

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It's 'easy' to raise funds for Milborne

SHOPPING online for a new outfit? Buying a train ticket on the web? Or a new television, mobile phone contract, pet insurance or holiday? In fact, almost any online purchase could earn money for a good cause here in Milborne.

The website easyfundraising.org.uk links retailers with consumers with organisations benefitting from the affiliation scheme. In Milborne, Ladybirds has just followed Friends of School in offering online shoppers the chance to raise a little bit of cash with only a few mouse clicks. It's safe and easy to do and doesn't cost a penny to raise pounds.

There are over 2,700 retailers that are signed up to the service, with all the big names such as John Lewis, Argos, Next, Amazon, eBay and Marks and Spencer. But it's not just 'shops' - buying insurance policies, hotel accommodation, flights and many other services can earn funds for the good causes. Becky Hunter, Chair of Friends of School, says that their funds have been bolstered recently by a parent renewing home insurance and another buying a ticket from Netflights, which added £30 and £24 respectively to the group's account. She says that Friends registered with easyfundraising in November 2013. "Since then", Becky says, "we have raised over £400 by people doing no more than making a purchase online via the easyfundraising website".

It's quite straightforward - say, for example, you wanted to buy a pair of shoes from John Lewis; go to www.easyfundraising.com and select the required retailer. This then opens the usual John Lewis website but all purchases from this point will then be noted and a percentage of the price paid sent back to the fundraising website and then on to Ladybirds, Friends of School or whatever good cause you have chosen. There is an even easier way though, which is to use the website's 'donation reminder' - once this is quickly installed, you just shop normally without 'clicking through' to retailers from easyfundraising. This then will capture all donations through your everyday purchases - it all adds up, as Friends of School can attest.

Milborne Ladybirds have recently signed up to easyfundraising and hope parents, friends and family will support them in a similar way. For such a simple action, with no cost, catch or downside, what are you waiting for?!

The Encourager

The Church celebrates the life of one of my favourite biblical characters this month on 11th June. Compared with some characters we don't know that much about Barnabas. The book of Acts has some details about him - he was from Cyprus, descended from the Levite tribe, and was part of the early group of Christians who lived communally, that is, they sold all their personal possessions and pooled what they had to ensure that no one was in need. Barnabas sold a field. He travelled with St. Paul and helped to convince those who were somewhat wary about Paul's conversion that it was genuine.

Now all that is important, but the reason I like Barnabas particularly is because of the nickname he was given. His real name was Joseph. Barnabas was the nickname, which means Son of Encouragement. To say someone was a "son of . . ." meant that that was what they were like. So Barnabas was known especially for his ability to encourage

The use of this type of nickname reminds me a little of the Mr Men series of books, originally written by Roger Hargreaves. I wonder how many of them you have read. Among the ones I remember from childhood are Mr Greedy, Mr Mean, Mr Nosey, Mr Messy, Mr Uppity and Mr Lazy. Not attributes anyone would like to be named after.

But there were also Mr Happy, Mr Strong, and in later years Mr Cheerful, Mr Good and of course the Little Misses Sunshine, Helpful and Tidy.

Barnabas makes me think about the sort of person I would like to be, and the sort of attributes and characteristics I would like to show in my life. I think being an encourager is a pretty good place to begin.

I wonder what you hold to be the most important values for life. None of us will ever manage to be completely encouraging or kind or caring or unselfish or loving. But we can always practise, and with God's help grow and develop in these positive areas.

The Bible has one list which covers many of these. Galatians 5.22f tells us that the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Whether we have a faith or not, these are surely good things to work towards showing in our lives. Barnabas showed all these attributes and is remembered above all for the positive effect his life had on

Wouldn't it be good if they could say the same about us? With best wishes

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The Causeway culvert covers

IT has been noted by several residents that the smooth concrete covers over the new culvert in The Causeway become quite slippery when wet. There have been reports of pedestrians slipping and car drivers finding that their ABS and traction control activate with little or no provocation.

One resident who regularly rides a motorcycle became so concerned that he contacted the British Motorcyclists Federation (BMF)*. His concern was not only this surface may cause an accident to any unaware motorcyclists using The Causeway, but also that similar surfaces may be used on other faster, more heavily used roads

The resident was subsequently contacted by Graeme Hay, the BMF's Government Relations Executive. Mr Hay, who has a background in road engineering, was of the initial opinion that the concrete covers should not be causing any issues. After all concrete road surfaces have been used successfully for several decades now. However he contacted Dorset County Council for clarification of the installation.

The answer received from DCC seemed to imply that there shouldn't be any problems. However Mr Hay decided to invest some valuable time, riding down from Warminster one day to inspect the covers himself. He was unhappy with what he found. The surface of the covers are produced by the hydraulic pressing process. This process results in a surface that is quite different to that found on concrete roads. His immediate thoughts were that there are some very good skid resistant coatings available at a reasonable cost that could be applied to the covers.

Mr Hay then contacted DCC again, expressing his concerns. It was agreed that he would re-open his original query and his concerns would be passed to the DCC engineer.

At the time of writing in early May, no further progress has been made. For now, if you find yourself using The Causeway in damp conditions, particularly on foot or using a single track vehicle, please exercise caution.

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


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Theory of Everything (PG-13)

The Theory of Everything is the story of Stephen Hawking (Eddie Redmayne), the most brilliant and celebrated physicist of our time, and Jane Wilde (Felicity Jones) the arts student he fell in love with. Stephen Hawking was a bright but shiftless student of cosmology, who was once a healthy, active young man, until he receives an earth-shattering diagnosis at 21 years of age and is given just two years to live. However, he becomes galvanized by the love of fellow Cambridge student Jane Wilde, going on to be called the successor to Einstein. With Jane fighting tirelessly by his side, Stephen embarks on his most ambitious scientific work, studying the very thing he now has precious little of - time. Together, they defy impossible odds, breaking new ground in medicine and science, and achieving more than they could ever have dreamed. Stephen's rise to fame as an author, lecturer and scientist is depicted almost parallel to his worsening health issues.

Redmayne is an able performer who understands the subtle effects of the beginnings of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease). This movie gives viewers a little insight into Stephen's scientific discoveries and even more about a brilliant, complex and determined man. Jones is terrific as Jane, who remains devoted even though helping her husband and raising the children exhausts her. Her performance is an accomplished blend of fierce determination to see her husband survive, and private frustration at the professional sacrifices that selflessness wrought. There is a gorgeous score composed by Jóhann Jóhannsson which adds a lovely charm to each scene, as does the cinematography of Benoit Delhomme. Unabashedly sweet and gentle, "The Theory of Everything" casts a warm glow on the personal life of physicist Stephen Hawking and is moving, astounding and, perhaps most of all, enlightening.

Over a century later, Philip Stopford has given the lyrics a modern and achingly beautiful setting. In contrast the words of Psalm 109 Dixit Dominus celebrate God's support in time of adversity and Charpentier's 17th century setting reflects this using rhythms and notation which buttress each other, creating an uplifting harmony.

Charles Marie Widor is perhaps best known for his exuberantly cascading organ Toccata, celebrating the stupendous sound and richness of the organ as an instrument. Listeners may well imagine the great French Gothic cathedrals whose massive pillars rise to delicate tracery. His mass no 36 is equally rich in colour and weight and forms a strong French reply to Handel's theatrically joyous and triumphant British coronation anthems.

Cyber Crime Plague in Dorset

CYBER crime, or crimes committed by means of electronic (or mechanical) control of the victim, has been rapidly increasing during the last decade or so. Not surprising really as it is much easier to sit at home and rob people or businesses hundreds of miles away by remote control. Unfortunately word seems to have got round that Dorset is one area where there are easy pickings to be had. As the problem is not going to go away, and criminals devise more and more clever scams every day we need to protect ourselves. In the old days a burglar could be put off by a lock on the front door, a mechanism that we could all understand. Now we need protection for electronic devices whose working systems are way beyond our understanding. We therefore need to take advice from the experts, so it is good that the government has launched a campaign to raise awareness of the problem as part of the National Cyber Security Programme. It comes at a time when an increasing number of people are using the web on laptops, tablets and smartphones. Although nearly everyone knows that they need to protect themselves from fraud when online, only one in three people keep their protection up to date; and only one in five fully protect their smartphones which are now just as likely to be attacked as computers.

So what are the dangers? For computer systems used to run businesses the risks are many - loss of goods and cash, disruption to the operation of the business, loss of access to information on the computer and the revealing of confidential information. For home computers and smartphones the dangers are mainly the last two; a criminal can password protect your files, or encrypt them, and ask you for a large amount of money before they tell you the password. Then they will search your devices for information about you and your friends such as addresses, dates of birth, bank details, passwords and email addresses of people you regularly talk to. Anything that helps them to join your group or persuade a bank or business that it is you making a small withdrawal should be avoided - a large withdrawal may follow.

So what can be done about it? It is good to see that Bournemouth University is starting to run a one-year course on cyber fraud protection for 150 students. They reckon that at the end of the course every student will find a business trying to keep their system safe that is keen to employ them. Microsoft and Apple have experts producing an enormous number of system updates for us to install. Many of these are security updates which means they are stopping hackers using a new way they have found into our home computers. Anti-virus and malware programmers are vigilantly helping us to remove unwanted programs planted in our devices. But the rest is up to us. We are the only ones that can make sure our protection is up to date so we should take advantage of the guidance that is available such as the government's 'Cyber Streetwise' campaign. Everyone, young and old, must be very careful what information is put onto social networking sites; the criminals can see it just like your friends. And if you must talk to strangers either on the phone or by email, don't tell them anything – unless you can mislead them.

or if you are in a hurry act on these tips:

- Remember everyone is an attractive target.
- Use difficult to guess passwords and keep them secret.
- Never click on suspicious email attachments or links.
- Sensitive browsing, such as banking or shopping, should only be done on a device that belongs to you, on a network that you trust.
- Back up your data regularly, and keep your anti-virus software up to date.
- Don't share information on social networks that criminals can use. I must stop now; just remembered that it's time I made another backup of all my computer documents while I have access to them.

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Put 'spring' into your step

The RSPB's Morwenna Griffiths reveals four easy ways to give nature a home in your garden this spring.

NATURE is struggling, but if we all pull together in our local communities and do small actions for wildlife in our garden, outdoor spaces and neighbourhoods, we can make a real difference.

In spring I feel most connected to nature. We both hide our drab winter clothes at the back of the wardrobe and flaunt bold, colourful prints. This season's name is spot-on; nature is a coiled *spring* ready to burst into life.

Follow these four easy steps to give nature a home on your own doorstep.

1. Blooming Marvellous

Grow nectar-rich, flowering plants throughout the seasons to increase the biodiversity of your garden. Pollinators, such as alyssum and candytuft, are a key food source for many insects, including our beloved bees. Even a window box planted with thyme and lavender will be a hit with insects.

2. Bug B&Bs

Bug hotels are fab for mini-beasts and fun for families to make. Layer materials such as recycled masonry bricks; bamboo canes; piping or even recycled plastic bottles with both ends cut off. Alternatively, leave a small pile of deadwood in a corner of your garden - fungi, mosses and lichens will love it and as the pile rots, voila! another bug hotel. Pop any garden pruning on top of your log pile to mulch down and enrich the site.

3. Lazy gardening

Leaving a patch of your lawn to grow longer over the summer and winter, becomes a haven for all sorts of garden wildlife, including, grasshoppers, moths and butterflies.

4. Pond Life

A pond is an effective way to give wildlife a home in your garden, attracting invertebrates including pond snails, pond-skaters and water beetles. Ponds are also a vital water source for small mammals, such as hedgehogs.

Ponds don't need to be huge. Mini ponds are great. Take a tub or washing-up bowl and place small rocks/gravel at the bottom. Pile the rocks higher on one side to ensure wildlife can easily climb in and out. Plant native, oxygen-generating plants such as Hornwort and fill with water. Position your pond in a sunny spot, away from trees and let nature come to you.

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

Each year members put forward issues that they wish the NFWI to campaign on or raise awareness about. This year's resolution concerns the assessment of need in long-term care. The majority of our members voted for the resolution and Jenny, our president, will vote accordingly on our behalf.

We were delighted to welcome Carole Cluett from 'Friends of Wessex Assistance Dogs' (FWAD) who had brought along Gretel, her own assistance dog. Gretel was keen to show us her own skills and deftly removed Carole's hat, coat, gloves etc. Carole has worked with dogs since she was a girl and has had many years of experience in the field since. FWAD raises awareness and support for all registered assistance dogs and all money raised stays within a 30mile radius of Bournemouth and Poole. All their helpers are dog lovers and enjoy the experience of working with people with disabilities. Puppies from six to eight weeks old are with a puppy walking family for 12 months, followed by 12-14 months basic training and are then matched to the right person. Individual training will depend upon the disability, although some are dual skilled. The range of skills is amazingly wide and includes medical detection, and helping the hard of hearing, the blind, the disabled, those with cerebral palsy, seizure alert, or who are diabetic. There is inevitably a long waiting list, but it's well worth the wait - all these dogs change people's lives!

Distraction burglary awareness

Dorset Police are urging members of the public to be vigilant against bogus callers. Dorset Police are advising that you make sure the people you care about and your elderly neighbours are not vulnerable to bogus callers or distraction burglars. Victims of bogus callers or distraction burglaries are usually elderly and live by themselves. Dorset Police is issuing advice to help reduce anyone's chances of becoming a victim of a distraction burglary or bogus

- Ensure that good locks and a door chain are fitted on the doors
- Make sure that no large amounts of money are in the home and maintain the house and garden so it does not attract attention
- Have regular contact with your neighbours and family members
- Encourage everyone to adhere to the following advice when a caller is at their door

The offenders will often work in pairs with one person acting as the distraction while the other enters the home although this is not always the case.

When answering the door, consider the following:

LOCKED - Is the back door locked?

STOP – Am I expecting anyone?

CHAIN – Put the chain on BEFORE opening the door.

CHECK – Ask for the caller's identification. Shut the door leaving the caller on the doorstep and phone the number in the phone book NOT the one on the card they give you, as this could be an accomplice around the corner - especially if it is a mobile number. A genuine caller will be happy to wait while you do this.

Safer Neighbourhoods are a commitment by Dorset Police to improving the quality of life within our communities by working together with partners to target the issues identified by you - local people – as those that matter most.

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In your Garden

Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of designerGardens

Your garden in June

WE enjoy a lovely mild climate in Dorset, many plants come into growth and flower much earlier than the rest of the country. To me, June is just about the best month in the garden – everything is fresh and colourful.

With all the new growth this month, weeds and pests are thriving too. Perennial weeds such as nettles and docks need to be dug out, annual weeds can be removed by hoeing and left on the surface to dry out and die. New shoots (and especially Hostas) need to be protected



from slugs and snails. There are many methods to get rid of these horrible creatures - use whatever your conscience allows. June is the month when vou need to prune flowering shrubs such as Viburnum tinus.

quince (Chaenomeles), Philadelphus and Weigela. They need time to produce new growth for flowering the following year so don't leave it too late.

You can also prune spring flowering clematis such as Clematis montana and Clematis alpina. I cut mine quite hard back last year as they were a tangled mess and this year they are full of flowers. Well worth doing each year. Tie in vigorous growth of summer



flowering clematis. After pruning, don't forget to give the plants some fertiliser.

Evergreen hedges such as box, privet and Lonicera nitida should be trimmed now but do check that there are no birds nesting - in fact you are required by law to wait until the chicks have fledged. Lift and divide bearded iris and discard the old rhizomes for a good show next year.

Put up supports for herbaceous plants such as delphiniums, oriental poppies and peonies. There are some lovely decorative supports available or just use hazel twigs which will disappear into the border as the plants grow.



If you grow roses, they will need some attention in June. Dead-head regularly and tie in long shoots of climbing and rambling roses horizontally to encourage flowering. Roses do need to be sprayed against black spot and mildew every fortnight until the autumn to keep them looking at their best. Spray in the evening to avoid harm to bees. If you don't like using chemicals, then rose growing is probably not for vou.

June is a great time to visit some of the beautiful gardens in Dorset many of which can be found in the NGS Yellow Book or Open Gardens held around the county. It will give you inspiration and ideas of what to grow in your own garden.



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Cars for sale??

ONLINE auction websites are being used by fraudsters to advertise vehicles for sale which do not exist.

The fraudster advertises on an auction website and gets their victim to agree to purchase a vehicle, making sure that all correspondence is done via email. The victim then receive emails which claim to be from genuine payment merchants or auction websites which state that the money they have paid for the vehicle will be held in an 'escrow account'.

The email indicates the money will be released to the seller, once the person has confirmed that they're happy with the purchase. The email says that this will provide the person with 'buyer protection'. In reality these emails are fraudulent, they don't come from the named companies and the bank accounts are controlled by fraudsters.

Protect yourself:

- Always stay within the terms and conditions of the auction websites.
- Remember that PayPal do not include vehicles under their buyer protection.
- Meet the seller 'face to face' and view the vehicle before parting with any money.
- Be vigilant of emails that purport to be from genuine companies and check the 'domain' name of the email address for any inconsistencies.
- Check feedback online by searching the associated phone numbers or email addresses of the seller.
- If the vehicle is below market value consider whether this is an opportunity which is too good to be true!

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
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Gardening Club news

On Thursday 21st May we met in the afternoon for a change. Steve Fry from The Gardens Group came along to speak to us about how to encourage more bees and butterflies into our gardens. We discovered that in the UK there are about 3,000 species of moth, and that butterflies, totalling 59/60 species, are just a sub-species of the moth population.

Steve said that basically there were four main steps to making gardens more attractive to bees and butterflies.

- 1. Choose the right plants, if possible native ones like field scabious, that have open flowers. Most nurseries nowadays incorporate logos on their labels showing that they are wildlife friendly.
- **2.** Fill all the spaces in the garden with plants, and put them in drifts to make it easy for insects. Bees need water so put out a bird bath with a float for them.
- **3.** Fill the year with plants so that there is continuous flowering.
- 4. Change your habits and avoid using harmful chemicals that contain Methiocarb, Thiacloroprid and Acetamiprid. (I have the list). Find disease-resistant varieties and try companion planting.

Our next meeting on Thursday 18th June will start at 7.30pm, when Bob Ayers will be talking about The Hidden Gardens of London. He was in the City of London Police and discovered all these City gardens, some never seen before and others that are open to visitors. This should be a fascinating talk, so do come along and bring some friends. We will also be finalising arrangements for our July visit to Iford Manor, near Bradford-on-Avon. Linda Harris

JUNE 20th-28th is National Neighbourhood and Home Watch Week.

Dorset Trading Standards work with Citizens Advice to people safe from The website stav scams. www.citizensadvice.org.uk has really good information to help protect yourself from scams including internet crime.

Topics include protecting your computer and wi-fi network, spotting phishing emails and websites where scammers try to obtain your personal and financial card details, top tips to protect your identity and cash from online scammers. The website also has a fun 'scam spotting quiz' to help you become more confident in spotting this type of fraud. Why not take a look now?

Scams do come in many different shapes and sizes though and we wanted to take this opportunity to remind you about Dorset Police's campaign to 'Hang up on Fraudsters' because telephone fraudsters are targeting Dorset residents.

The fraudsters pretend they are from the police, a bank, retailer or fraud department. They tell their victim that their account has been compromised and to dial 999 or their bank to confirm the call is genuine. BUT the fraudster keeps the phone line open so when the victim redials they are still talking to a fraudster who tricks them into handing over their bank details, Personal Identification Number (PIN) or cash for safe keeping.

NEVER give out your pin number or bank details to ANYONE who calls you, no matter who they claim to be, or where they claim to be from

Never send cash in a taxi or via courier


Never send bank cards anywhere - always keep them with you

The police and your bank will NEVER ask you for your personal bank information over the phone.

If you receive a call from someone who wants your bank details:

- Hang up
- Wait for at least five minutes
- Dial 1471 and write down the telephone number
- Call the police immediately on 101.

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

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This Month in History: June

June 1st, 1926: Norma Jean Mortensen, more famously known as the actress Marilyn Munroe, was born in Los Angeles. Following a childhood spent in foster homes and orphanages, she got a job as a photographer's model. This led on to a career in Hollywood films. She married Baseball legend Joe DiMaggio in 1954. In the later years of her life she suffered from illness and personal problems. On August 5th 1962 aged just 36 she was found dead at her home in LA from a drugs overdose.

June 12, 1929: Anne Frank was born in Frankfurt, Germany. Brought up in Amsterdam, the family went into hiding after the Nazi occupation of Holland and the deportation of Jews commenced. She received a notebook for her 13th birthday that she used as a diary to record her day to day life. After hiding for over two years, the family were betrayed in August 1944. Anne was sent to the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp where she died of typhus. After the war her diary was discovered and published becoming a best seller.

June 18th, 1942: Beatle Sir Paul McCartney. One of the most successful singers and composers ever, he has sold over 100 million albums and the same again in singles! He has 60 Gold discs. His Beatles song "Yesterday" has been covered by over 2,200 other artists.

June 28th 1491: Henry VIII, the second Tudor monarch. Famous for having six wives in his quest to sire a male heir. As the Roman Catholic church had refused to allow him to divorce, he converted the country to the new Anglican church.

Deaths:

June 1st, 2008: Fashion designer Yves Saint Lauren died in Paris from brain cancer.

June 6th, 1968: Ex US Attorney General and brother of assassinated US President John F. Kennedy, Robert F. Kennedy died of gunshot wounds sustained the day before. He was shot coming from a celebration of his victory in the California presidential primary.

June 25th, 2009: Michael Jackson. "the King of Pop" dies at his home aged 50 from acute propofol intoxication. Aided by his personal physician, Dr Conrad Murray, the singer had used a cocktail of drugs to help him sleep at night. As a result, Murray was convicted of the involuntary manslaughter of Jackson on 7th November 2011 and later sentenced to a maximum of four years in prison.

June 28, 1914: Archduke Francis Ferdinand, Crown Prince of Austria and his wife were assassinated in Sarajevo. This led to a series of events that culminated in the First World War.

Events:

June 15th, 1215: King John signs the Magna Carta, the first British charter of liberties that guaranteed basic rights. This became the bedrock that modern democracies are based on.

June 18th, 1812: In response to trade restrictions enforced by the British, due to the Napoleonic war and British support of native tribes against US expansion, the US Senate voted in favour of a declaration of war against Great Britain. The war lasted until 24th December 1814 when the Treaty of Ghent was signed.

June 25th, 1950: North Korean troops and tanks launched a full scale invasion of the South. Supported by the West, the war was to last until 27th July 1953 when the armistice was signed at Panmunjom. The country was then formally divided into North and South Korea along the 38th parallel.

June 26th, 1945: The United Nations Charter was signed by 50 nations in San Francisco and ratified on 24th October that year.
