Wind Farm Exhibition - Eyewitness

Lots of faces, many familiar - but equally many unknown - but nearly all of them village residents, viewed the exhibition and presentation from West Coast Energy about "Milborne Wind Farm". There was a strong feeling from some of the 60 present that it is misnamed, as it is not within the Milborne St Andrew village boundary at any point, and is, as their literature informs, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from us. This fact was repeatedly put forward to the two representatives, Matt Hayes and Steve Salt, during the exhibition time and also at the questions following the presentation. They said that a site has to be named, and they chose Milborne. They acknowledged that it could be changed, but gave no assurances that this would happen.

Many of the people who turned up had concerns, some about noise, some about the height and intrusive view of the turbines, others about the effect on house prices and some about the actual concept of land-based wind turbines. One questioned the statistics used by the company, saying they were unreliable and querying how much of the other information could be trusted.

The views of villagers who attended were overwhelmingly against the proposal – although there was one couple who spoke in favour of the wind farm – and it could be said that those 'for' or ambivalent towards it may not have attended and therefore the evening did not reflect the village as a whole. But upon being asked if any planning consent would be swayed by public opinion, the West Coast Energy representative emphasised that conse`nt or refusal would be on environmental issues . Issues raised were as follows:

Noise: WDDC have scrutinised noise levels day and night and believe that this will be heard within a

400-500m radius of the farm but it is said that it will mainly be masked by 'background' noise i.e. cattle/sheep/traffic/wind in trees. The latter will produce the greatest sound when the wind is strongest! The level will be 60 decibels diminishing over a 1½ mile radius. The site will be 80m away from bridleways.

Disruption: 90 exceptional loads may be travelling through six villages including MSA at 'off peak' periods. Other routes were proposed by the audience. WCE were 'confident' that, with a police escort this traffic would be able to get through MSA.

Benefits The electricity projected to be generated could power 14000 households. The £25million outlay producing millions of pounds worth of profit will generate an amount for community benefit. We were told that the 'community' would share in the profits that were not material to the planning process. They want us to share profits and to this end one of the ten turbines would be a community turbine and the net profits would go to a wider community.

Height It was pointed out that at 415ft they would be taller than Salisbury cathedral spire

Next step is to present the planning application to WDDC by the end of the year. NDDC will be informed, but will not make the final decision. We were told to contact WDDC councillors to make our views and opinions known.

And quietly sat in the front row was Hannah Smith from NDDC, a Senior Planning Officer. Hopefully she went away better informed, both about the wind farm, and about the village.

West Coast Energy (WCE) say the site is ideal since it benefits from a very good wind resource and they claim there would be no unacceptable ecological impacts or effects to bird life, geology or archaeology. There are no statutory designations, such as AONB or SSSI, on the proposed site and WCE say the proposals would meet all nationally recommended noise limits. The company plans to use existing farm tracks, thereby reducing the need to build a complete network of access roads.

A partnership body with a local mandate would be sought to formulate a legal agreement with WCE to ensure that the 10% profit is used for community benefit. This could be as much as £7m over the 25 year life of the scheme, if the estimates of energy generation are achieved. Parish Council Business—the important bits

- <u>Planning application land adj. Bramble Cottage</u>: objections to this remain due to their previous terms including the possible ingress of foul sewage.
- Fox View: naming of new development in Little England: It was now felt to be too late to object but some puzzlement expressed over the origin of this choice.
- <u>Localism Act</u>: PC can now vote on members' declaration on issues whereas before this had to go to the Monitoring Officer to grant a dispensation. It was felt that decisions had to be made on a procedure for this. It had to be done within four days in writing. The Proper Officer i.e. the Parish Clerk would be the arbiter.
- <u>Council Tax</u>: Those exempt i.e. the elderly and vulnerable, will be subsidised by others. Second homes will pay 100% tax whilst those left empty will pay 150%. This is a political issue. The comment was made that this was a " return to the Poor Law" to which there was no response from the NDDC present.
- <u>Trees</u>: In the first week of November, 60 trees will be delivered for the proposed Jubilee Wood in response to the PC's application. The planting will be a community event including members of the Sports Club as it will be on their land. Some publicity will be given to this event. Mrs Maitland has offered to provide stakes. There was further discussion about sponsoring trees by individuals, clubs and families with plaques attached. For the latter the Clerk said there was still Jubilee funding. There was discussion over the acceptability of all native trees. A proposal was also made to have a Community Orchard on the allotment site.

<u>Snow/grit bins</u>: The Highways Dept will be conducting a survey of grit bins designating them either 'strategic' or 'community'. If the former they will fill and fund if the latter the community should pay.

War Memorial site: A member of the public had drawn attention to the parlous state of the chain link fence and posts. A decision was made to get three quotes for work to be done to provide a more ornamental chain, new posts and for 'dipping' the chain as the site was considered to be of utmost importance and if the barrier was removed locals would possibly ride and trample on the grass

destroying the memorial. The quote to include reduction of the willow tree which overhangs the millennium stone. The Clerk will attend to this, possibly from the Forge at Puddletown.

- <u>Bus2Go</u>: Their Grant application to the PC for £250 included finance for specific trips next summer to subsidise fares. After some discussion the Council awarded £150 as they wished to leave an amount to budget for possible further applications.
- <u>Fireworks</u>: The PC requested all firework parties to practice consideration about the firing of rockets and their direction as the owner of a thatched cottage found 20 spent rockets in their garden. This was particularly relevant with Halloween and Guy Fawkes night on the horizon.



Milborne St. Andrew First School Learning together, playing together; all for one, one for all **School News**





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New Brooms - at the September WI

TERRY HEARD of Dorset Coppicing is clearly a man who enjoys his work! Cheerful, weatherbeaten and a practised communicator, he Michael King will talk about the 'History of Sherborne'. Please join gave us an overview of his work in coppicing. Amongst the many samples of traditional woodland crafts on display, Terry had brought along his own scale model showing the different stages of coppicing, as well as numerous examples of tools from his extensive collection. He explained that coppicing had been practised in British woodlands for centuries, and he himself, locally born and bred, had worked in the industry for almost 40 years. By using a rotational cutting sequence there would be coppice at various different stages of regeneration within the woodland. Wood is then produced for a variety of uses. A description of how to make charcoal using kilns, over a 3-day period, was particularly fascinating.

Terry's range of products include bean poles, pea sticks, pegs, walking sticks and even a Harry Potter inspired magic wand (a big seller with small boys..). He demonstrated the making of a besom broom, an extremely efficient method of cleaning both house, yard and lawn - (Terry's wife likens it favourably to a Dyson, so no small praise!) Some brooms quickly found a ready home with members, another was donated to our raffle and Shirley Dunkley was the lucky winner. Shirley thanked Terry for his delightful and informative talk. We shall keep our eyes open for him at country shows in Dorset.

After the summer break, there has been little time wasted by the Skittles team and Nelda was very pleased to report we had already won our first match. She asked for volunteers willing to be reserves - no experience necessary, a great time guaranteed.

There are various events coming up, including a seasonal concert in December by the Casterbridge Male Voice Choir in the Village Hall. Shirley will give further details later. After last year's successful Christmas meal at the Cygnets restaurant in Weymouth, names are being taken for a re-run.

Wednesday Club Special Meeting—5th September 2012.




Then comes all the money that is being wasted on the Olympic games. Not everybody supports this nonsense as can

You will be sad to hear that Pat Tribe, Milborne's much loved Church Warden has died and that her funeral took place on Thursday 23rd August.

Always a no-nonsense and terribly

organised sort of person Pat left precise instructions for her funeral. They were written in her beautifully neat handwriting on a small piece of white paper. "I want to be buried in the churchyard" was followed by a short list of hymns and music and at the bottom she had written in capitals "ABOVE ALL I WANT NO FUSS! "

It was typical of her. She had no idea just how many folks wanted to celebrate her life. At her funeral there were 160 people. It was a tribute to how many lives she had touched. We sang 'O God our help in ages past' and 'O Lord my God, when I in awesome wonder'. We read together her favourite psalm, number 121 and listened to a reading from 1 Thessalonians 4.

Pat was born in West Sussex and had one younger brother Peter. She trained to teach at the Bishop Otter College in Chichester, and her first school was up north in Washington. She later moved to Dorset teaching first at Sandford primary school as deputy head before she became head teacher of Corfe Castle primary school. She lived in East Stoke and later in Wool but 31 years ago she moved to Milborne where she spent the rest of her life.

Pat was an independent strong-minded woman and she kept going when many of us would have given up, refusing lifts to the hospital for chemotherapy and even managing to drive herself to church on the Sunday before she died. She was a deeply committed Christian and worked tirelessly for St Andrew's Church. In her time here she undertook nearly every job from church warden, PCC secretary, bell ringer, flower arranger, cleaner, fund raiser, flag raiser, 'rook scarer', spring cleaner, seamstress, and all those other unnoticed tasks done behind the scenes. A tireless fund raiser for church, she would be seen selling her apple pies at the Christmas fayre, or behind the bric-a-brac stall at fetes, always making things to sell. She even found time to get her head around funding applications and was instrumental in finding the funding for our present toilet project.

Pat's main love was nature and wildlife. She kept a beautiful small cottage garden packed full of plants and was a member of the Gardening Club. When the Dorset Wildlife Trust introduced the Living Churchyard scheme she persuaded the PCC that it was important to have wildlife areas. She then set about introducing wild flowers and organised working parties to look after the churchyard.

Pat, before her illness, was very fit and you could see her striding out across the countryside. Although she didn't like sport much she rode her bike everywhere, and each September did the Dorset Historic Churches sponsored bike ride until she was no longer fit enough to cycle between the churches when she walked instead!

Her love of children meant that after retiring from teaching she helped out at play group and then Ladybirds and was a great help when the Beaver group began in the village.

In her spare time Pat was learning Greek, played the recorder with the Purbeck Recorder Consort and sang with several choral societies. She even had a go at pot-holing! She had a City and Guilds in quilt making and produced many beautiful quilts. She was a member of the sewing group and even when she was very ill organised an exhibition of work in the village hall to raise money.

Pat lived life to the full, did not waste a minute and was an example to us all. Sarah Godfrey

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July & August 2012

July was another extraordinary month of this

extraordinary year. The highest July rainfall I had recorded up to this year was 114.7mm in 1978 but this was already exceeded by the 7th July this year and the total rainfall for the month was 325% of average at 162.1mm. There was an exceptionally wet day on the 7th with 62.0mm of rain which was the highest daily rainfall for 12 years and will almost certainly be the highest daily rainfall this year. The springs broke out in the Milton Road on 14th July and, whilst this may have occurred before in July, it has not occurred in July in living memory. The Milton Road springs usually break out toward the end of an exceptionally wet winter so the water table is now at a level comparable with that. There was a dramatic change on 23rd July when hot and dry weather persisted for a week and a maximum day temperature of 34C was reached on 25th which will be the hottest day of this year. In spite of that week of higher temperatures, the average temperature for the month was a degree or so below the long term average for Milborne and the Central England Temperature was 1.2C below the 30 year mean. It was a dull July with sunshine levels at 81% of the 30 year mean.

August rainfall did not break any records but the month's total of 114.5mm was 168% of average. There were some warm periods during the month with some hot days which made it a more normal August for temperatures. Sunshine nationally averaged 167 hours which was around 86% of the mean for August.


There has been a trend towards slightly higher summer (Jun-Aug) rainfall over the last 20 years with the wettest summers becoming increasingly wetter. I list below the 5 wettest summers over the last 41 years.

 1974 = 259.9mm
 1980 = 278.7mm
 1997 = 296.8mm

 2007 = 300.7mm
 2012 = 444.7mm
 1997 = 296.8mm

It is difficult to imagine a wetter summer than that of 2012. Pluvius.







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5 mile circular walk from Hilton

Parking is limited in Hilton so please park carefully. THE church can be seen on the south side of the road, so with the church on your left walk towards Ansty for about 150 metres and turn right into The Knapp. Follow the lane for a short while then turn left towards Manor Farm, this is a tarmac surface. When you reach Manor Farm take the bridleway straight ahead.

Continue for about 700 metres to a barn. Pass through the gates into an arable field which has a good path through it (it is oilseed rape this year). Ahead of you at the end of this field you can see some more farm buildings. When you reach them bear off to the right and pass through the gate ahead of

you. The path now bears to the left and climbs uphill for about 400 metres, before turning slightly right-handed to head for another gate. Go through this gate and head for the gate in the top corner of the field to your left. You will see a small wind turbine over the hedge to your right. The path now levels out and continues for 500



metres to the Bulbarrow Road. Turn right onto the road and walk for 300 metres until you come to the entrance to Bulbarrow Farm.

Turn right here and follow the bridleway, passing the Timber Yard on your left. Continue along the good track passing Bulbarrow Farm and further on Hill Barn. There is a memorial here in this barn to a young man called Mark Batchelor.

Ahead of you there are two gates. Take the left hand one into a field; with the hedge on your right continue along the edge of the fields until you reach a wicket gate (approx 1km). This is the entrance to a Nature Reserve. The path through here can be a bit overgrown at times. After leaving the Reserve the track enters woodland called Horse Park Plantation.

The path through the woods is steep at times and can be muddy in wet weather. Please take great care. It may be better to wait for the weather to improve.

When you reach the bottom of the wood you come out onto the road opposite Milton Abbey. Turn right along the road back to Hilton (1.25km). There are some beautiful views through this walk. Please wear good walking shoes or walking boots.

Warm raspberry cupcakes with orange sugar drizzle

Ingredients

200g self-raising flour 2 tsp baking powder 200g unsalted butter , softened 4 eggs 200g caster sugar 3 tbsp milk 50g ground almonds zest of 1 medium orange 150g punnet raspberries , lightly crushed, plus extra to decorate FOR THE SUGAR CRUST



juice of 1 medium orange 4 tbsp caster sugar

Method

- Heat oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas 4. Line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper muffin cases. Tip the first 8 ingredients into a large bowl and beat with electric whisk until smooth. Fold the crushed raspberries through the batter.
- Divide the batter between the cases (they should be about half full) and bake for 20-25 mins or until golden and just firm. Make the topping by mixing together the orange juice and sugar until well blended.
- Remove the cupcakes from the oven and allow to cool a little. Drizzle each with the orange and sugar crust mix. Top with the extra raspberries to serve.

Ah! From the stripy blue basin, the nostalgic aroma of raspberries! Reminds me of happier days with Tom. But today they're just another task to be done.


So I heft them out too and dump them on the kitchen table. Perhaps I should pick over the raspberries for that fiddly dessert before I get all smelly with pate!

I wash my hands and dry them on the roller towel before sliding them into the bowl. As I let the luscious scarlet berries trickle through my fingers, a shiver runs down my spine. Gently, very gently, I crush a few. The fragrance of past carefree summers surrounds me. I cup more of the fruit, enclosing it to squeeze the sweet flesh and watch the pulp ooze between my fingers. Juice dribbles down my forearms as I lift my hands. Gasping from the heady scent I lick one sticky palm, while the other, unthinkingly, rests on my chin. Entranced, I scoop up the remaining crushed berries, savouring the nostalgic aroma.

'Tom! I don't know what . . . your boss . . . the dinner . . . I'm so sorry!'

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In your Garden Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *Designer Gardens* Gardening Tales

Autumn is an ideal time for planting as the soil is still warm and moist. It is the best time to plant shrubs. When planting anything (except bare root plants) tease out the roots a little from the original compost and this will help it get established properly. I'm sure you've all dug up plants where the rootball is virtually the same size as it was when planted, the roots still going round and round. October is the ideal month to plant summer flowering lilies and you can still plant some spring bulbs too. However – **don't** plant tulips until November.

If you are planting climbers at the base of a wall or fence remember that it can be very dry, so aim to plant the climber about 30cm (1ft) away from the wall. Wire the wall/fence to give the climber something to cling onto using horizontal wires spaced 30cm (1ft) apart. Leave a 5cm (2in) gap between the wires and the wall/fence. The same applied to trellis – don't fix the trellis right against the fence – leave a gap so that you can train your plants in and through the gaps. Back to the climber... angle the climber towards the wall/fence, remove the cane supporting it and train its stems along the trellis or wire with soft string. Water well and mulch, and continue to water until you can be sure it has established. This goes for all new plants.

The garden centres are now full of plants for your winter and spring bedding. Wallflowers and sweet Williams are now available and it's best to get them when you see them as they won't be available for long. By now, the summer bedding will be over and it's time to plant up your pots for some winter colour. You can often find trays of small shrubs that are ideal for pots and mix these with pansies and cyclamen.

A pretty red display could include Hypericum or skimmia with its nice red berries, cyclamen and Gaultheria procumbens (checkerberry)

with ivy to soften the edges of the container. The Gaultheria likes acid soil so you will need to use ericaceous compost. Cyclamen will reward you with long flowering blooms as long as you can protect it from excessive wet. Make sure that your pot drains well and remove any faded flower stems by pinching them out with your thumb and forefinger.

For a lovely yellow and silver display edge the pot with small lavenders, and/or Artemesia for silver colour and then add a splash of yellow with Euonymus 'Emerald 'n Gold' and a gold variegated ivy to soften the sides of the container. Heathers are ideal candidates for containers and give some additional colour. A tree heather (Erica arborea) will provide height and has small white flowers in spring.

I like to see plants with different textures together and these provide long lasting displays that look good all year round and are generally low maintenance. Plants like Thymus 'Doone Valley' to trail over the edge, small Hebe Emerald Gem that just wants to be gently patted, and the slightly larger-leaved Hebe topiara will provide a greeny -grey contrast. The grass Carex 'Frosted Curls' provides movement and one of the dark leaved Heucheras with provide further texture and colour. Many of the plants that you use in your winter containers can be planted out in the garden to make room for spring and summer bedding. However, if your garden is packed full don't be afraid to throw plants away, or repot them in plastic pots to use again later – or even grow them on for the Gardening Club's plant sale.
