GP Surgery: Walk-in or booked? Is it working?

THE Reporter has had reports from village residents that the new arrangements for the walk-in surgeries, the delay before a booked GP appointment can be made, and the infrequent times that our local village surgery in Milborne St. Andrew is used, is causing

So we put these concerns to the Practice Manager, Sharon Hunt. She has responded to these questions for the magazine. She highlights that patients should always ring before attending a walk-in surgery to check that it is running, and that she did specify that surgeries are liable to change. She said that there has been a problem with the heating system in our village surgery, which has hampered opening and caused some cancellations, which she hopes will be rectified soon.

When asked about the long time to wait for a booked doctor's appointment, she agreed that the days closed over Christmas, together with holiday breaks for the doctors, have made the surgeries more busy, with more of a delay before being seen on a booked appointment. At the moment there is a delay of about three working days before a booked GP appointment is available. However, we have had reports of many longer waits - sometimes ten days - so this can obviously vary.

The Reporter would like to make clear that these questions do not reflect on the excellent standards of care from our local GP practice.

DO you ever go to the library van when it visits the village? You may not be aware that besides letting you have books for up to a month at a time you can also have CDs and story tapes. Once you are a member you can also download books to your computer, MP3 player, etc. via 'dorsetforyou'. You can also order books if you cannot find what you like on the library van, even new publications. The staff, on board, are very helpful and if the steps are a problem you can use the lift.



Now I like to read or listen to stories both fact and fiction so I am saddened when I hear people are being deprived of a free service offered by local councils. You will know that many are being closed; in fact the mobile library used to visit Milborne once a week! When cuts are being made the bean counters look at how many people use the service so I would like to see more villagers on the van. It's a good meeting place and somewhere to catch up on what is going on in the village.

The library van parks at the junction of Milton Road and Stileham Bank from 9.15 to 10am and from 10.05 to 10.30am at the Village Hall. It visits on Fridays once a fortnight, or as I remember it, the day after 'green box day'. The next visits are 10th and 24th February and 9th and 23rd March.

Do try it out or we may lose it and it's a lot cheaper than paying for books and downloads. You can also visit the 'Drop in Centre' at the village hall on Friday mornings where you will find coffee, computer advice and good company.

Mosaic: a very special charity – at the January WI

AT the start of any new year there seems to be a lot to look forward to: How about a day at the races? **Ascot** in June, five members have already expressed interest.

Shirley Dunkley has the **Lighthouse** programme which sounds promising. **May Fair** is on 19th May, the WI has offered to run a jarbola stall. Our **annual outing** is in the capable hands of June Maitland and discussion centred around Sherborne, with a visit to a local bakery included. **Annual dinner** will be on Friday 20th April – further details later.

An important note for your diaries: On Thursday 23rd February in the Village Hall from 9.30am, Shirley and June are raising funds for Denman College with a coffee morning. As well as providing cakes, we are all asked to recruit friends and neighbours. Hopefully, we will raise £100.

Katie Hensman came along to talk about the work of Mosaic, a registered charity which has been based at Coles Lane in the village for the last five years. Mosaic, one of a number of countrywide charities, works with bereaved children across Dorset, offering individual support to them and their families and giving them the opportunity to meet others in a similar position and share their experiences. The name "Mosaic" was chosen to represent putting all the pieces back together.

Statistically, every 22 minutes a child in Britain loses a parent, and such professional assistance before, during and after bereavement clearly helps the children to better understand the nature of loss. Mosaic is contacted initially by GPs, schools and other services. They provide training for professionals and courses for teachers. They put on social events for the children including residential weekends at Leeson House, Swanage, where they share experiences through play and organised workshops, all run by volunteers. There is some funding from Dorset County Council, but Mosaic has to rely mainly on its own fund-raising efforts.

Katie showed a film of one of their residential courses – very emotive, and clearly a very special charity. Members' donations of soft toys were well received, and we all hope they will be much loved by their recipients.

Our next meeting is, as always, on the second Thursday of the month. BUT on 9th February please do not turn up in the evening unless you wish to see the pantomime! Instead our meeting will start in the afternoon at 2.30pm, when Malcolm Angell will talk about Isaac Gulliver, Smuggler.



End of an Era at the Village Hall?

AFTER many years service Richard Lock has decided to step down from the Village Hall committee and has resigned his role as Chairman and Trustee. With one short break Richard has been a Trustee of the Village Hall for a number of years and Chairman since 2006. Richard's extraordinary success raising grant funding has undoubtedly transformed the Hall whilst the work he has done to improve the Hall and its facilities has been prodigious. He has devoted considerable time to maintain the quality of the Hall and grounds, undertaken many and various tasks ranging from litterpicking and cleaning to ensuring that the play equipment has significantly exceeded its normal life expectancy. Richard has been selfless in his devotion to the good of the Hall for the benefit of the Village and will be sorely missed from the committee. Richard's most recent legacy has been to register the Hall as a Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee Field which will preserve the Hall as an open space and help in attracting future grant funding.

The Village Hall Annual General Meeting will be held at the Hall on 25th April 2012. Until then Paul Tasker will act as Chairman of the Village Hall Trustees. Paul joined the Village Hall committee in April 2011 and was asked at that time to be vice-chairman. Paul and wife Wendy live in Coles Lane: they moved to the Village in 2009 when he retired from full time work in order to be with family who have been villagers for ten years.

Trustees for the Village Hall will be elected and re-elected at the AGM on 25th April 2012 and new, or indeed returning, volunteers are urgently needed to contribute to the ongoing development of the Hall as an amenity for us all. IN January we welcomed back the children for the spring term and also welcomed our new headteacher, Neil McDermott. Here are a few words of introduction from Neil:

"My first week as the new headteacher at Milborne St. Andrew

First School has flown by. The whole school community, governors, staff, parents and especially the children have made me very welcome. The first major task has been learning everyone's name, which I am quite proud to say I've achieved within the first week, although surnames may take a little longer. I am currently learning how the school operates day to day and at the same time beginning to map a way forward for the school.

"My first impressions are very positive. The children are eager every morning to enter school and begin their learning, which is evident in their smiling faces and the haste they show to get to school each day. Parental comments I have received about the school are very positive and the staff are committed and enthusiastic in providing enjoyable learning opportunities for the children. 

How shall we spend the money

OVER 20 years ago a fund was raised by public subscription and also some grants from local authorities to maintain the Obelisk on top of Weatherby Castle. The Obelisk was made safe and refurbished and the associated public right of way dedicated in January 1990.

The maintenance fund of the Obelisk had some funds left after the work and over the years has now grown to over £2,400. I have been in contact with various authorities on the status of the Obelisk which is on Mr Frampton's land. The Obelisk, which was built in 1761 by the Morton-Pleydells, is not listed nor is it a scheduled monument as far as I can ascertain, however, the structure is considered by those in conservation, such as English Heritage, Dorset County Council and North Dorset District Council as worth preserving for future generations, but is this what you want?

The sum of money the Parish Council is safeguarding was collected for the purpose of maintaining the Obelisk but the question I wish to put is do we still want to maintain that Obelisk?

The Obelisk cannot be seen unless you walk up to Weatherby Castle and look for it. It is hoped, with the co-operation and help of the landowner to open up the area around the structure to make it more visible from a long distance away, so that it can be better appreciated by the whole community and visitors to village and area. I can imagine that is how it was originally intended to be seen when it was constructed 251 years ago.

The amount of money available may not be enough to cover the cost of the maintenance work, this is still to be investigated.

If you have any views on this please let me know. I intend making a report to the Annual Parish Meeting in March or April on the views of the villagers to enable a decision to be made on this matter. Please note the Parish Council do not own this money but are holding it on your behalf. The decision on how it is to be spent must be made by the community at that meeting.

I hope you will let me have your comments.

The Milborne 10 – A village runners view

SUNDAY 8th January 2012. I will be 53 years old in just 12 days time. What am I doing at 10.30am on a Sunday morning running 10 miles (well, 9.97 miles)? I'm sure with a bit of imagination it could be the full ten, but near enough anyway.

This is the second time that I have run the Milborne 10 since I have lived in the village. It's a tricky run for lots of reasons. The first one is that it is very hilly. Secondly, it comes straight after the festive period, which means keeping the fitness up while everyone else is letting it go. The advantage of that of course is that now we are reaching the middle of January and everyone else is working out how to get back into shape, I don't have that worry.

Anyway, the run itself starts with everyone gathering on the roadside near the shop. I was chatting with Dave and Ann-Marie Pearson, the other two villagers in the run and all of a sudden, BANG. The starter pistol goes off. No warning and we are off out of the village towards Milton Abbas.

That first mile is always a tricky one as you try to get into your stride. By the time we reached the first turn, which is left towards Ansty I was feeling quite comfortable. However, I was mindful that there were big hills to come. The first one immediate and fairly steep, then a dip before a less steep one, almost designed to lull you into a false sense of security before turning the corner to face a mile long hill – up and up and up.

At last at the top having lost ground to many runners the stride could stretch out up to the right turn towards Hilton and another uphill, but a big boost as the five mile marker appears. This is ok, and the worst hill done. Now the best downhill – down and down into Hilton itself, stretching the stride ever wider to make the hill do the work. That's a tip I picked up many years ago and it works – try it!

The beauty of being a village runner in this 10 mile run is that I can train on the course or various sections of it and learn all the twists, turns, nuances and cambers in the road. I knew that the glorious view of Milton Abbey sat in its majestic setting was just over the next

hill. The scenery alone enough to spur me on, as it takes your mind off the aches and pains.

It's on the final big hill going past the school swimming pool and the big manor house when the twinges start. This is where a big push is needed. That is soon provided as the big downhill takes me down towards the lake. The field is well spread out by now, but there is a Dorset Doddler who just persists in overtaking me and he is at least 10 years my senior.

Now the final straight, still two miles, but I feel like home is beckoning to me. I remember when I finished the Great South Run in October last year in a time I was happy with, 83 minutes. I was asked by a friend if I ached the next day. When I said no, the retort was that I obviously didn't push it as hard as I could. Well, this was the time to do just that. I kicked in and went for it, past Hewish Farm then the one mile mark at Bagber, and all of a sudden a slight dip in pace. Come on Jim! I shouted to myself, dig in. I listened to myself and pushed again.

Into the village past the bottom of Coles Lane I looked at my watch. At first I thought it had stopped, but no I was beating my Great South time over a much more demanding course. More cause for pace, there she is, my lovely wife Karen shouting me in – whose the ugly bloke with her – oh, it's Mickey Tiss (sorry Mick!), and over the line – 80 minutes I think. I know it's not fast, but I was only running against me. The presence of the other runners does help with my own little competition though.

Count your blessings

The season of Lent begins later this month. Lent is the 40 or so days leading up to Easter during which Christians think about the challenges Jesus faced when he spent 40 days in the wilderness, being tempted by the devil. You'll find the story in both Matthew and Luke's Gospels.

For centuries, many Christians have marked this time by giving things up or living more simply, for instance, some people never eat meat during Lent, or give up chocolate or other indulgent treats. In recent years, some people have tried to adopt greener lifestyles in Lent, as a way of caring for God's creation, perhaps walking or cycling more and driving less.

Lent has also been marked as a time of penitence, when Christians look over their lives and address with God's help those parts of themselves that are less than beautiful. Through prayer, transformation can happen, and God can knock off the rough edges of our lives so that we become more like the one we follow.

Lent has also acted as an encouragement to take prayer more seriously, and perhaps undertake some devotional reading that wouldn't happen at other times of the year.

At heart, Lent is about recognising our dependence on God, which is what Jesus did when tempted by wealth and power. As part of that we might undertake acts of self-discipline or denial, times of confession and pay a greater attention to our spiritual lives.

Being dependent on God can also lead us to acknowledge our many blessings. The Bible shows many instances of people praising and thanking God for what they have. Alongside that, running through its pages, is a theme that no one can escape, if they take what they read seriously, that is, that blessings are not to be kept for oneself but shared with others.

Lent is a good time for us to become more aware of our blessings and what God has given us, and to share what we have. We may think we are badly off; compared with most of the world we have great riches. Those on the minimum wage in this country are among the top 11% earners worldwide.

So I invite you to share with me this Lent in Christian Aid's Count your Blessings campaign. For each day of Lent we are reminded of something we have or even take for granted, such as our access to food or ability to read and write, average life-expectancy or clean water. We are then asked to put aside a small amount of money to help others share in these blessings. At the end of Lent, the money put aside will be gathered up and sent to Christian Aid, an organisation that works with millions of poverty-stricken people each year.

The leaflets for this campaign will be available from any of our churches or from me, and will also be obtainable on the Web. It's something that everyone can join in with, regardless of whether you attend church or not. Money raised can be left at the Vicarage in Puddletown or with any churchwardens across the benefice, as long as it is clearly labelled so that we know what it is. There are separate, simpler leaflets for children, so they too can take part in ways appropriate for their age group.

I urge and encourage you to consider committing yourselves to Count your Blessings. The amounts of cash given each day are small, but it's amazing what a lot of small contributions can add up to, and make a real difference in the lives of others. Let's see how many of our blessings, things we so often take for granted, we can share this Lent. Sarah Killman

December 2011 Weather in Milborne St. Andrew

THERE were only three days in December without any recordable rainfall but on most days the rainfall was light and the total rainfall for the month was 88% of average at 103.3mm. 28.6mm of rain fell on the night of the 12th. The average temperature in December was 6.32°C (the average temperature for December 2010 was 0.35°C).

The year 2011 was the driest year in Milborne since 1983. The total rainfall for the year was 81% of average at 794.0mm. The lowest annual rainfall I have recorded in 41 years was in 1973 with 656.0mm. There was no snow in 2011 and it was the warmest year I have ever recorded with an average temperature of 11.42° C.

There is some concern about low ground water levels in southern England after two years of below average rainfall and the January rainfall so far has been lower than normal with little to indicate any large amounts of rain in the next week or so. The Mill stream through the village has finally started to flow after having been dry for some months. Although the Mill stream does cease flowing in dryer years, it is not a true winterborne stream. The flow of water must have been greater in the past as there were five operating water mills and two watercress beds between its source near Hilton to where it joins the Piddle south of Bere Regis. There is a watercress bed and a small water wheel near the source of the East Winterborne stream but apart from that there were no operating water mills or watercress beds on that stream from Winterborne Stickland to where it joins the Stour at Sturminster Marshall. 

No Waiting Cones

THIS message is to inform you of the withdrawal of provision of no waiting

As of 1st April 2012, Dorset Police will no longer provide no waiting cones and any requests you have should be directed through the local

highways authority responsible for the area concerned.

Traffic Management is the responsibility of the relevant Highways Authority or landowner. Dorset Police only has the authority to act in an emergency or extraordinary circumstances.

All people wishing to request no waiting cones can do so from the relevant local authority or purchase/hire their own (they would still need permission from the local highways authority to use them).

IS your New Year's resolution to get more involved in your community? Members of the public can do just that by signing up to be a Dorset Fire and Rescue Service volunteer.



I wonder if any of your readers may be able to help in my search for old milk bottles that were used for retailing milk between 1920 and 1975 and would have shown the retailers name and location printed on the bottle.

My hobby since retiring from a career in distribution within the milk industry is to research all dairies in Dorset, Somerset, Devon and Cornwall and locate them one by one in the hope I can find an example of the bottles they used. My focus at present is Milborne St. Andrew and environs.


Oh Dear! Here we go again! What a way to start the Festive season. Once again, anonymous critical comments, which do little to make harmony here.

Black Swan (15)



Arrests rise during Christmas drink drive campaign

The number of people arrested during this year's Christmas drink and drug driving campaign has increased by almost 50% compared to last year's campaign.

A total of 133 people were arrested during the campaign – which ran from Thursday 1 December 2011 to Sunday 1 January 2012. This is an increase of 48% compared to last year's campaign, where 90 people were arrested.

Of the 133 people arrested during this year's campaign, 113 were men and 20 were women. Over one third of all the people arrested – 45 drivers – were men under the age of 30.

A total of 31 drivers were arrested during the month-long campaign after they had been involved in a collision.

During the Christmas campaign there was an increase in traffic patrols and road-side checks. Also, every driver involved in a collision was breath tested, irrespective of whether they were suspected of drink driving or not.

Traffic Inspector, Matt Butler, said: "It is extremely disappointing that so many drivers risked their lives, and the lives of other road users, by choosing to drink and drive over the festive season. The number of Christmas drink and drug driving arrests has decreased year-on-year since 2006, so this increase is clearly disappointing."

Anyone wishing to report a crime should call on 101. Anyone wishing to report an incident in progress, that requires urgent Police action, for example suspicious circumstances happening *now*, should call 999.





Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of Designer Gardens

Making the most of Clematis

THE genus Clematis is a group of remarkably adaptable and beautiful plants. There is a clematis for every situation, every season, and every colour scheme.

To get the best from your clematis consider: the aspect – is it shady or sunny, when do you want it to flower, when should it be pruned and planting depth.

Clematis don't follow the normal rules for planting. They have to be buried much deeper than they were in the pot – about 7.5cm deeper. This will help to keep the roots cool and moist and if your plant is struck down with clematis wilt it will grow again from the base. Remember to plant away from the rain shadow of a house wall and keep the roots cool by shading with other plants or put a layer of pebbles at the base.



Remember to feed in early spring with Vitax Q4 or a rose fertiliser and always water in dry weather.

Clematis do require a little bit of maintenance but it really isn't as daunting as it is made out to be — as long as you know when your

clematis flowers you will be able to prune it successfully. Basically there are three main groups when it comes to pruning:

Group 1 are the early flowering varieties such as Clematis Montana, the macropetala and alpina varieties. You



don't need to prune any clematis in this group, but if they get too big and unruly, prune immediately after flowering normally late spring/early summer. Depending on how hard you prune, you may not get as many flowers the following year but the plant will soon recover. These are strong plants and will clamber over all sorts of supports and grow through old trees and even tall conifers.

Group 2 are the large flowered hybrids that flower in May and June. They need to be pruned in late winter/early spring and after the first flush of flowers in summer. To do this, tidy up the growth by removing any dead or weak stems and prune back to a healthy bud. This should leave you with a plant that is between 80cm–1.2m high. It is a good idea to prune some of the stems (ie two or three) to about 30–60cm above soil level so that fresh growth is encouraged from the base.

Group 3 clematis (the viticella and texensis varieties) produce flowers from the current season's growth, they are the easiest to maintain and the ones I use most in the garden. In a small garden they are ideal because you cut them hard back each year to about 30cm above soil level and so they never get too big. They can be grown successfully with other climbing plants, through shrubs and roses prolonging the season of interest and providing you with flowers spring, summer and autumn.

I always love to see clematis grown in combination with other plants and here are some suggestions: Grow a late flowering Clematis tangutica through an early flowering shrub such as Ceanothus, Cotinus or Garrya elliptica. The yellow flowers of the clematis will give the shrub a bit of late summer interest when its flowers have finished; or combine colours by planting with shrubs or climbers that flower at the same time eg: Clematis texensis 'Etoile Rose' with Buddleia or Rosa 'Falstaff'. Clematis varieties that look amazing when grown together are Clematis 'Ville de Lyon' with Clematis 'Comtesse de Bouchaud' and Clematis 'Jackmanii Superba' a wonderful confection of crimson, pink and purple.


Coaches still required for the Minis
