


Thank you Jo and Kate

A lifetime of service

I am writing this letter in the week in which the country remembered the accession to the throne of Princess Elizabeth. Though that date has now passed, the whole of 2012 is going to be full of reminders of her 60 years as ruler of this nation.

Whatever we think of royalty, no one can doubt the way in which the Queen has given her life to fulfilling her rôle in the best way that she knows. Her future changed dramatically on the day her father died, and since then she has never wavered publicly in her devotion to her calling. Though she will have known for many years that she was likely to accede to the throne, that moment came far sooner than she had hoped.

The Queen makes no secret of her Christian faith, and in recent years has been more explicit about its place in her life. She takes the service of Christ to others as an example for how she lives her life and serves her people.

Service is not a popular concept these days. Though individuals can and do serve their neighbours and communities, I think as a whole our society has become much more about rights than service. There is a desire to fight for me and mine, and less of a sense of offering ourselves to others. This is somewhat at odds with the values of the Christian faith.

For instance St Paul writes in one of his letters (I'm quoting from a modern translation): "It is absolutely clear that God has called you to a free life. Just make sure that you don't use this freedom as an excuse to do whatever you want to do and destroy your freedom. Rather, use your freedom to serve one another in love; that's how freedom grows. For everything we know about God's Word is summed up in a single sentence: Love others as you love yourself. That's an act of true freedom." (Galatians 5.13)

And the first letter of Peter advises: "Most of all, love each other as if your life depended on it. Love makes up for practically anything. Be quick to give a meal to the hungry, a bed to the homeless – cheerfully. Be generous with the different things God gave you, passing them around so all get in on it." (1 Peter 4.8–10)

And, of course, we have the words of Jesus himself: "Whoever wants to be great must become a servant. Whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not to be served."

Christians have a long and noble tradition of serving others in a huge variety of ways. It is something that continues today. The more people serve each other, I am convinced, the happier and healthier our society will be.

We have a monarch who has committed herself to her people. She follows a Master who gave his life for many. And why? The words of 17th-century poet John Donne explain one motivation for this: "No man is an island entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent . . . any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind." The language is old-fashioned, but the meaning is clear. We are part of a greater whole. God created us to live alongside others as part

of what it is to be human. We can all benefit from the way in which we serve others, since we are all connected.



Did you get a little bit of curious paper through your door?

IT may have had a couple of little boxes at the bottom to choose from and a date by which it had to be returned.

Did you know what it was about?

As a village we have to say who makes the decisions about our community. Every District Council has given each of their community councils (like our Parish Council) three options. The Options in essence are:

Option 1: The District Council has a strong steer (i.e. we can put our views, but Council makes all the decision), which is how it is at the present.

Option 2: The District Council has a steer, but not quite so strong – this one is difficult to differentiate from above.

Option 3: The District Council has a light touch in decision making; the decisions are locally based, in the village.

Options 2 and 3 give the village more influence.

Option 3 – means a lot of work. An environmental statement is needed. And this would have to be paid for by the village – although pressure would be put for extra funds. The North Dorset planners would give guidance all through this process. The localism agreement has to be agreed by the community, there would have to be a consensus among the population, evidenced in some way, ending up with a village referendum if Option 3 is chosen. If agreed by referendum, only then would it be adopted and made legal.

The decision or answer has to be returned to North Dorset District Council by the end of February and, more importantly, it has to be seen that this is the community's wishes, not just the Parish Council's. That is why you all had that curious bit of paper.

When all the decisions from across the district are returned, there is a count up, and the majority choice will be used across the area. Therefore, if we voted for Option 3, but all the other councils voted for Option 2, that would then be imposed upon us.

This is the "localism bill" decision making in action.

At the Parish Council meeting in January, the village residents were invited to ask questions and put views to which our councillors did their best to answer. For instance:

- What about boundary changes? Answer The plan is 10 years old, and expired last year, it may or could be expanded it has already been indicated that we will be pressurised to have 60 houses built in the next 10 years. Any plan would include industrial, housing, medical centres, etc. It would be up to the Parish Council to identify an area or location (also approaching the land owner), specify size.
- Opinion from a member of the public Option 3 is better, the structure would try and block unwanted development. But we need professional help from community members.
- Any newbuilds must be low cost housing But there is no commitment from the localism meeting about this; they were only talking about rental. But the problem with low cost housing is that there is no guarantee that locals will move in. And there is no safeguard that they will not be sold on at a great profit. Also residents are stuck with car travel and buses are bad. So how are these people going to get to work? The costs of having frequent buses is too much to be subsidized.
- Suggestion Look at Community Land Trust. Melcombe Bingham has just had a meeting about this. Land is bought by the village, the village builds the houses, and they then have control about who moves in. Lots of hoops to jump through. If bought, there is a problem with getting a mortgage as the land remains in the community land trust.

Wednesday Club learns about One man and his dog

ON Wednesday 1st February Derek Williams and his dog Dundee visited from the charity, Dogs for Deaf People. Derek suffered severe hearing loss from his time working with guns in the Navy.

The charity was started in 1982 and at present 150 dogs a year are trained to become Hearing Dogs. Many more are needed.. Apparently Labradors are mainly used but other breeds can be trained too. The charity breed their own dogs but also look for suitable dogs in rescue centres. Once trained they are registered as Assistance Dogs and wear a coat and

lead with a reflective label to alert people to the fact that they are Hearing Dogs.

The training is intense and covers general socialising, sound training and time to bond with the dog's recipient. If the dog is not suitable for the purpose at the end of the training they are called 'Fallen Angels' and because they are so well trained there is a long list of people wanting them as a pet.

Derek told us that Dundee, a West Highland Terrier is trained to hear sounds and alert Derek. eg. if the front door bell rings, he will come to Derek and put his paws on his knee and take him to the door. Other sounds he is trained to hear include smoke alarms, cooker timers, fire alarms, carbon monoxide alarms and alarm clocks. All dogs are trained to 'Call Papa' which means that if the deaf person is needed eg. a child needs it's deaf mother then the dog will go and get the mother and take her to her child.

We saw a short dvd showing how Hearing Dogs have completely changed the lives of their human recipients enabling them to live independent happy lives.

While Derek spoke Dundee visited everyone in the audience for a cuddle. We all enjoyed Derek's presentation which was extremely informative with lots of amusing anecdotes!

To finish Derek has said that I can print this poem that he read to us, by an unknown author and will be special to all dog lovers !

When God made the Earth and sky,

The flowers and the trees. He then made all the animals, And all the birds and bees. And when his work was finished, Not one was quite the same, He said 'I'll walk this land of mine, And give each one a name'. And so he travelled land and sea, And everywhere he went, A little creature followed him, Until his strength was spent. When all were named upon the earth, And in the sky and sea, The little creature said 'Dear Lord, There's not one left for me.' The Father smiled and softly said, 'I've left you 'til the end.



I've turned my own name back to front, And called you DOG, my friend!'





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Help is at hand to switch to digital TV



TV is switching to digital all over the UK and in March 2012 the traditional TV signal will be switched off in the Meridian region. If you don't have digital TV by the time of switchover, you will lose your TV channels.

The BBC-run Switchover Help Scheme is concerned

that no-one is left with a blank screen after the switchover and offers practical help for older, disabled and registered visually impaired people to convert one TV set to digital, including installation of the easy -to-use equipment, a demonstration of how to use it and 12 months of aftercare service including a free helpline.

Eligible people have been sent a Help Scheme information pack through the post explaining the help available. Most people will be asked to pay £40 towards the standard option of help, but for some in receipt of benefits it will be free of charge.

- You are eligible for the Help Scheme if you are:
- aged 75 or over, or
- live in a care home (for six months or more), or
- receive (or could get):
- Disability Living Allowance (DLA), or
- Attendance or Constant Attendance Allowance, or
- ♦ Mobility Supplement, or
- registered blind or partially sighted

There is already extensive TV coverage about the Help Scheme and eligible people will receive an information pack but to get the help they are entitled to they MUST respond to the letter.

January 2012 Weather in Milborne St. Andrew

JANUARY 2012 was another dry month with 54.6mm of rain which was 50% of the average rainfall for January. This was the sixth consecutive month with lower than normal rainfall. Rainfall over the last 12 months has been around half of the amount of rain that fell in the equivalent period of the very wet year of 2000. January 2012 was the 8th warmest January in the last 41 years in Milborne and garden plants and crops were well advanced for the time of year; that is until the 27th January when much colder weather from the north east swept across the country bringing snow and severe frosts. There was a minimum air temperature in Milborne of -10° C on the 3rd February which brought that early crop development to an abrupt halt. February has been colder than January in Milborne in 19 years out of the last 41.

There is an old saying from Rutland which proved to be true this year;

"If birds begin to whistle in January, frosts to come"

Have You Met... Pat Shipton

PAT was born in Havant, Hampshire, although she only lived there a few weeks. She was the third child, all of who were under two as they moved to Hayling Island – just across the water. In 1934 they moved to Folkestone, then as the war came they, as Pat said, "Went all over the place". Her father volunteered for service in 1939 he had also served in the 1914-18 war.

Pat continues: My schooling matched our moving about, a CofE school, a Convent, a Methodist school then a state school! In 1940 my parents decided that if we were going to be killed we were all going together, and we moved to East Anglia where my father was in the RAF. We missed a year of school in the war; all the schools in our area had been evacuated. My father went to the Commanding Officer to get permission to go to Bishops Stortford to find a school, he advised my father to go to Ely police station to find a school instead. That resulted in my brother going to Soham, my sister and I used to cycle then bus to Ely High School.

In 1944, at 17½ years old, I went into the Wrens, I had left school, but had to wait four days for my father to come home before I volunteered, he had to sign the agreement. My service started up in Orkney, then Rosyth, then Lowestoft, RNB Chesham then home. I was in the Wrens for 3½ years.

When I came out of the Wrens I went up to London to work travelling daily from Folkestone (the family home). I finally got a flat in London where I worked for a chartered secretary, then for ITV as a book-keeper secretary, then for Austin Reed, not measuring the inside leg – in the office. There were actually Reeds in the firm at that time. All my jobs were in that sphere.

I met George (my husband) whilst I was working for an electrical contractor doing work at Sainsburys, which is where George was working. We married in 1962, and moved to Bishops Stortford where we bought a house. We started our own business in Southgate, North London, heating, plumbing and electrical contractors in about 1963, but changed our trade to move to Braishfield, Hampshire, taking over a Post Office/Village Store in 1974.

We retired in 1987 to the bungalow just outside Milborne St. Andrew. We had bought the site in 1983 as the land was up for sale with just a pair of wooden houses that hadn't been lived in for 20 years. They may have looked like sheds, but they weren't! There was hawthorn and bramble up to the telephone cables, George lost me one day – I was up on the roof taking off the roof tiles. We had already designed the bungalow, called Rangemore (as that is where George was born), but it took us four years to sort it out. We had wonderful wildlife, deer and rabbits – so we had to wire up the vegetable patch! George died in 2005; I moved down into the village two years ago and brought the house name down here with me.



What do I like about Milborne St. Andrew – it's far enough away from the family not to have knocks on the door all the time, though I really value their visits. I also like living here because it is country. And dislike about Milborne St. Andrew – The infrequent buses. And it would be lovely to have the old fashioned butchers and the old

fashioned bakers. But I'm thankful we've got what we have.

My hobbies – I like knitting and am quite quick at it (I would say very quick, Pat was wearing a jumper that took three weeks to knit – I take three years! Sue) I like gardening, but I'm not keen on raking the lawn! I enjoy WI for companionship, and the speakers, the county meetings are also great, Anne Widdecombe came last time.

Claim to fame – I am the last female born in my family, all the nine births since me have been boys, the last one being five years ago. The eldest is 62.

During our time living in the village we were both on the Village Hall Committee, George was in the chair for a while, at the time when there was a big fund raising campaign for the new roof! We were also involved with the Wednesday Club, he was chair and I was secretary when it ran every fortnight. I am involved with Dewlish Ladies Group, formerly a WI as well (11 years ago).

TV programme – I don't like soaps, but do like quizzes, like Pointless. *And finally my Pet Hates* – cats and dogs calling cards, especially in the garden!

Jane Eyre (2011) (15)

THE young Jane Eyre (Amelia Clarkson) is raised by her cruel aunt Sarah (Sally Hawkins) after her parents die of typhus. She is packed off to Lowood, a charity school run by the harsh and hypocritical Mr Brocklehurst (Simon McBurney). There she suffers greatly at the hands of the cold, unusually strict administration until her education is completed and Jane (Mia Wasikowska) arrives at Thornfield to take up a post as governess. There she is treated with kindness and respect by housekeeper Mrs. Fairfax (Judi Dench) and is intrigued and attracted to her employer Rochester (Michael Fassbender). Their prickly interviews are laced with swirling undercurrents of pretence and goading. Happiness seems to have found Jane at last, but could Mr. Rochester's terrible secret be about to destroy it forever?

Both Janes are compelling, with Amelia Clarkson playing the younger Jane and stoically taking undeserved punishments, whilst Ms. Wasikowska's older Jane manages to withstand the strong crosswinds of feeling and the buffeting of unfair circumstances without self-pity, but also without saintly selflessness. Due to the recent number of vehicle crimes we have had in January, please consider the following crime prevention points

- Thatcham approved alarms and immobilisers are an excellent deterrent.
- Don't leave anything on display it's a prime invitation to passers-by. Even an old coat or plastic bag can tempt a thief. If items have to be left in the car, put them out of sight at the start of your journey.
- Portable 'sat-nav' systems are often held in a cradle attached to the windscreen or dashboard in full view, so take it out of the car and place the cradle out of sight in the car boot.
- Cradles alone indicate to offenders that vehicles have 'sat-nav' systems, so ensure that you remove all traces by wiping off the suction marks from the windscreen.
- Property mark the 'sat-nav' with your postcode and house name or number. Make a note of the make, model and serial number and register it free of charge on the National Property Register at www.immobilise.com.
- Get a music system that's removable or has a front that can be taken off and remove iPods and MP3 players.
- Driving documents and personal correspondence could help a thief to sell your vehicle or provide a cover story if stopped by the police do not keep these in your vehicle.
- Some car thieves break into houses to steal car keys. Always keep the keys in a safe place. Don't leave them in the hallway or kitchen, as these are the obvious places a thief will look.
- Alloy wheels should be secured with locking wheel nuts, which have been tested to withstand attack and meet Category 4 Thatcham approval.
- Steering wheel locks, which have been tested to withstand attack and meet Category 3 Thatcham approval, should be applied every time you leave your vehicle.
- Number plates should be secured with one-way security screws, to prevent them being removed and used in crime.
- If you have a garage at home, use it. If you don't, try to park in a welllit open place.
- Look for public car parks that are part of the police approved 'Park Mark' Safer Parking Scheme.

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In your Garden Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *Designer Gardens* Plants for Damp Shade

DO you have one of those awkward little corners or an area of your garden that is damp and shady and you just don't know what to grow? Sometimes damp shade can be easier to manage than dry shade – at least you don't have to keep mulching and watering – and shade doesn't have to completely limit your plant choices. Think of what grows well in woodland areas and you will start to see what you can put in your own garden.

In a shady garden, foliage and texture play a large part in your

planting design – flowers are fleeting and secondary. Try combining plants with similar foliage colour but with contrasting leaf shapes and textures. For example the same colour is repeated in the grass Hakonechloa macra 'Aureola' and the magnificent large leaves of Hosta 'Sum & Substance'. Of course, all hostas love the damp shade but sadly die down in the winter.

Personally, I like to see something in the garden all year round and ferns fulfil this role admirably. One I particularly like is called *Polystichum setiferum* and is evergreen. You could plant this with a tree fern *Dicksonia*

antartica (but protect the crown in the winter with some fleece), and underplant with Euonymus 'Emerald Gaity' for a lighter foliage colour. This can then be interspersed with some flower colour from spring bulbs, primulas, Iris pseudoacorus, Aquilegia (Granny's Bonnet), foxgloves, astrantia and later in the year Fuchsias, Japanese anemones and asters. There you are – no longer a damp, horrible corner of the garden.

Fatsia japonica with its large architectural leaves grows well in the shade and looks decidedly tropical when planted with Chamaerops humilis and bamboo. All of these will also survive a very hard frost. Other plants for shade that you might like to consider are the

evergreen honeysuckle *Lonicera 'Mint Crisp'* with very attractive foliage, *'Holboellia latifolia'* a lovely well-behaved evergreen climber with scented flowers early in spring; ground cover perennials *Geranium macrorrhizum and Pulmonaria saccherata* with its spotted leaves and pink flowers provide a bit more interest and there are many shrubs to choose from such as hydrangeas, Viburnum, Mahonia that all need shade to thrive.

On the pruning front – now is the time to

prune deciduous berberis and cotoneaster if they are overgrown. Prune wisteria shoots shortened in summer to two or three buds from the base of last year's growth. Cut rose bushes back by between a third and a half and cut out any dead, diseased or dying material, and pull off any suckers. Late summer and autumn flowering clematis should be pruned this month to the lowest pair of healthy buds – this will avoid a mass of heavy top growth and promote flowering.

The bus will run between the villages of Milborne St. Andrew, Winterborne Stickland, Milton Abbas and Winterborne Whitechurch. The service is open to anyone from mothers and dads with toddlers to those with limited mobility. The bus is equipped to take wheelchairs. No age restrictions.

Corfe now had to push forward and almost got a consolation goal but the returning Nick Gregg was equal to the one on one situation saving with his legs to keep another clean sheet.

This was an excellent contest between the top two teams played in a sporting manner with Corfe's keeper having an outstanding afternoon despite conceding three goals.
