## Factory Farming and Local Libraries - WI May 2011

THIS was our members' evening, with Resolutions top of the agenda. Every year WI members put forward resolutions for discussion at the National AGM which, if passed, then form the basis of our future campaigning and awareness-raising activities. This year we were asked to discuss and vote upon two resolutions. The first resolution urged the Government to ensure planning permission is not granted for factory farming projects, particularly relating to large animals such as pigs and cows. Ann Mepham took us through the background data and arguments for and against were discussed. Opinions seemed evenly divided and with a vote of 6 for and 6 against and a number of abstentions, no clear consensus was reached. The second resolution, read by Shirley Dunkley, relating to the closure of local libraries was, however, carried by a majority of votes.




construction with the boys deciding to build a house which all the children then played in. It was a pity it had to be dismantled at the end of the morning after all the effort that had gone into it.

### **Parish Council report**

#### Parish Council AGM - Wednesday 11th May 2011

IT was with trepidation that I agreed to take notes for Sue this week but being a newbie on the Reporter team I thought that I should be seen to be keen. I arrived at the village hall somewhat earlier than most and busied myself with preparation to take notes and be guided as to when to ask questions by the more experienced members of the public. I ventured into the village hall and took my place for what I hoped would be an informative and productive few hours!

Before the real meeting begins the public have a chance to ask questions as there were only 12 of us you can imagine that questions were few and far between:

A question was raised as to the validity of sections of previous meetings where the public are excluded. The clerk confirmed that such proceedings are allowed under particular circumstances.

A question was raised as to the overhanging cars from the garage that means members of the public wanting to walk in front of said garage must venture onto the road. It seems that as it is private land the council are unable to do anything but PC Mullins would be contacted to see if the police might help.

#### **Formal Meeting:**

Councillor Mike Hopper was replaced by Councillor Janet Allen as the Chairman for the term 2011/2012. Councillor Allen accepted

Mr Paul Morgan and Mrs Jennifer Balcon were co-opted onto the council. Councillor Mike Hopper and Councillor Paul Morgan were nominated for Vice Chairman post. Councillor Hopper refused and Councillor Morgan accepted. The posts of Tree Warden, Footpaths officer, Ancient Monument Officer, and Flood Wardens were filled as were the representatives of outside organisations for 2011/2012.

No objection was raised to a previously rejected planning application and the Internal Auditor post remains the same. The Council was unable to review statutory documents as they were not up to date so an action plan will be agreed at another meeting. A review of the council's assets was detailed in a report. The grants review meant a change in procedure, the village action plan is going to an informal meeting so that it can be drawn up and the suggestion of the medical centre going onto the paddock behind Brooklands is not feasible as access would be a problem. The eyesore at Little England is with NDDC as they are taking action against the owner of the site. Some cheques were signed and then all the councillors refused the offer of a financial allowance for the next years term. The vote was then taken to exclude the public as the clerk's terms and conditions were to be discussed.

If the members of the public that left the building felt the same as I did it was with confusion and just a little bit of anger, the meeting seemed to be at a loss with itself and had degenerated into what I felt a bit of a shambles. I did however feel that I needed to learn about the responsibility of the council as the councillors are making decisions about the village that I live in and spending the money that I earn. ### **News from Milton Abbas** and Milborne St. Andrew Surgery

**Thank you** – We would like to thank our patients for their patience and understanding whilst we fitted 15 days surgery hours into 11 days over the extended bank holiday weekends at the beginning of April.

Open Surgeries - We constantly monitor our morning open surgery policy. Currently, if you need to be seen quickly you can telephone the surgery in the morning, be given an approximate time slot to attend, and be seen by either a doctor or advanced nurse practitioner. Routine matters can be dealt with by booking an advance appointment. However, provision of a morning open surgery, and the doctor time taken, sometimes means that our advance booking, especially with the doctor of your choice, is more limited than patients would like. Therefore, once again, we are reviewing this and would welcome comments and ideas from patients on how to improve access. Patient comment forms are available in both surgeries for you to complete and hand to the receptionist or you can comment on our website at www.masurgery.co.uk. Go to contact online and click on feedback.

Patient Participation Group - The surgery patient participation group work hard to raise funds and provide us with feedback from patients. Recent equipment purchased for the surgery include: dressing and equipment trolleys for each room; a drip stand and extra syringe driver to aid care for very ill and palliative care patients; an extra blood monitoring machine for the Milborne St. Andrew surgery and glove holders for consulting rooms.

**New Doctor** – Our new partner, Dr Stephanie Dean joined us at the beginning of April. Dr Dean will be working on Monday and Thursday mornings and all day on Wednesday. She is available for pre-booked appointments on Monday morning at Milborne St. Andrew and Wednesday afternoon at Milton Abbas. She is the open surgery doctor on Wednesday and Thursday mornings at Milton Abbas.

### NHS Dorset website has gone live

ALONG with a new look, the site will act as a health portal for the people of Dorset. It contains health information along with links to other sites which have useful information, e.g. NHS Choices.

During the development of the site, local people were invited to share their views and offer feedback. As a result, the site has been designed to be more user friendly than previous and more intuitive. It also meets current web standards in terms of accessibility.

In order to ensure public funds have been used efficiently, no external contractors or agencies were used. Costs were minimised and experience and knowledge were maintained within the organisation. Future maintenance and updating will also be undertaken within the organisation.



### Without a 'new queen' at Busy Bees the 'hive' cannot survive ... or can it?

BUSY BEES mother and toddler, (latterly termed, under 5's) group is set to close if another group of willing helpers cannot be found.

It was started many years ago by a group of keen mothers in the village who wanted somewhere to meet up together with their preschoolers during the term time. These early campaigners worked tirelessly to secure much needed funds to buy equipment and storage for the toys. It then moved from the village hall to the sports pavilion to accommodate the Ladybirds Playgroup. Though sadly, it now loses a percentage of older children to Ladybirds as they have dropped their lower age limit.

Children and parents alike have enjoyed many happy years at the pavilion where the facilities are excellent. The large storage shed facilitates easy access to a large range of equipment enabling the children to play safely both inside and out - whatever the weather.

For a minimal sum of £1.50 (for two hours) families have been able to drop in 'as and when' to play and socialise. Freshly ground coffee and, often, home-made cakes were available to patents/carers whilst a healthy snack was provided for the children.

Each week a new creative activity was planned from cress/heads to crowns to finger mice! Paint, play-dough etc was also regularly

During the last year plus that I've chaired the club we've also organised:

- visits from various health professionals
- inputs from Surestart workers
- hand/foot printing pottery workshops
- photographers
- Christmas cake baking
- fund raising

We also started a story/singing time at the close of the sessions which the children loved.

It has always been a low-key group where parents can come and relax with their little ones. I have tried very hard to make it warm and welcoming to anyone who comes and try to make sure each child enjoys their visit.

My youngest goes to school imminently and as my work and other voluntary commitments pile up it's high time I stepped down.

It would be an absolute travesty if this group was to shutdown after so much hard work by so many mothers over so many years. A committed team is needed to come forward, quickly, otherwise the future of our village's only mother and toddler group looks very bleak indeed.

#### "Don't hesitate to call in the police"

Just call us . . . That's the message from a PCSO patrolling villages south of Blandford, who said residents shouldn't hesitate to contact officers if they have concerns.

PCSO Luke Goddard, 28, who joined Dorset Police in 2007 and previously served in Blandford Town, said police relied on the public for information, and praised Homewatch teams for helping officers to protect communities.

"Homewatch is incredibly important. We rely heavily on people telling us what is going on providing intelligence," he said and he urged villagers on his Blandford Rural South patch, not to stay silent.

"The main advice is just to pick up the phone and call us", he said.

PCSO Goddard, who is currently the lead officer for security equipment in the Blandford area, said low cost improvements could help to keep properties safe.

"Sometimes it can be quite subtle things, like fitting a slatted gate rather than one with a crossbar that can be used as a ladder," he said.

### Have you met... Roger (the Rant) Harrall?

DURING my talk with Roger and his wife, Alice, Roger said he had no claim to fame. I wonder if he realises that a Google search on "Roger Harrall" reveals four screens of references to him - no, not other people of the same name but Milborne's own Roger (the Rant) Harrall.

For the last 25 years, Roger's life has been punctuated with major

bouts of ill-health. He described his problems when he had a mental breakdown caused by manic depression, an illness which was effectively treated by modern medical methods. At one stage the onset of arthritis meant that he could hardly walk and had to be pushed around in a wheel chair but he had both his knee joints replaced and he became mobile again. Now, his chronic arthritis comes and goes and he manages it by being careful with his diet and taking modern medication which slows down the deterioration of his joints. He still has to take it easy though when his illness flares up. After all this you might expect Roger to be grumpy but he's not; he's one of the gentlest and kindest and most positive people you could ever wish to meet.

Roger was born in 1947 in Kingston upon Thames. His father was a chimney sweep and one of his earliest memories is of helping him by going out into the road and yelling when the sweeping brush emerged from the chimney pot. At that time his family was one of the few in their street with their own

motorised vehicle and at the time of the Coronation they were able to afford a television set and entertained half the street in front of the nine inch black and white screen. The lack of traffic meant that playing football, cricket and rounders out in the street was the norm as were unaccompanied visits to Richmond Park in the summer where Roger and his friends would roam free.

Family parties at his grandmother's house were always a bit of an event with everyone expected to do a "party piece". It came as no surprise to learn that Roger's contribution was to sing. He told me that "I love to go a wandering" was his favourite with the rest of the family joining in with the "Val-de-re, Val-de-ra" chorus. This, he believes, was the beginning of his love of singing.

At secondary school, Roger did well in Science and especially well in Woodwork and Metalwork and when he left at the age of 15 he took a job at the Roberts radio factory. He hated it and left within a year. Roger had been in the Sea Cadets since he was 12 and he moved on to a job at Raven's Ait – an island in the Thames – where he was trained up to maintain and repair the Sea Cadets fleet of boats at their base on

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the island, putting his woodworking skills to good use. His new job also gave him opportunities to sail on bigger sailing vessels as well as a multitude of sailing dinghies. Roger's woodworking skills were put to good use in bridge building as well. Hammersmith Bridge was being refurbished and some curved timberwork could only be created by

> craftsmen with boat-building skills - Roger was in demand!

Around this time Roger was introduced to Alice. Alice's then boyfriend, a colleague of Roger's, had arranged for Roger to take her sailing. Roger decided that he would rather work on his boat, offering the excuse that there was not enough wind for sailing. Fortunately, fate took a hand and a few months later, by which time Alice had split from her previous boyfriend, Roger and Alice became "an item". They were a successful partnership both on and off the water and, as well as getting engaged and married within a few months also won the prestigious Yate's Cup and Braganza Bowl trophies at the Thames Rater class Whitsuntide regatta on the Thames.

Roger's parents died in the early 80's and Roger and Alice decided to move down to Dorset to be nearer to Alice's mother who lived in Wareham. Roger became selfemployed, first as a furniture restorer, then a gardener. He also had a spell working with the Purbeck and Bovington Beagles and was

invited to join the mastership in 1987. As Roger told me "Once I couldn't run around any more I got more and more involved in the local Folk Music Scene as an unaccompanied singer of traditional songs. As a result my 60th birthday party grew from a barn dance to a weekend festival with friends and family from all over England. We made a bit of money for the RNLI and the Air Ambulance and decided to run a repeat the following year. Roger's Rant is now a fixture for July on the local folk music calendar."

I asked Roger what he particularly liked about Milborne St. Andrew. "It's a mixed village with people from all walks of life and different interests. From the time we arrived people went out of their way to be friendly and there are more societies in the village than one could belong to."


Is there a downside to living in Milborne St. Andrew? "No, apart from the lack of public transport which is the price you pay for living in our beautiful countryside."

### It's not what you can do for your Parish Council, it's what your Parish Council can do for you

So what are Parish councils all about? What do they do? How do they work and how are they funded. These were the questions that I brought home with me the night of the AGM and so I got reading:

The first thing I did was to have a look at my council tax bill - not something I usually do I just look at the total, moan a little bit and then think oh well. It seems that in a band D property the breakdown totals £19.45 as a precept for the Parish council on an individual property. The Parish Council has received a total of £7,675 this year from the residents of Milborne St. Andrew.

Next I did a Google search and I came up with the following:

There are about 10,000 parish councils in England and Wales. They are the first tier of the local government system and are therefore the grass roots of our council system. They have a number of basic duties within the community including representing the whole electorate within the parish; delivering services to meet local needs; and striving to improve quality of life in the parish. They are responsible for providing a range of community services, such as: street lighting, local transport and traffic services, allotments, cemeteries, recreation grounds, war memorials, seating and shelters, rights of way and tourist information centres.

The parish council are notified of any planning applications or highway development planned for the area and on some occasions the councils approval is also needed for any work to go ahead.

The council can also make decisions and lobby the district council on areas that they are responsible for. For instance running more bus services or traffic calming issues, they can help local community projects and associations by providing grants.

However, the local community need to get involved and as a village we need to let the Parish Council know what we need and make them aware of any issues that need attending to.

The way that the council meetings work is that there is a space at the beginning of a meeting for the public to ask question or raise issues. We can also raise issues prior to a meeting or put an item forward to be considered at the next meeting. The agendas and calendar of meeting are placed around the village for all to see and can also be accessed through the village website (www.milbornestandrew.org.uk). This is a very basic run down of a Parish Council and it's responsibilities. The only way we can learn more is to visit the meetings and ask questions, listen to the decisions being made, hear what has become of The Village Plan and get involved. Because if we don't the Parish council will make the decisions for us as it is their job to do so.

The next meeting will take place on Wednesday 15th June at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. The agenda will be available on the website and all questions or queries should be directed in the first instance to the Clerk at Joyce Holman, The Old Fire Station, Pidney Hill, Hazelbury Bryan, DT10 2EB or cannonhill@btinternet.com





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### Lack of rain in Milborne St. Andrew

AFTER the very low rainfall of March, there was an even lower rainfall in April with a total of only 3.9 mm. This was 7% of the

average rainfall for April. The lowest April rainfall I have recorded was in 1984 with 2.3mm. The average temperature for April this year was 12.80°C which is some 3 degrees higher than average. April 2007 was exceptionally mild and dry and it was thought then that it would be a long time before we would have another April like that but this April has



matched it exactly with the same rainfall and temperature.

There were no air frosts in April at all but there may have been a ground frost in the lowest parts of the village on the 3rd. The combined rainfall for March and April this year was 22.10mm which is almost half as much of the rainfall we had in March and April of the drought year of 1976. There was a welcome 30.6mm rain over the three days 6/7/8th of May but the prospects for much more rain for the rest of May look slim at the moment.

There are periods during the year when the same weather pattern seems to repeat itself. These are known as singularities and one such singularity is a cold spell which usually occurs around the middle of May. There are four feast days for St. Mamertus, St. Pancras, St. Servatius and St. Boniface between 11th to 14th May and these have become known in Weather Lore as the 'Ice Saints' because of the damaging frosts that can occur at that time. Farmers across Northern Europe would delay the planting of vulnerable crops and shearing their sheep until after the 'Ice Saints' days. We certainly experienced colder winds and lower day temperatures during that period this year but escaped the air frosts, although it was approaching a ground frost on 12th of May.

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
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Dear Editor,

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### Piddle Wood - Blackhill -Turnerspuddle - Throop

A woodland and heathland walk of 4½ miles TO find the parking place, take the road from Milborne St. Andrew to Ashley Barn and under the A35. Turn left signposted Briantspuddle. Around the bend there is a turning left signposted to Roger's Hill Farm. Park on the grass verge about halfway down this road.

The footpath is on the right-hand side, up some steps. Over the stile and follow the track through the young plantation of trees. At the top turn left alongside the hedge. Follow the hedge until you see the edge of Piddle Wood over the other side of the hedge. There is a gap in the hedge here - even though efforts have been made to block it (it is illegal to block off paths).

Once over the other side take the track into Piddle Wood on your left. It is a well defined path. After about 300 metres you will cross over a hard road. Carry on ahead taking the good forestry track. You will soon pass the remains of an old shepherd's hut on your right.

After about 600-700 metres look out for a bridlepath sign off to the right. Take this path and follow it alongside a fence. The path soon drops down to a junction of paths. Turn right and continue uphill passing some derelict farm buildings.

Carry on straight ahead passing through two gates, and with views of Bere Regis on your left. Keep going straight ahead passing some old quarries on the way. You will soon see a reservoir off to your right through the trees. The path then drops downhill to a gate. Turn left and look out for a stile and footpath sign on your right. Turn right here and follow this path for about 650 metres as it winds its way around Blackhill Clump, a hill on your right.

Look out for a well defined path on your left and turn off here. Not very far down here (around 20-30 metres) you will come across a concrete structure about two foot high with a manhole cover on top of it. Continue along this lovely path passing through a kissing gate and on downhill to the lane. Turn right along the lane passing the Dairy House, and on to Turnerspuddle.

As you reach Turnerspuddle look out for the path off to the left. This path continues to Throop, crossing the River Piddle twice, via a ford and



footbridge on each occasion. Throop is a pretty little hamlet. As you reach the lane look out for a bridleway off to the right. Follow this lovely path for about 400 metres, until you come to a junction of paths. Turn left and then right onto a bridlepath heading up to Piddle Wood again.

Just before you reach the woods you will pass a chalk-pit on your right. Follow the path uphill through the wood for about 300 metres. The path levels out for a while but as you round a right-hand bend take the path on your left, uphill.

Follow this path, crossing the morning path, and continue on downhill to a wicket gate and on to the road that leads back to where you parked. Anne and Eric Snape



### In your Garden

## Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *Designer Gardens* **The Garden in June**

I DON'T know about you, but the flowers in the garden seem absolutely fantastic this year – my roses are completely covered in buds; they are going to make a lovely display. I'm sure the hard winter we had has helped. Hopefully it will have killed off a lot of the bugs too – especially the evil vine weevil.

It is always SO tempting to plant out those summer bedding plants too early, but now is a good time to get planting and putting out your hanging baskets. You should gradually introduce plants to the colder temperatures outside before planting. My greenhouse which was full of plants waiting to go out, is now home to tomatoes, cucumbers, chilli peppers and some tender herbs. I just love the smell of basil when you brush past it in the greenhouse. I have also grown some short marigolds to plant around my tomatoes to keep the whitefly away.

Now is the time to **prune** flowering shrubs such as Kerria japonica, Weigela, Viburnum tinus after they have finished flowers – in fact you should prune all those shrubs that have flowered **before** June. This will keep the plants looking good and ensure flowers for next year. **Wisteria** should be kept under control after it has flowered in the spring. It has been known to break iron bars, so a wooden pergola would stand no chance! Tie in the long, string-like tendrils and trim back to the main woody framework. Continue cutting back excess tendril growth until only a fraction of the summer growth remains.

Chopping back perennials in late May is known as The Chelsea Chop and is carried out around the time of the Chelsea Flower Show or just after. It can be a bit nerve-wracking if you haven't done it before and you see your precious plants nipped in the bud, but give it a go. Brunnera, sedum, rudbeckia, asters, heleniums and golden rod all

respond well to The Chop. Cutting back poppies, lupins, early flowering geraniums and foxgloves after they have flowered will promote new growth and a second flush of flowers later in the summer. Sedums are ideal candidates for the chop – it will stop that messy, irritating habit where the weight of the flowerheads causes the plant to flop open.

After you have cut down the plants don't forget to water and mulch them. For good repeat flowering the plants will need a richer food supply, but it is well worth the effort.

DO NOT however chop down those perennials that flower only once or you will lose the flowers – this applies to peonies, irises and aquilegias.

So where were the April showers – they

didn't appear in May either. OK the garden is looking great but we really could do with some rain. Spare a thought for the birds – thrushes, blackbirds and robins feed on worms and slugs and need to peck through the surface. They are feeding their young now and get most of the moisture they need through their food. You can help by keeping the bird bath full of water and if you have space dig over a patch of bare

soil to give them a chance to munch a bit of protein.

This meeting is arranged by Milborne St. Andrew Women's Institute, and is open for anyone to attend. The talk starts at 8.00pm.



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
