

## The **Freedom** Bell

DID you hear the Freedom Bell being rung at Milborne First School on Thursday 17th February, at the end of half-term? As reported in last month's edition, this was a break with the tradition of ringing the bell at the end of a term, due to the early closure of the school at the snowy end of last year.


David Payne and Elizabeth Irvine have recently been digging into the history of the Freedom Bell and have unearthed an illuminating booklet, entitled Bell Dedication Ceremony in 1983. Les Oliver of Wetherby Close produced this at the time of the ceremony at the old school site in Chapel Street. It details the programme of the day, which included a service of dedication and unveiling of a commemorative plaque by Rear Admiral J M Webster.

The bell was donated by the Royal Navy and it originated from the Royal Maritime Auxilliary Service vessel Freshburn, which had recently

been taken out of service. The year before saw the Falklands War, and the Freedom Bell was dedicated to those that lost their lives in that conflict. The plaque read "Unveiled by Rear Admiral J M Webster on July 12th 1983 during the Bell Dedication Ceremony in Honour of Those who died liberating The Falkland Islands".

The 'new bell', although itself 40 years old at the time, was a replacement for a bell that is thought to have been rung at the Chapel Street school since it opened in 1859. That bell, which hung over the school entrance, was apparently requisitioned to aid the war effort during the First World War. The bell housing stood empty until the old metal frame was re-discovered by painters decorating the school in 1982. It was decided that a new bell should be sought, and an application was made to the Royal Navy to see if they could help, Around this time, HMS Sheffield was struck by an exocet missile, resulting in the loss of twenty lives. Sadly, one of these was a crew member who lived at Winterborne Whitechurch, so the dedication of the bell to the lives lost during the Falklands conflict was fitting. The service, conducted by the Rev. Nigel Johnson, included these words from Psalms 107:

"That they go down to the sea in ships and occupy their business in great waters, these men see the works of the Lord and his wonders of the deep".



The Bell Dedication Ceremony booklet also details the history and technical data of the RMAS Freshburn, on which the new bell was originally hung. She was built in 1943 and spent nearly all of her working life around the naval base at Devonport, supplying the Royal Navy fleet with drinking water and demineralised water for the ships' boilers. Freshburn was moved to Chatham in the 1970's when the new 'Waterclass' vessels were launched. A survey showed that there were cracks in the boiler, so she spent the rest of her days as a storage vessel until being sold to a Dutch company in 1982 for the scrap value of £6,125.

Following the Service of Dedication and unveiling of the plaque, the programme according to the booklet included a display by the school children. The Dorset Evening Echo covered the event and told of the 'nautical entertainment' that the children provided,

including sea shanties and the display of a model they had made of the Freshburn.

When the school moved to its new site in Hopsfield in 2001, the Freedom Bell moved there too, with all its history and tradition.

### THE BENEFICE OF PUDDLETOWN, TOLPUDDLE AND MILBORNE WITH DEWLISH PART OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN THE DIOCESE OF SALISBURY

Soon, the season of Lent will be upon us and I will need to turn my mind towards burning some of last year's Palm crosses in order to make some ash in readiness for the Ash Wednesday service. This year I have made a note to myself not to do it in my kitchen. The smell of burning lingered for weeks!

From the earliest days of Christianity, Easter was seen as so holy that people thought that they should spend some time preparing for it. The forty days of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and is a season of reflection, a time for personal stocktaking and a turning back to God.

Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence. From the middle ages it became the custom to begin Lent by being marked in ash on one's forehead with the sign of the cross. The use of ashes, made by burning palm crosses from the previous Palm Sunday, is very symbolic. The minister or priest marks each worshipper on the forehead, and says,

> "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ"

At some churches the worshippers leave with the mark still on their forehead so that they carry the sign of the cross out into the world. At other churches the service ends with the ashes being washed off as a sign that the participants have been cleansed ready to make a new start with God.

The marking of their forehead with a cross made of ashes reminds each churchgoer that:

- Death comes to everyone
- They should be sad for their sins
- They must change themselves for the better
- God made the first human being by breathing life into dust, and without God, human beings are nothing more than dust and ashes

The ash is sometimes mixed with anointing oil, which makes sure that the ashes make a good mark. The use of anointing oil also reminds the churchgoer of God's blessings and of the anointing that took place at their baptism.

This year the benefice Ash Wednesday service will be held in Puddletown Church on 9th March at 7.30pm. It will be a quiet service with space for meditation and there will be opportunity to be marked with ash if you wish.

If you see smoke coming from my garage in the week before, you will now know what I'm doing!

#### Preparing for Easter during Lent

Since early days Christians have used the time of Lent to prepare for Easter. By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness that Jesus gives us. Throughout Lent we grow in faith and devotion to Him by prayer and reading and meditating on God's holy word.

There are many opportunities across the benefice throughout Lent to do this. We begin Lent with the Ash Wednesday service on 9th March at 7.30pm in Puddletown church.

In Milborne there will be a service of compline at 6.00pm every Wednesday. In Dewlish, evensong will be said at 6.00pm every Friday.

This year there will also be a Lent Study Group held on Thursdays in Puddletown. We have asked the Rev Canon Steve Pittis who was the Canon Missioner at Winchester Cathedral to come and lead the course. Everyone is welcome. The Lent study group will begin on the 31st March and be fortnightly. We shall be thinking about the Holy Spirit. Look out for more details.

Also, don't forget there will be Lent lunches across the benefice, raising money for different causes. Sarah Godfrey




made spring which were very tasty.

THE NHS is constantly reviewing its services to ensure they meet the needs of local people and represent value for money. One such review carried out by Dorset Community Health Services (NHS Dorset's provider arm) has resulted in a

pilot of revised opening times for local MIUs (Minor Injury Units).

The pilot is being run between 1st February and 1st August 2011.

During this time, opening hours of MIUs will be as follows:

There will also be the opportunity to offer feedback via feedback cards – which will be available at the MIUs – or online via the NHS Dorset website.





## The latest on the recent burglaries

THE Police came to the Parish Council Meeting this month. Sgt Matt Chutter and PCSO Luke Goddard told us that there have been no arrests connected to the crimes committed at the end of last year and the beginning of this. The incidence of crime in the village has soared by 9.1%, mainly due to these burglaries. In Sgt Chutter's opinion, it may have been outside professional individuals or groups that committed these burglaries, and not locally sourced. With regard to the distraction burglary that occurred a couple of weeks ago, he urged that, if someone knocks on the door saying they are from one of the utilities, or that you do not know them, ask for proof of identity, if in doubt, don't let them in. However, the incidence of anti-social behaviour has dropped by 25% - a brilliant statistic. Mind you, the really cold weather may have played a part.

### There and Then

Keep an eye out for each other, especially elderly or vulnerable residents. If you see something suspicious, unusual or unexpected in the village, the police would like to know "there and then". As they said, don't leave it to the following day, it is much more difficult to follow up if you wait.

#### Homewatch

This is a system where you can ask to be contacted, either by a local co-ordinator, or by our local police, when there are things of note (like local crimes) to be warned of. This can be by phone, text or email. A phone call to Blandford Police Station will probably give you more details.

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## Game, Set and Match

AT last with a break in the weather, the MUGA contractors were able to complete the tarmacing of the surface and apply some temporary tennis court markings. They will be back in April to apply the finishing green colour coat to the surface and apply the sport line markings for tennis, basketball and five-a-side soccer. The cost of this element being £1,870 + the dreaded VAT.

Hurrah, the tennis posts and nets have also arrived (£300 smackers this time) these are very professional and even have a marking stick to ensure that the centre height is right  $\dots$  if anyone wants a game then ask a trustee for the kit.

With all schemes there had to be a compromise, we have a court built by a professional company who are a member of the Sports and Play Contractors Association rather than a play equipment company. As a result we have a far larger multi-use area than most and dare I say, possibly the biggest in the County. The actual macadam is of the semi-dense, pervious variety to allow for the widest possible range of games to be played on the surface and for the area to drain into the soakaways around the perimeter.

#### What part of NO don't you understand?

Unfortunately it cannot take the beating that skateboarding would inflict so it has been necessary to make our 1st NO statement of NO Skateboarding. This was followed in quick succession by the 2nd one, this time stating NO Dogs, following reports that people are exercising their dogs on the grass, sometimes at night in the hope that no one will spot them. Fat chance of that, as the CCTV cameras have night vision and one has been redirected towards the MUGA and the grassed area.

We have already made some tentative enquiries about a skateboard facility but that would be in the region of £20,000.00 and a feasibility study would be required if things were to be taken any further  $\dots$  we await the call for action from the youngsters.

Luckily the last Moviola was a huge success and the next two are an absolute coup, *Made in Dagenham* showing on 2nd March, followed by *The King's Speech* on 6th April.

The hugely popular Village Quiz is still on for the 9th April and the AGM of the Village Hall is tentatively planned for the 13th April. This is an open meeting and all the community are invited to attend.

After the school holidays the school and the Hall will be joining forces and participating in the 'Dorset Trees' initiative. This will involve the planting of some 20 odd native trees on the top level of the field by the children under the stewardship of Mary-Anne Featherstone. A water trough 'planter' curtsey of John Martin, will soon be making an arrival and will be planted out, hopefully adding to the 'rustic' and floral appearance of the front of the building.

#### Village Surveys do make a difference!

Most of the negative issues identified on the previous community based surveys have now been addressed in a systematic and positive 'can-do' way. They, along with a host of other Village Hall documents, can be viewed on the village website. It is now time to sit down, look to the future and set down some key issues and activity plans that need to form the agenda for the next phase of the regeneration of the Hall, Whatever, we shall be guided by our mission statement which is actually based on the Trust Deeds of the Charity, namely:

*To promote* the intellectual, social and physical welfare of the inhabitants of Milborne St. Andrew irrespective of their race, creed, colour or physical ability.

*To provide* a range of facilities that will improve the conditions of life within the community including use for meetings, lectures and classes, and for other forms of recreation and leisure time occupation. Or to put it another way or two:

- 1. Serving the needs of the community.
- 2. Making a difference.

We hope that we do that and will continue to do so!

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# Parish Council Meeting 16th February 2011

This had an enormously long agenda. Thankfully many of the items were reports from on-going items.

James suffers from this rare condition that affects only about 400 families in the UK. He has one of about 170 variations of the family of diseases called the Ectodermal Dysplasia's. The variation he has is X-linked Hypohydrotic

Ectodermal Dysplasia. In general, all the different variations have common elements: It affects his ability to regulate his body temperature - he cannot sweat, so is at risk of overheating if it's too hot; and he gets very cold when it's cold, and takes longer to warm up again. It affects his teeth - James only has two fang-like teeth and has false teeth already. He will get full dentures in time. His skin is affected too - it's very dry, he has thickened skin on the soles of his feet, and eczema is a feature.

He has sparse, very blond and crinkly hair, and no eyebrows. We would like to raise some money for this society that supports James: Spaces for sellers (£5) are limited so please call and book. Sellers are welcome from 9.00am with buyers (£1) welcome from 10.00am.

In April we have loads to look forward to including the Royal Wedding on Friday 29th April. We are planning on showing the build up and ceremony on five screens dotted around the building. ## Moviola presents "Made in Dagenham"

THIS film is a dramatisation of the 1968 strike at the Ford Dagenham car plant, where female workers walked out in protest against sexual discrimination which ultimately led to the Equal Pay Act. The story of those crusading workers shows that the women clearly felt strongly about being treated unfairly and now with hindsight we can see that it was a really significant moment in British history. Back in 1968, the working-class motor-town of Dagenham in East London seemed to inhabit a different planet from Carnaby Street and the Swinging 60s. Although fashion and pop filtered through to the factory workers, the Dagenham revolution was not about sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll, but about women's wages. When their work was reclassified by Ford's new grading system to 'unskilled', and they found that teenage boy floorsweepers earned more than they did, the women were furious, so they downed tools and came out for three heady weeks, the first female strike at the car plant. When the women who led the strikers at the Dagenham Ford plant marched on Westminster in 1968 they carried a banner with the words "We want sexual equality". Unfortunately, it had not unfurled and read simply "We want sex". The wolf whistles and car horns that supported them en route cheered them on nonetheless.

When film producer Stephen Woolley heard some of the women reminiscing on the 40th anniversary of the strike in Radio 4's The Reunion series, he realized it would make a classic tale of self-empowerment in the cinematic tradition of Educating Rita and Shirley Valentine. And that's how Vera, Eileen, Sheila and Gwen found themselves advising the film-makers on everything from the bikes they rode to work – they couldn't afford to buy the new cars whose seats they stitched – to the buckets they put out to catch rainwater from the leaking workshop roof. With Sally Hawkins and Geraldine James as fictional strike leaders Rita and Connie; Miranda Richardson in a splendidly spirited performance as Barbara Castle; Bob Hoskins as the supportive union organizer Albert and Dagenham born 60's pop star Sandie Shaw singing the theme song it is a truly inspirational story.

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## Have you met ... Eva Stockley

EVA was born 1933 in a small village in Nottinghamshire. They were a family of five children, she had three sisters and one brother older than Eva. Her Mother was her Dad's second wife, he was a shepherd, and also a clerk and sexton to St. Mary's church. He was known in the village as "Uncle Bob". Before marriage Eva's mother was a house maid at the Rectory and Eva thinks that is how they met.

Eva continues the story: My Father died in May 1939 age 73. The Second World War broke out in September. That year made a great difference to our family, as the widow's pension was 10 old shillings a week. It was very hard for us all and the family began to split up, my three sisters respectively worked on the buses, joined the ATS and joined the Land Army, my brother wanted to go in the army, so left his job on the farm (a protected occupation) and went to the railways, but this was added to the "protected jobs". My Mother became a sort of

District Nurse (equivalent to today's Carers), she would sit up with ill people all night whilst the family got some rest. Sometimes she would get paid if they could afford it.

I left school without any qualifications and worked at Boots Pure Drug Company in Nottingham, for 11 years, starting as junior filing clerk and ending as Chief order clerk dealing with hospitals purchasing drugs, quite a responsible job. In those days it was possible to do a good job of work and be rewarded with progress on merit. I have always done administrative work, moving to the Atomic Energy Research Establishment at Harwell after we were married.

I met John in 1956, who was in the Royal Navy. We married in September 1958 at my village church. That same year he was discharged with a deaf ear caused by gunshot on board ship. John was well qualified with his Naval exams which meant nothing in civvy street. So he started again, going back to night school to get qualified. He managed to get an engineering job at the Atomic Energy Research Establishment, Harwell, working on the reactors, whilst still studying. In 1962 we had twin girls which was a lovely way to start a family, 1964 our son arrived on the scene and in 1966 our youngest daughter arrived. We now have five lovely grandchildren.

1971 took us to Melton Mowbray in Leicestershire, where John's studies enabled him to be a lecturer in Engineering at the College. I also returned to work and took up a job as Administrative Technician at the Comprehensive school; I worked there for 20 years. It was here where we commenced working in the Community.

Eventually we both had our turns of office as Borough Councillors and in 1992/93 we had our Mayoral Year. I was Mayor and John was my Consort. We had a wonderful year (very demanding as I was still doing a full time job at the school) attending 360 appointments and meeting many interesting people. There was the Buckingham Palace Garden Party, but the outstanding day was when we asked the RAVC (Royal Army Veterinary Corps) to march through the town on a "Freedom of the Borough" parade, with the band of the Royal Lifeguards from London (by kind permission of Brig. Parker Bowles), and although we weren't allowed to advertise it (because of the Northern Irish troubles), there were crowds cheering them. We invited all the "rank and file" to come inside, an unusual touch, which they really appreciated. The only problem was that all the roads had been blocked to enable the parade, and in the traffic jam that ensued was the truck with the food for the celebrations, panic time!

In 1993 I was made redundant from the school due to cut-backs in education, the following year John took early retirement/redundancy from the college due to the government cutting back on apprenticeships, this was the college main intake on the engineering side (sounds familiar?).

It was always our intention to retire to Dorset (where John was

born) so this gave us the opportunity – we arrived at Portland in July 1994 just as the Royal Navy had departed. This had left Portland very disturbed. Members of Rotary had set up a helpline for Portland businesses in a campaign called "Portland Business Association" they needed a Chief Executive (voluntary). John applied and was accepted as he knew so much about Government and Council operations. It was at this point that we became more involved in the church, we had been going to church on the odd occasion but not attended on a regular basis over our working lives. I became a PCC member and very quickly their treasurer. We spent nine very happy and busy years on Portland. We moved to Sennen in Cornwall to help in a family business for three years, and then returned to Dorset. It was Milborne St. Andrew we chose to live, arriving in April 2004, but with great sadness John passed away with cancer in May 2005. As a regular attendee at St. Andrew's



Church eventually I was asked to join the PCC. Benny then persuaded me to become an LPA (Lay Pastoral Assistant), I had to go back to studying! I took over as Church Warden when June retired, all jobs are a big learning curve, including this one, especially with all the changes happening at the moment!

The best bit about the village is that we are well catered for, there is lots going on, it is an active village and it is very central, you can get to Blandford/Dorchester/ Salisbury/Weymouth easily by bus.

Like all the other nine places I have lived, in Milborne there is a hard-core of people who volunteer and work in the community.

The only change in the village is that I wish more people would be brave enough to volunteer and see it's rewards.

My claim to fame is that I have shared a stage with Harold Macmillan, and had dinner with David Steele and Cyril Smith (along with several hundred other diners).

My mum is my inspiration, she was a real Christian, and she managed to bring up all five of us on her own. I remember, as the youngest, I'd go with Mum to do small farming work like potato picking or sugar-beet singling to earn the money to go to the Nottingham Empire up in the gods.

As deputy mayor I was asked to visit the Vale of Belvoir Mine, I wore a skirt (unsurprisingly), but then was offered to climb a ladder to look at the view of Melton Mowbray, I had to refuse. The following year as Mayor, I was asked again, so I and the deputy mayor (also female) opted to wear casual trousers in readiness for that ladder. When we got there the treat was a visit down the mine, and everyone was in their Sunday best suits and ties - embarrassing!

My main hobby is cake decorating including sugar craft. And I've just started playing short-mat bowls again.

And anything else you would like to tell us ...

I think I have common sense, I'm not an academic, but I've always been able to work hard, learn quickly, and am proud of my achievements. I have never retired really, because I've always kept myself busy.


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## In your Garden

## Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of Designer Gardens Developing your design

GARDENS generally consist of hard landscaping and plants, but if you look further, you will see that the shapes and lines make up the pattern that is your garden. Once you have the plan (ie survey) mark out the functions you want your garden to fulfil – eg a seating area to make the most of a view; an area for storage; a children's play area; a lawn; and so on. You will probably need several copies of the survey plan to try out lots of different ideas before you finally decide on the one you



Another way of doing this is to lay a grid over your survey and try out different combinations of squares and rectangles, or circles or a mixture of the two that represent the areas you need/ want in the

garden. You can even turn the grid round to create interesting diagonal effects.

Always remember that the garden has to be built, so the angles you use are important. An angle of at least 90° should always join two shapes.

Shading various areas will divide the shapes into the mass (the planting) and the void. Both are equally important in a design. A

garden design doesn't have to follow the shape of the boundary - the garden is designed from within so you can have a circle or a square as a central theme and the bits that are left can be filled with planting.

It is a good idea to start with the area nearest the house first – this may be the patio or terrace. This is the link between the house and the garden and needs to be at least ¾ the height of the house to the eaves

or in the case of a bungalow – the full height of the house will look better. Small measly terraces look as though you ran out of paving slabs. Your outdoor furniture is usually larger than your tables and chairs inside so, on the whole, proportions for garden spaces need to be larger. This is when you need to decide how many people you want to accommodate on your terrace – you need at least one metre space all around the table for access and moving around.

Scale and proportion are important elements to think about – steps and paths outside need to be much larger in scale than those inside the house. Arbours, pergolas and seating areas need to be generously proportioned so that you don't feel cramped and uncomfortable. Pergolas should be at least 2.5m high and wide enough to walk along comfortably. Main paths should be wide enough for two people to walk along together 1.2 – 1.5 metre is usually recommended. Pergolas can be used to connect different areas of the garden and may take you to a particular destination, eg, a summerhouse, or lead your eye to a focal point such as a sculpture or urn. They can also be used to separate sections of the garden providing glimpses of the garden beyond. They provide height in an otherwise flat garden and are very useful in providing support for climbing plants.

## Average January weather in village

JANUARY 2011 was an average sort of January but it was a month of two halves. There was rain on most days for the first 17 days of the month with most of the total month's rainfall of 120.1mm falling during that time. There were particularly wet days on the 6th and 10th with rainfall of 24.0mm and 20.5mm respectively. The last 14 days of the month were dry with frosts on most nights and only 0.6mm rain falling in that time. The total rainfall for the month was 110% of

The average rainfall for the winter months (December – February) is 309.8mm but to date the winter rainfall is only 187.5mm. Lakes and rivers in Dorset are beginning to be noticeably lower than they ought to be at this time. It will require particularly heavy rain during the rest of February to make up the shortfall.

There were no thunderstorms in 2010 which was unusual as we can normally expect seven thunderstorms during a year. There was a thunderstorm on the evening of 17th January which was the first since 23rd December 2009. If we experience a thunderstorm during February it may be a good sign for according to Weather Lore;

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

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

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

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## Milborne siege the castle

8th June to 13th July (six weeks) I am so sorry but I will have to increase the new season training fee for the new terms at £2.00 per week. £12.00 payable please. All cheques made payable to Milborne Sports FC.

I will need to pay a little money to the Milborne Sports FC to help running costs (Floodlights, etc) It is only fair and proper. I like to point out that I have not been put under any pressure from our parent club to do this but it is a gesture and a reminder to everyone that at Milborne Football Club we are all as one and must pay our way although self sufficient. We break up for the Summer Holidays after 13th July and will not recommence until 7th September. A nice long break! Players selected for playing in the league teams will be signed up during June and will have to pay the leagues signing on fee of £3.00 each. These fees are charged by the DCFA Mini Soccer league for the registration of players.

### Matches

During the spring term I will try and organise a few more friendly matches. Home and away with the home matches at the Milton Abbas Sports Ground. If luck is on my side next season from the middle of September we might be able to play friendly home and league matches on the new pitch at Milborne Sports ground.

#### Staff supervision

I am hoping my good friend and colleague, Mr David Drew who is a fully qualified football man, vast experience in management and coaching teams successfully to league championships will join me full time at the club during May of the new year. I will also require one or two adult volunteers to help me out at training, etc: I do not want parents who will interfere with my plans or have their own ideas on running youth football. I want adults who will work and support me by showing respect. Persons appointed to help must

have good communication skills, and pleasant mannerisms towards the members. We are a charter standard club which means under the FA safety code adults will have to undergo a police CRB check, and a child protection certificate one night course. If a parent is really keen and is in a position of responsibility for a team on a Sunday he can within the year apply to take a level one FA coaching course for qualification. Money well spent.

#### Membership

When I have sufficient numbers in an age group to make the league teams (*must be our aim for children to have fun*) I will keep a waiting list for children to join us. I will continue to keep proper discipline and supervision at all times. I aim to discuss the way forward by a meeting of parents already mentioned in this bulletin.

#### Membership fees for the new season

Renewal date is 6th June 2011. A complete season the fee is £5.00 each child. The increase is due to updating the present insurance cover with new premiums, etc: We have to do this due to the increased membership. Everyone will have to fill out a new membership form as per FA rules guidance regarding club administration. Please use the same kit for another season.

#### **Accounts**

I have run out of funds due to the huge problems I have had in purchasing the club standard kit. I need to find a new more reliable company. I have also bought ten size four footballs towards our independent club equipment scheme (bright yellow ones). See last month's *Reporter* for club accounts. Everything we do is fully transparent and can be viewed by parents any time.

#### Fund raising - flood light appeal

We may have an opportunity to organise a "Bag Pack" with a charity at a supermarket, hopefully Tescos at Blandford. David and myself have worked with this chosen charity before. There would be a 50% spilt of monies raised. I will need parents on the tills to pack bags for those members of the public who agree and boys to attend dressed in club soccer kit with buckets at the end of the tills. If we all can give up some time on a rota system and support each other (not just a few turn up) it may be a good way of raising much needed funds. Other fund raising events in the pipelines are a Race Night for parent's friends, relations, and Members. I am hoping for guidance from our parent club chairman and committee on this venture.

Finally if we have the space we could organise our own little mini soccer tournament, and invite a few clubs with entry fee to join us.

Don't forget to keep trying to raise the £200 sponsorship required for a floodlight.

#### End of season presentation night

I will not organise this event as other clubs seem to do. The reason is I don't want to single out members for an award. In my humble opinion all the members are players of the year. Each member I will try and treat the same.

### **Costs increase**

I hope most of you know me well enough by now that I try to keep fees to a minimum. I am not in the habit of building up huge resources for the sake of it.
