WE have two more co-opted members of the Parish Council, hopefully meaning that the tasks are spread more evenly and there is not the embarrassment of too few members to make decisions at any meetings. Phillip Smith and Dean Hamilton have volunteered to become councillors and have been accepted by the present PC.

None of the District or County Councillors were able to attend, due to the short notice, and also the health of Michael Cox, the council and the village send their best wishes to Michael and Hilary. Della Jones, our representative on the District Council, sent a message which included the advice that local PC's need to get together to carry out and FUND new responsibilities being devolved down from NDDC.

The saga of the Parish Plan is drawing to a close and it has been accepted, will be printed (with a colour front sheet) for those unable to access it electronically. It will be available from the Post Office, and also at the Annual Meeting, and online on the village website (www.milbornestandrew.org.uk).

Milton Road Corner is practically complete, just waiting for the bin to arrive. The PC thanks Andy Fox for making the planters, the *Reporter* for sponsoring the bench, Gerry Spivey for the spring bulbs (which will be lovely next year) and Ian Rogers for some compost. I am planning to do a short narration and two or three songs from "Joseph and his Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" together with a couple of other songs for the youngest performers.





Please could you email or telephone me as soon as possible to express an interest in joining in - I already have some names but need many more!




Picnic on the moon

Do you know about the obelisk?

IT is a stone tower in the centre and highest point of Wetherby Castle, and was featured on the front page of the *Reporter* last Autumn.

Back in the late 1980's or even earlier a public fund was set up to restore it, as, at that time, it was in a poor state of repair. With public subscription, and a grant from NDDC, the works were carried out satisfactorily. When the fund was looked at by our new Parish Clerk, very little could be discovered. We now know that it was a Post Office account, and that is now has £2,423.72 in it. We also know that the PC have checked with the farmer, Mr Frampton, who confirms there is access to the obelisk to allow for further maintenance. But the fund is in an imaginary "ice block" as there is no record of who the signatories are and the Post Office cannot reveal any details, due to the Data Protection Act.

Usually the Parish Council set up this type of account, which would have been controlled by them, however, this fund was set up separate to the council; it is called "Obelisk Fund". The Parish Council, and those villagers who care about the Obelisk, would like to find out who the signatories are, any information would be appreciated.

Discussions with English Heritage has confirmed that the structure is not listed, which is unfortunate, however they said they would be speaking to both Dorset County Council and NDDC conservation on the subject and would report back to the PC in due course.

Holy Orders win by a whisker



Milborne Stomper to "Tak the High Road"

SEVERAL staff members from Dorchester Police Station and a member of staff from Leonard Cheshire Disability are to tackle the West Highland and Great Glen Way Dorchester Police Staff Challenge.

Calling themselves the Dorchester Stompers, the happy band of intrepid walkers are being put through their paces by Tony Freudenfeld, a Milborne resident (and regular of The Royal Oak), who is station desk officer at the police station in the county town.

He has the responsibility of knocking the walkers into shape, and as the resident professional ensuring that a correct training programme is adhered to.

Each member of the group has been touched in some way by cancer, and all proceeds from this venture will go to the Weldmar Hospicecare Trust.

The Dorchester Stompers – PCSOs Mark Wodarek-Black, Sarah Pilcher and Vickie Hedges, Inspector Geoff Hicks, PC Kris Heron, Daniel Ling from Leonard Cheshire Disability, and Wendy Bainbridge, a clinical supervisor from the Joseph Weld Hospice – are challenging themselves to walk almost a marathon a day for a period of seven days. Setting out at the beginning of May and staying at hostels and campsites along the way, they will cover a distance of 175 miles through some of Scotland's most breathtaking scenery.

The journey starts at Milngarvie, the start of the West Highland Way, and carries on to the town of Fort William. From there they will tackle Ben Nevis.

Following their descent they will pick up the Great Glen Way and stride on up to Inverness and their final destination.



Have you met... Tony Dyer?

IT came as no surprise to learn that Tony's great-grandfather and his four brothers had been sea captains 150 years ago and that the sea had been in his family's blood since before Trafalgar. Indeed family history says that *VICTORY*'s purser at that time was also a Dyer!

Anthony Gascoyne Dyer was born during a thunderstorm in 1933 in Tewkesbury in Gloucestershire, the son of the manager of the Cheltenham Gaslight and Coke Company. The "Gascoyne" was his grand-mother's family name but seemed appropriate considering his

father's occupation and led to him being nicknamed "Bob" - in a reference to shilling-in-the-slot gas meters. Whilst at Grammar School Tony considered going into teaching or the law but the call of the sea was too strong and in 1951 he joined Britannia Royal Naval College and spent the next 32 years as a Seaman Officer specialising in Navigation both of surface ships and submarines. As a Lieutenant-Commander he became second-in command of HMS Jupiter in the West Indies. He finished his career with the Royal Navy as Assistant Queen's Harbourmaster in Plymouth. Tony's career coincided with the "Cold War" when the USSR was the clear threat and he has sympathy for those in the armed forces today where the current threat shifts, almost from day to day. He spent several years training the



command teams of Polaris and Nuclear Attack and Conventional submarines in navigation and he particularly remembers the team spirit and camaraderie he experienced on board them. However most of his time was spent on the surface in the Caribbean, Mediterranean and in the Far East. In 1953 he saw the devastation of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Then, during a round-the-world deployment in 1959, he navigated the weather ship for a hydrogen bomb test at Christmas Island. This experience made him well aware of his later responsibility for ensuring the safe navigation of the "boats" carrying our nuclear deterrent. On leaving the Royal Navy, Tony became Harbour Master and General Manager of the Cattewater break-bulk harbour in Plymouth, a post he held for 13 years before retiring and moving to Milborne St. Andrew in 2003.

We asked Tony what had attracted him to Milborne St. Andrew. "I knew Portland and South Dorset pretty well since I had done four operational 'work-ups' in ships at Portland. The area is beautiful and the pace of life just right for retirement. There are good communications to the rest of the UK which makes visiting and being visited by family much more straightforward than it would have been had we stayed in distant Plymouth. We didn't pick out Milborne as the place to live from the beginning of our search but having had two very old houses and large gardens the new but traditional housing (with small gardens) going up in Milborne, together with the splendid facilities in the village, the Surgery, Post Office and shop and vibrant Village Hall, ticked most of the other boxes as well."

What do you particularly like about our village? "It has a fabulous location with beautiful countryside all around; a pleasant and welcoming community and so many activities."

Anything you don't like? "The experience I had had and the skills I developed pre-retirement led me to get involved in the village and this has been a rewarding experience. My disappointment is that there are so few younger people who are involved in the 'management' of village affairs. The life-experiences of the retired community are invaluable but the perspectives, ideas and skills of those 20, 30, 40 years younger are vitally necessary to maintain and develop a thriving community." What would you like to change? "There seems to have been a certain negative view of how to manage the changes which we have to deal with in the village over the next decades. Society is changing and we

have to take advantage of the opportunities now available to make our village an even better place to live for all of us. I was very much involved in the recent exercise to create a 'Village Plan'. The high level of response from village residents was good and I'm pleased to see the beginnings of a change of attitude: the Parish Council has adopted the Plan almost in its entirety AND more people are coming forward to serve on the Parish Council. Like many residents I continue to be worried by continuing problems with dog mess but I am pleased that

some effort has been made to make the village appear more attractive to passersby by the provision of the planters and bench in the village centre. The planting could have been much better but it's a start."

Do you have a claim to fame? "Not really. I was awarded the MBE for the work I did in the managing of the development of water sports alongside the very busy Naval and Commercial traffic in Plymouth, the largest Naval Base in Europe. I did sail in Ocean Racing Yachts both as navigator and skipper and was selected to be one of the British team in an Americas Cup Challenge, but as the junior of the three Naval Officers selected, I couldn't be spared and so missed out on a once-in-a- lifetime experience. Also, whilst in Plymouth I was race-director for Ocean Yacht Races

across Biscay to France and Spain and was very involved in management of the single and two-handed yacht races around Britain and across the Atlantic."

Who is your inspiration? "Captain Cook and Captain Scott (of the Antarctic) because of their courage and thirst for exploration." And a fantasy dinner date? "From history: Marco Polo and Admiral Zheng He – both extra-ordinary explorers in the 15th century; the last Pope, John Paul II, who was and is such inspiration and Kate Adie, particularly because of her massive support for the members of the Armed Forces, and finally David Attenborough. His depth of knowledge and outstanding powers of communication would hold all enthralled, I'm sure."

Have you ever thrown caution to the wind? "No. My training has made me plan, be logical and in peacetime there are been few opportunities for recklessness . . . however . . . I was almost caught out! As harbourmaster I was often called for a lunch-time drink on board visiting ships. On one occasion I was invited aboard the massive Russian Ocean-Going Tug, JAGUAR, for a 'quiet' drink with the Master who was an old acquaintance. The vodka flowed and the Master said that I should meet his Commissar - the ship's political officer. The commissar was bidden - I expected the usual Russian Bear to arrive BUT - She turned out to be an almost six-foot blond, quite gorgeous and with seemingly extremely long and beautiful legs. I might have been easy prey but before any international incidents were triggered my pager went off to tell me that my boat was waiting alongside! A lucky escape?" And anything else you would like to tell us: "My ships called at Aden many times for water and fuel and I had decided that it really was the slag heap of the world. I never wanted to visit it again. Then I was given "pier-head jump" to join the Naval Staff there, arriving much discombobulated, on my 30th birthday. I was met by a chum who had been two years behind me at school – and things improved markedly when he took me into the mess and introduced me to a willowy blond WRAF Flight Officer - Sally Metcalfe - we married three years later to the day. Now we have a son, a daughter, with her splendid soldier husband, and two granddaughters."

David Payne and I had a most enjoyable lunchtime talking to Tony and hearing his ideas and memories. Thank you Tony for sharing them with us. *Ed Frost*


We need you:

humour and expertise, she made short work of making up an attractive summer basket. She gave us many tips along the way – which plants to use, how to feed and layer them, the different types of basket liners and compost and the overall cost. Interestingly, a lot of discussion centred on alternative planting, eg vegetables and/or fruit, using trailing tomatoes and strawberries, or herbs such as rosemary, mint, parsley, chives, thyme etc. Then there are winter baskets, using dwarf conifers, ivy, sedum, pansies and bulbs. These are miniature gardens after all, so virtually anything goes! Gerry donated her basket to our raffle and Val Andrews was the happy winner!

Michael Hopper reported that is was always envisaged that this project, whilst overseen by the Parish Council, would be run by the community, maybe under an umbrella organisation like an Allotment Society.

It is hoped that someone from the community comes forward to set up and organise such a Society and is able to move the idea forward. In the event that no one comes forward, the PC will look again at the use of the land. The establishment of allotments is not going to be quick, but the end result will be of benefit to a wide section of the community. Anecdotal evidence has shown that allotments elsewhere in the county have a waiting list, and attract people from a fair distance.

If anyone from the community wishes to head up and start the Society please let the Parish Council know. The Parish Council has set aside a small budget to allow for things like hiring meeting rooms and possible site visits to other neighbouring societies to kick start this project.

Our village, Our responsibility The AGM of the Milborne St. Andrew Parish Council

THIS was the over-riding theme of the Parish Council's Annual General Meeting held in the Village Hall. The meeting was chaired by Cllr Michael Hopper with five councillors, the Parish Clerk and 20 members of the public present.

PC Dave Mullins presented a positive report from Dorset Police but he emphasised the need for all people to take sensible precautions to protect themselves and their possessions. A joint approach was vital to keep crime down, even here, in one of the safest places in the country. The police can only help if concerns or suspicions are reported immediately. Tomorrow will be too late and you should not assume that "someone else" will deal with problems.


In his report, Cllr Hopper expressed disappointment that there would be no elections for the Parish Council this month. With only five councillors the seats were uncontested but he hoped that the remaining two seats would be filled by willing and able volunteers in the near future. Cllr Hopper pointed out that with the advent of "Localism", Parish Councils will have a much more important and influential role in the future and it was therefore vital that our Parish was properly represented. He went on to describe the activities and achievements of the Parish Council over the last year and referred to the Council's adoption of the Village Plan which, he said, would be a valuable tool in guiding the Council's future work.

In her financial report the clerk – Joyce Holman – described a healthy financial position due, mainly, to donations and the reclamation of three-year's worth of VAT.

The reports from District and County Councillors praised the work of Parish Councils but emphasised that the savings in spending, now required, could not be achieved without a reduction in services. As "Localism" was introduced it would be essential for Parish Councils to seek ways of working efficiently as well as effectively.

There followed reports from the Village Hall Trustees, the Sports Club, the Footpaths representative and the Neighbourhood Watch representative. All the reports described the achievements of a small number of very active volunteers but emphasised that things would only progress very slowly unless more people got involved in the practical development of the village organisations and facilities.

The meeting concluded with invitations from representatives to get involved with the activities of the Women's Institute and the Wednesday Club. Tea, coffee and biscuits were served.



THIS film is an enjoyably straight forward romantic comedy, written by the team who did *Devil Wears Prada* and directed by Brit Roger Michel (*Notting Hill*). 

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
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Anonymous letters

In your Garden Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *Designer Gardens* Hanging Baskets

I THOUGHT that I would write a piece on hanging baskets this month as it is a good time to start to prepare them for putting out at the end of May. Hanging baskets are the easiest way to brighten up a wall and although mainly used in the summer, they can be just as decorative in

the winter. Their main drawback is that they need to be watered as often as twice a day on very hot days – but you can mix a water retaining gel into the compost which will help to retain water.

There is no magic about a beautiful display, it is just a matter of putting lots of plants into a



hanging basket, watering, feeding and deadheading regularly.

The way I do it is to cut out a circle of black polythene – usually taken from an empty compost bag. I then fit it into the basket and cut out holes where I want plants to poke through. Garden centres sell lots of different types of liner from foam plastic to compressed fibre – but I find that thick polythene works just as well and it doesn't cost anything. Put the cut out compost bag into the basket so that the black side is showing – the other side (usually multi-coloured) is hidden. The plants will soon cover the liner.

Mix up a bucket of compost and incorporate some water retaining gel and slow release fertiliser, ie Osmocote. As you introduce the plants and push them into the holes, fill around them with the compost. Keep doing this until the sides are full of plants and then leave a space in the top for a few more. The final level of the soil/compost should be about one inch below the rim. Don't use your old soil from last year's baskets as it will provide very little benefit and may be infected with vine weevil. Better to use new potting compost.

I like to put some trailing plants such as trailing Verbena and lobelia in the base of the basket. You could also put in some trailing petunias or million bells, yellow flowered Bidens and Nasturtiums. For the top layer use some trailing plants around the edge – Helichrysum, trailing geraniums or fuchsias and then in the middle something more upright – a pretty pelargonium (geranium) or fuchsia.

Hanging baskets with just a single variety of plant can look equally

stunning – Scaevola trails over the edge with its blue flowers and continues to bloom until late summer. Trailing and upright petunias and million bells produce a colourful and fragrant display; and a display of geraniums both trailing and upright just keep on flowering. You can of course

put trailing tomatoes in the basket – Tumbling Tom Red or Yellow will give you a good crop provided you feed them regularly. You could also make yourself a hanging herb garden using annual herbs such as basil and coriander, parsley, chives and thyme.

Gerry's Plants and Cottage Garden Nursery up at The Rings have a really good selection of hanging basket plants – why go further than that!

Dear Friends,



March Village Weather

TOTAL rainfall in March was 18.2mm which was 23% of average and it was the second driest March in Milborne in the last 40 years. March 1990 was particularly dry with only 10.6mm of rain. In some areas last month was the driest March for 50 years. The first week of the month was cold with night frosts but the rest of the month became progressively warmer. Wind speeds were unusually light for March. After the remarkably mild February and the settled, dry March there have been some of the finest early spring flowers and blossoms that I have seen for many years. It must have been such a spring as this which Thomas Carew had in mind when he wrote:

> "Now doe a quire of chirping minstrels bring, In triumph to the world, the youthful Spring. The vallies, hills, and woods in rich araye Welcome the coming of the long'd for May."

Bee-friendly at Gardening Club



THE Speaker for our March meeting was Neil Lovesey from the Picket Lane Nursery in South Perrot. Besides propagating around 60,000 plants a year and running the nursery business, Neil is a keen bee-keeper and told us many amazing facts about

honey bees, the diseases that affect them and about bumblebees, wasps and hornets.

Since 70% of our diet relies on bees for pollination, it is essential for us to look after them. He showed us how to make homes for wild bees to encourage them into our gardens. We should try to grow as many bee-friendly flowers as possible, particularly in the very early spring when many bees die of starvation and in late autumn as well. Plants that flower for a long time are the most beneficial to bees, and some of the long-lasting ones that bees like include kniphofia (red hot pokers), anthemis, echinacea, buddleia, stachys macrata, liatris spicata, verbena bonariensis and verbena hastata. Apparently, a big block of colour will attract bees into the garden, but they cannot see the colour red. Anne Love gave the vote of thanks to Neil for such a fascinating talk.

We were able to purchase some of the plants Neil had brought with him while refreshments were served, and then we discussed some of our future events. The most important one, for raising funds, is our Annual Plant Sale on Sunday 15th May 10.30am to 12.30pm in the Village Hall. Members have been busy growing annuals, perennials, and all kinds of plants for this, and will also be providing tea, coffee and home-made cakes and biscuits. So, even if you think you do not need any plants, you can come along and sample some of our delicious eats.

More dates for members' diaries include our trip to Rosemoor on Thursday 16th June, an extra evening meeting on Thursday 28th July and another fun evening is being planned for Thursday 25th August. More details will be given in next month's Report - so watch this space. Linda Harris, Secretary

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

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



Music for a Will – the answering phrase-1

IN my first article encouraging everyone to consider the importance of making a will and planning their estate I posed four questions:

- If I don't make a will, or my will is not valid, what will happen to my possessions?
- If I have to go into a care home will my wife/husband/partner have to sell our house to pay for my care?
- My husband died recently, if I have to go into care my home will go to my children, won't it?
- If I am not able to make decisions for myself any more my relatives will be able to act on my behalf and make decisions for me, won't they?

The answer to the first of them is not as simple as you might imagine. When someone dies intestate (without a valid will) there is a legal set of rules to determine who will inherit all their possessions.

If you have a spouse or civil partner who survives you by at least 28 days and you **have children**, then:

- The first £250,000 goes to your spouse or civil partner with your personal effects
- Half of your remaining assets go to your spouse or civil partner for their lifetime, then to your children when they reach 18 years old
- The other half goes directly to your children when they reach 18 years old

If you have a spouse or civil partner who survives you by at least 28 days and you have no children, but you do have parents or brothers and sisters, nephews and nieces, then:

- The first £450,000 goes to your spouse or civil partner with your personal effects
- Half of your remaining assets go to your spouse or civil partner absolutely
- The other half goes to your parents if they survive you, otherwise to your brothers and sisters or their children, in equal shares

If you do not have a spouse or civil partner who survives you, then the full estate passes to whoever comes first in this list:

- 1. Children in equal shares when they reach 18 years old
- 2. Parents
- 3. Brothers and sisters or their children
- 4. Half brothers and sisters or their children
- 5. Grandparents
- 6. Aunts and uncles or their children
- 7. 'Half' aunts and uncles or their children
- 8. The Crown or the Duchies of Lancaster and Cornwall

For an unmarried couple the surviving partner is not entitled to anything under the rules of intestacy.

It is worth taking a few minutes to work out where all your assets would go if you died tomorrow – heaven forefend – without a valid will, leaving the courts to decide who will inherit. Who would you <u>choose</u> to leave them to?

You will see from this that the way to ensure that your hard earned money and property go to the people you intend to benefit from your estate is, of course, to take advice about your own individual situation and make an appropriate will!
