,

As a dog owning resident of MSA I consider myself privileged to have such wonderful access to country walks and the numerous waste bins provided by the local authority for the disposal of dog faeces are a welcome facility.

It is akin to a dog defecating in its own bed. Given dogs do not tend to do this, it appears that the dogs in MSA have more sense than some of their owners!

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
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# Weather in Milborne St. Andrew November 2010

THE first 22 days of November were quite mild and wet with rain on most days but the last eight days of the month were cold with air frosts each night and a light fall of snow on the 26th. The total rainfall for the month was 124.4mm which was 108% of average. The cold weather of late November continued into December with 6cm of snowfall on the first.

Snowfall in Southern England in November is unusual but has occurred in Milborne in six years out of the last 40. Snowfall in December has occurred in Milborne in 18 years out of the last 40 but the amount of snow was usually quite small and did not cause much disruption. The last time there was significant snow in Milborne in December to cause inconvenience was in 1997 but the worse December snowfall was in 1981 when 8cm fell on the 8th of that month followed by a much heavier fall on the 13th which drifted and blocked most roads in Dorset for a while. There were widespread power failures as the weight of snow brought down power lines and some places were without electricity for five days. Some water pumping stations were affected causing water supply failures. A

temperature of -23°C was recorded in Shropshire at that time. The cold weather of that winter continued into the New Year with further heavy snowfall and drifting on the 8th of January.

According to the Shepherd's Kalendar; "If the sun shines clear and bright on Christmas day, it promises a peaceful year, free from clamours and strife, and foretells much plenty to ensue."

A clear and bright Christmas day would be very welcome this year. Pluvius





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# All change in the Parish Council meeting

PERSONAL opinion – the new Parish Clerk is a breath of fresh air. Why? Firstly the Agenda was clear and short. Secondly, the order had been changed, everyone had a copy of what was going to happen, we could remark on it or anything else before the meeting even started, and at the end of the meeting comment on its contents. The meeting "proper" was focussed on decision making this month, trying to clear old problems away.

The first open session (before the meeting started) brought up old winter problems

#### The doggy poo bags are appearing again

Maybe something to do with dark morning walks, and the resulting anonymity? The advice was that if we see people leaving bags, you ask them to take the bags with them. The lack of gritting on some roads during the recent freezing weather was commented on, we heard that the policy now is for A roads and some B roads to be gritted, but no minor roads.

Robin asked if weed killer and ready-mix could be budgeted for, in readiness for a repair to the Wetherby Castle obelisk. The rules mean that a proper schedule of work would have to be submitted, usually by a commercial company, which would cost rather more that the PC can afford. The suggestion was made by a member of the public that a village team could offer an equally detailed specification of work; the Parish Council agreed that this would be acceptable. We do not know at present what monies remain in the fund, as all the previous paperwork is somewhere in six cardboard boxes in the new Parish Clerk's hall, at present, she cannot find it, or who the signatories were. Maybe someone in the village knows?

#### The meeting proper . . . we need a "vice chairman"

And, as no one would volunteer, Paul Morgan agreed, was nominated and seconded! He was not convincing in his joy at this new position! But thanks Paul – someone had to do it!

#### The word "Budget" can strike fear in most people's hearts

But it had to be done. We all had a copy of the proposed budget, very clear, the only big loser was the grant fund, however, there was a substantial amount left in the fund last year. But the main point was that our Parish Council managed a 0% increase in the precept!

#### A decision has been set in stone!

Which is what the seat, planters, and bin will be, when in place on Milton Road Corner. The containers will hopefully be made in the village, by Andrew Fox of The Royal Oak. The Gardening Club will fill the planters with suitable compost/soil, and the suggestion is to have heathers and evergreens underplanted with spring bulbs. Councillor Allen was keen on exploring other situations for the seat, however, to change a previously agreed plan would have taken several extra meetings, the decision was made to continue with the original plan and complete the task. In the open session at the end of the meeting, there were no objections to this.

#### We could do with some grit bins!

Think that was what we said at the beginning of the year. Another situation not resolved. The problem being that Paul (Cllr Morgan) is working from scratch again, finding the bins, and checking that they are acceptable. He has arranged with Mike Woodford of DCC to walk the village to check the agreed sites are accessible for the teams to fill with grit. The positions were decided at the October meeting, following suggestions from the public. If we can get hold of a white dumpy sack of grit, a 4th position, probably in the central village, will be decided.

In the earlier open session, Hilary Cox's Christmas letter was summarised by Della Jones, in which she says that villages are going to have to be resilient for themselves, this was linked to grit bins, with the example that it will be up to villages to make sure that they are kept filled. The letter also talked about the offer earlier in the year about white dumpy bags of grit, at this point it was obvious that none of the parish council members were aware of this letter. Indeed, the *Reporter* has been present at all but one meeting in the last two years, and cannot remember this letter being reported. We are going to try and obtain one or more of these elusive white

dumpy bags. It was still open time so Phillip asked if we would be able to take a wheelbarrow to wherever this bag was put, and take grit to a place of need. Yes we can – but for use on residential paths etc, not on private land. Also it should be organised by a residents led team to meet with various regulations. Yes – don't ask, I also found it really confusing!

#### Allotments - another step closer

Cllr John Harris has had seven enquiries of interest. The next step, he says, is to get an expert from the Soil Association to make sure the plot is suitable. Luckily the plot was not part of the original infill project, and has only been grazed previously. John has expressed a wish, or thought, that one allotment should be kept for children.

#### No more Minor Highway Maintenance


The Parish Council has been notified that there will no longer be any Minor Highway Maintenance, which includes weed killing on edges of roads and pavement. It is of concern that this may also include the present grass cutting of corners of roads, and the central green of Bladen View. Maybe this is going to be the role of the "big society" recently talked of.

#### **Meeting Day Change**

The calendar of the following year's meetings has been put together. With only a few exceptions, meetings have been moved to the third Wednesday in the month, to avoid clashing with other Parish Council meetings, meaning that our village representatives on NDDC and DCC do not have to split themselves in two to attend both meetings. The next meeting is slightly earlier on the 12th January 2011, 7.30pm in the Village Main Hall.





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
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# A breath of fresh air A 2½ mile walk to start the New Year

The Square to Warren Hill and back

LEAVE The Square and walk down the Causeway as far as Brookside Cottage. Turn right here crossing the river and proceed to Chapel Street. Turn left into Chapel Street and walk to the end of the road, then continue ahead through the gate into Manor Farm. Follow the track passing through the old gate pillars. You will see Manor Farm House on your left. Just after passing some trees on the right, bear slightly to the right and head for a stile.

There is a second stile to cross after about 250 metres. You will now see Milborne Brook on your left. Follow the river to the next stile which is alongside a magnificent row of Beech Trees. Cross this stile and you will notice that the river bears off to the left.

Once over the stile take your bearings. There is a bridleway here which goes off to the left and right, but you need to take the footpath straight ahead. It is a well worn track heading south. The path climbs slightly uphill and after about 250 metres look out for a gateway on your right.

As you walk up this path you will get a good view of Wetherby Castle, a small Iron Age Hill Fort. Also on your left you will notice the undulations on the field alongside the track. This is the site of the Medieval Village, Milborne Michaelston.

When you get to the gateway on your right, turn

off here and follow the track up to an area of woodland. The path follows the northern edge of the woodland to the end of the wood. This area is called Warren Hill.

As soon as Christmas is over we girls are coming off the diet and looking forward to some tasty leftovers from the Old Moaner's vegetarian Christmas lunch.

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
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# In your Garden

# Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of Designer Gardens **Jobs in the Winter Garden**

I HOPE, like me, that you managed to protect your tender plants and wrap up your pots before the snow and freezing weather hit us. January and February are often the worst months of the year (in gardening terms) - wet, cold, windy and this year freezing cold and snow to boot!

All your bulbs should now be in, but if, like me, you didn't manage to plant them all before the ground froze over, do it as soon as you can. They may not flower as well, but it's better than leaving the bulbs to rot in the shed and they probably won't be any good at all next year.

If the weather conditions are suitable i.e. the ground is not frozen or waterlogged, this is a good time of the year to plant bare root roses, trees and hedging whips. They will get their roots into ground and as soon as the temperature increases they will start to grow – giving you a head start in the spring. Bare root plants are also a lot less expensive than their container grown counterparts.

The evergreens in your garden will be providing the colour now, as will berries of holly and cotoneaster. Have a look at your garden and make a note of the areas that look a bit grim and that could do with a bit of winter structure and a bit of colour. Colour and interest can be created with grasses and seedheads left on over winter. They also look good covered in frost. For additional colour Nandina domestica commonly known as Heavenly Bamboo gives you fantastic red leaves and bright red berries which can be brought into the house to give a festive feel to your flower arrangements.

Balance rounded evergreen shapes such as Choisya ternata with spiky architectural shapes such as phormiums or Chaemerops humilis (Chusan Palm), or plants with extra large leaves such as Fatsia japonica. Fatsia might look tender, but in fact it will stand a good hard frost and

perk up again as soon as the weather warms up. These plants have their own 'architecture' - spectacular shapes that bring a distinctive year round presence to a garden.

Some plants can be clipped and shaped - the small leafed Ilex

crenata is often used, and of course we all know box (Buxus sempervirens) and yew (Taxus baccata). Remember though that the beautifully tight shape of these plants is usually defined by their age and specimen plants can be expensive to buy for this reason. You don't have to go to the extremes of Levens Hall in Cumbria, but you can use smaller topiary shapes to mark the end of a border, or to provide repetition throughout your border.



I've probably mentioned it before, but there is no beating the bleached white stems of Betula utilis jacquemontii. Underplanted with feathery grasses that catch the light, low growing black grass Ophiopogon planiscapus 'Nigrescens' and white hellebores – lovely.

To end on a sad note this month – I read that one of our most remarkable trees fell victim to vandals in early December. Someone took an axe to the oldest of the Holy Thorns near Glastonbury in Somerset. The old and gnarled hawthorn tree is, according to legend, decended from one planted by Joseph of Arimathea. And – it's not the first time it has happened - Cromwell's soldiers hacked down Holy Thorns in the 17th Century to discourage pilgrims visiting the trees. I suppose they did have a reason! Joseph of Arimathea was, according to the Gospels, the man who donated his own prepared tomb for the burial of Jesus after Jesus' Crucifixion.

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
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
