December's Parish Council

THE Parish Council held its monthly meeting in the Village Hall on the 18th December at 7.30pm, attended by Councillors J. Balcon (Chairman), S. Cherry, P. Smith, S. Thompson, together with the Clerk and two members of the public. Apologies were received from Councillors M. Hopper and S. Fox. Before commencement of business the public were invited to comment on the agenda, one person raised concerns regarding the planning application for a development at Grays Stores. It was pointed out that the application was an amendment to a previous application given permission by the Planning Authority in 2011.

The short agenda was then worked through with much comment and criticism from Council members with regard to an item of correspondence from NDDC advising that the Council Tax support grant from Central Government was not going to be passed on to Towns and Parishes in 2014/15, as it had been for 2013/14, leaving Parishes to make up the shortfall by either implementing further cuts in expenditure, increasing the precept or a mixture of both.

The development at Grays Stores was discussed with no objection to the application, however a recommendation was made to the Planning Authority that making good any damage caused by the developer to Milton Road Close should be a condition of planning approval being granted.

A request from a parishioner for approval to install a bench seat in memory of his late wife was approved by Members on the understanding that permission will still need to be sought from Highways. This will be coordinated by the Clerk.

After the cheque schedule was agreed the meeting closed at 8.20pm. During the post-meeting public participation session the Chairman was asked if it was possible for the Council to seek alternative sources of funding in the light of NDDC's decision not to pass on the Council Tax support grant. Whilst it is not possible for a Parish Council to do so, organisations that cannot be assisted by the Council due to cuts in its expenditure are able to seek financial assistance from a number of organisations.



Love is in the air

WITH Valentine's day approaching, some of us might start thinking how wonderful it would be to find a perfect partner and dating websites have become a very popular solution.

Research carried out has revealed that over 200,000 people in Britain may have fallen victim to online romance scams. Criminals set up fake identities using stolen photographs (often of models or army officers) and pretend to develop a romantic relationship with their victim using online dating and social networking sites. Once a relationship has been established, they pretend to be in urgent need of money and ask for help. For example, they may say they've arranged to visit you but need the money to pay travel costs, or a family member of theirs is ill and they need money for medical treatment.

Investigations have seen financial losses suffered by victims of between £50 and £240,000. Victims also suffer what is effectively a bereavement, from the loss of a relationship they believed to be genuine.

Be aware of how to stay safe. Top tips include:

- Never send money to someone you've met online, don't know well and in person, no matter how persuasive. Be particularly suspicious if you are asked to send money via a money transfer agent, such as Western Union or MoneyGram or to buy Ukash vouchers.
- Don't keep things to yourself, even if asked to, speak to a family member or friend.
- Don't give out personal or financial details. Fraudsters may use these to steal your identity or commit other kinds of fraud.
- Don't let your own bank account be used by someone else to deposit or transfer money.
- Don't trust what appears to be a UK address or phone number, they can be diverted to anywhere in the world, typically West Africa.

When cancer is diagnosed

Mr C is 72 years old and lives alone. His wife died several years ago of breast cancer. He has two children; a son who is in Australia and a daughter who lives and works in London. Mr. C's GP has referred him to the Oncology department at the



local hospital where he was given a variety of tests and given another appointment. He was advised to take someone with him for this visit but decided to go alone. When he met with the consultant, despite his suspicions, he was still shocked when the doctor told him he had

He was guite unable to take in what was said to him and when he left he could hardly remember anything that the doctor had told him. He was given a lot of leaflets containing information about his cancer but didn't feel as though he could look at them. He didn't want to bother his children because he didn't know what to tell them. He felt confused, apprehensive, and depressed about his future. He would have liked to have had someone to talk to but didn't feel close enough to anyone to share his feelings. One good friend, who knew of the diagnosis, gave him a leaflet about the services offered by Dorset Advocacy and offered to help him make the call for help.

How Dorset Cancer Advocacy helped

When Mr C contacted Dorset Advocacy, he was put in touch with a volunteer advocate, David, who arranged to meet him in his home. Mr C was relieved to find David a friendly and sympathetic listener. After being assured that his privacy would be respected he felt able to tell David about his fears and concerns about his illness and treatment, how to tell his children, and what support might be available.

With the help of David, he developed a list of specific questions he had for his doctor. He and David went through the leaflets to gain more understanding of his diagnosis. He welcomed David's offer to accompany him to the next appointment so that any remaining questions would be addressed.

Mr C then told David about his son, living in Australia, and his daughter who had a very busy life in London. Although he felt it important that they know of his cancer he did not have enough information to give them. He thought that he should know more before informing them so that he could answer any questions they had. David supported this decision and they made a list of questions about sources of help and care that were available.

They arranged to meet again and David left a contact number so that Mr C could contact him should he need more help. As Mr C watched David drive away, he breathed a sigh of relief. Here was someone who could be a real friend and supporter who would understand his fears and could provide support. He immediately picked up the phone to thank his friend for helping him make the call to Dorset Advocacy.

Dorset Advocacy is a charitable organization which provides one to one support, help and advocacy for people over 50. Dorset Advocacy works to provide relief for people living in Dorset with a learning, physical or mental disability, and those suffering frailty through age or illness. Dorset Cancer Advocacy has specifically been developed to support people make informed choices and decisions about treatment and care.



Susie Edwards Blogger Extraordinaire

SUSIE'S blog continues to be chatty and upbeat despite spells in hospital to drain her build up of fluid following her operation and the production of 50ml lymph in 24 hours. Discussing her handling of loss she felt that she had modelled her own response on her mother and grandmother and believes that such positivity can be learned at school as well as home without the debilitating effect so noticeable in others diagnosed and treated for the same condition. We talked of 'Survival Kits for Future Shock'. Her philosophy is that too much introspection is bad for people. Some dwell on the negative aspects and she stresses the importance of making memories happy. Her own daughter has channelled her concerns at her mother's treatment regime by raising money for cancer research, £1,000 so far, from silent auctions, raffles, many different stalls and has plans to market designer clothes.

She spoke of the side effects of her treatment, high temperatures, patchy eczema, sore tongue, thrush, herpes, itching. That wherever there is a weakness e.g. rheumatism, there is swelling; weak nails brittle and breaking. To illustrate this she draws everyone's attention to an amusing cartoon showing the signs and symptoms of breast cancer on Facebook. Her advice is to stay vigilant and



questioning when with medical advisors and treatment providers, not to take Paracetamol whilst receiving chemotherapy, just antisickness pills. If there are problems and 'niggles' for you always mention them when seeing the next person. 'Tell everyone everything!' She feels currently that although each skilled member of the medical profession is doing his or her job efficiently it is good to sometimes get a second opinion. 'See someone, take responsibility for your own position'. It is her belief that 'negativity leads to a decline . . . you need to be positive or to have someone with you who is!' To her it is important to achieve balance in information. It is possible to know too much, so, therefore, 'Trust in others is essential'. As always she praises the first class 'faultless' care at Dorchester Hospital commenting that they have a good reputation and, in the present financial climate, secure budgets.

Susie believes that sometimes people expect too much and stop thinking for themselves. Pharmacists are a good source of help and advice rather than wasting the time and resources of hard pressed GPs and hospital staff. She has found them 'impressive, with swift service, up to date thinking, responsive, brisk, sharp with good connections'.

Susie's energy and enthusiasm remain high as she celebrates the (much delayed) halfway point of her chemotherapy treatment. An undimmed delight in the taste of favourite foods, the twigs, leaves and berries of her winter bouquets, the company of her family and pet dog, Nutty, comes through every word and phrase of her blog.

Once upon a time . . .

I wonder what your favourite book or story is.

Though it doesn't necessarily sound like the sort of book a vicar would or should enjoy, a good detective novel is probably my preferred read. I think it's partly because I like a good mystery with clues to think about and try and spot, but I'm sure I also find satisfaction in them because by the end of the book most of the loose ends are tied up and the crimes are solved.

That fits well with my character. I am someone who feels uncomfortable with unresolved issues or plans. I like to know where I am with people and arrangements, and I'm not good at adapting to last-minute changes or a vague

This may be why I find short stories unsatisfying and frustrating. Often they don't have a clear conclusion; things are left hanging in the air. Perhaps the idea is for the reader to continue the story in his or her imagination, but I'm often left thinking "And . . ?", "So . . .?" or "What next?"

Life is, of course, much more like the short story in that respect than the crime novel. There are often not clear-cut resolutions to our difficulties. Relationships with other people do not work like solving a mystery. They are much more open-ended than that, and far less predictable. We can never be the author of someone else's life.

As a Christian, I see God as the creator. But the life that is mapped out before us - our story - is not something in which we have no say. We have been created with minds and wills and not as robotic automatons. We make decisions, with or without God's guidance, and these and their consequences contribute to our autobiographies, our own stories.

The Bible contains part of God's story, and nearly 2,000 years after the later books were written, the story continues. Each one of us is part of it; we can choose whether to believe that or not.

If we do, it can be helpful to look at how the stories of our lives have been written, and where we can see the hand of God in them. We can look towards future uncertainties and trust that God will continue to be helping us to write the tale of our years.

For thousands of years, people have told stories. It is a marvellous way of communicating with others - very few people don't enjoy a good yarn. Often Christians are shy of talking about their faith, but one approach which works well is to share stories with others. It's how we get to know them best. We learn through people's stories what are their passions and joys, where their struggles and pains lie. Biographies sell well because we like to know about others' lives. Listening to or reading someone's story is a way of valuing that person, and often as we learn more of them we find that we discover more about ourselves too.

It works with the Bible as well. So if you've not picked it up recently, why not try this month reading or listening to (there are may CDs and downloads available) what it tells us about God and the story of the world in which we live, an experience that is not confined to the pages of an ancient book however relevant it is for today, but is something in which we are directly involved every minute of our existence.





Notes from Parish Council Meeting 15th January

THE Parish Council held its monthly meeting in the Village Hall on the 15th January at 7.30pm, attended by Councillors J. Balcon (Chairman), S. Cherry, S. Fox, M. Hopper, P. Morgan (Vice Chairman), P. Smith and S. Thompson, together with the Clerk and twenty members of the public. Also in attendance were District Councillors E. Parker, J. Somper and PCSO D. Mullins with a colleague from the Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT).

Before the start of the Council meeting proper the floor was opened to the public for comments and questions. The current situation regarding the flooding was widely commented on and a question as to why traffic was still using Milton Road, despite it being closed, was comprehensively answered by PCSO Mullins, who reported that he and his team were awaiting official clarification on how the closure can be enforced. He also asked for anyone with evidence, including photographs, of vehicles using the road whilst it was closed to forward it to the SNT for possible further action once the position is clarified. Several members of the public asked for a vote of thanks to be recorded to everyone who assisted in dealing with the flooding, in particular to Cllr. Philip Smith and the Flood Warden, Steve Lord, for the sterling work they had put in. Special mention was also made of the assistance given and extra work undertaken by Grays Stores at this time. Finally Cllr. Hopper read a letter of thanks from a resident who singled out Cllr Smith and Steve Lord for their efforts. Other queries raised by the public concerned the problems experienced with rubbish collection during the worst of the floods, which had been dealt with by the Chairman and Cllr. Somper, and whether a new planning application for a wind farm at Puddletown has been received?

An agenda item concerned with the flooding was brought forward to the beginning of the meeting, the intention being to review the current situation and consider what lessons could be learnt for the future. The Flood Warden gave a report on his experiences and following a wide ranging discussion it was agreed that the following action plan should be implemented by the Parish Council and Flood Warden:-

- 1. Produce a list of volunteers willing to assist in an emergency. Flood Warden to act as co-ordinator.
- 2. Vulnerable residents who may require assistance to be identified.
- Keep a stock of sand and empty sacks available at a central collection point.
- 4. Riparian owners to be reminded of their responsibilities in keeping the stream and banks clear.
- 5. Actively pursue the County Council to address highway drainage, in particular the Milton Road/A354 junction.
- Warn schools of the danger of children playing in contaminated floodwater.
- 7. Contact the Environment Agency to suggest that monitoring equipment at March Bridge be used to measure ground water levels instead of relying on Piddle Valley monitor.

Anyone who wishes to add their name to the list of willing volunteers please contact either Steve Lord (flood warden) 839222, Jenny Balcon (PC chairman) 837121 or Colin Hampton (PC clerk) 837011 - thank you.

Other business of the evening consisted of receiving reports from the two Ward Councillors covering a forthcoming meeting on Highways, rubbish collection, a planning appeal to be held regarding two applications adjacent to Bramble Cottage and consultation on a possible wind farm site at Winterborne Whitechurch. Cllr. Hopper gave a report on the introduction of electronic planning application procedures at NDDC in February, which will mean no more paper copies being produced. A planning application for an extension to a house in Wetherby Close was considered with no objections arising. The Clerk's financial report for the third quarter of the year was

Dispensing medication ordered the day before.

This is NEVER used as lunchtime.

Entering all the repeat medication requests, some days this can be 120 + , and each of these requests can have 1-15 items on them. Printing off all of the repeat medication requests, this will actually produce an FP10 - The green paper and a new repeat slip, and it will also produce labels for all the medication ordered. We match up labels to prescription, and sort alphabetically.

We then order all the medication needed to dispense the repeat medication.

Afternoon

Dispensing repeat medication.

Dispensing 'acute' medication.

Unpacking medication deliveries.

Checking and Packing repeat medication

Put completed prescriptions either in deliver boxes or in tray ready for collection at Milton Abbas.

Doing Dispensary call back, sorting out queries from patients. Giving out medication

We are now Dispensing approx. 6,500 items per month. So we dispense at least 325 items per day between Monday and Friday.

We also deliver around 150 bags of medication to patients' houses

Some processes can take longer than others e.g. if the item has to be signed by a Doctor, as they are very busy seeing patients.

Also if an item requested is not on repeat, we will ask the Doctor, but this will of course take a little longer than an item that is already on Diana Toomey repeat.



In your Garden

Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of designerGardens

Garden Rocks

IT'S hard to turn your thoughts to the garden when the weather is so dismal, but on a nice sunny day I just can't wait to get outside. The Great Garden Revival series on the TV did a piece on rock gardens recently and that got me thinking.

Rock gardens were all the rage in the 60's and 70's but have since gone out of fashion along with the coloured bathroom suite and the hostess trolley!

A well-made rock garden can be a striking feature in the garden especially if you have a slight slope. If you don't all is not lost – you will need to create a mound, but do make sure that it is a good size


with a very gradual slope – not a pimple in the lawn! Choose an area that is open and sunny and not

underneath overhanging trees or it will suffer from

being too wet and smothered with leaves in autumn. Then take a bit of time to choose the rock you are going to use – generally speaking

something locally sourced looks better and is much cheaper – something like Purbeck Stone or a sandstone.

Arrange your rocks so that the layers all run in the same direction – a bit like you would see a rocky outcrop in the wild and slightly tilt them backward; then make sure they are firmly in place and don't have a wobble when you stand on them. Please don't plonk them on top of the soil! Infill with soil and some gravel or grit to ensure good drainage and you are ready to start planting. Give the whole area a feed of bonemeal to give the plants a good start.



Spring and autumn are the best times to plant alpines and there are many varieties to choose from. When you are planting start with the anchor plants – the evergreens – such as dwarf conifers Chamaecyparis pisifera 'Nana' and Junperus communis 'Compressa' which are good statement

plants. Then you might have some thrift *Armeria, Aubretia, Dianthus alpinus* and some sedums, rock rose *Helianthemum,* saxifrage and so on – the list is endless. You may want to add a few heathers, just check

to see that they will grow in our alkaline soil as many heathers like acid soil. Look to see when they flower and you will have some colour most of the year.

Dwarf bulbs will give you some added interest in the spring and if you don't like the thought of the leaves swamping the other plants when they go over, submerge a small pot of blooms and remove it when they have done their bit. You can then add some colourful annuals in their place.



To keep your rock garden looking good remove all weeds as soon as you see them – especially the deep rooted ones like dandelion and dock. They can be really difficult to eradicate if they get a hold especially under the rocks. Feed once a year with blood, fish and bone, and enjoy.

If you want to see some amazing rock gardens then a trip to Wisley or Kew Gardens is a must; and closer to home there is a Grade Two listed rockery in Bournemouth Lower Gardens near the Pavilion which was first created in 1930 and is the largest municipal rockery in the United Kingdom.


