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Known offender burgles Sports Club

CHAIR and bookings secretary of the Milborne St. Andrew Sports Club, John Sanderson, expressed frustration at the delay in repairing damage done to the Club during an unsuccessful burglary on 13th February this year. The perpetrator, John Bright, 37 years, known to Mr Sanderson since 1988 during his years as a serving police officer and dog handler, received a 32 month prison sentence. He was one of a gang of four who had conducted a spate of burglaries including W&S Recycling, Poole and a home in Wimborne. From the latter they stole guns and ammunition. Peter Turner, 31 years, Peter and John Bright together received a total of six years. Amy Watson, 33 years, who acted as driver and handler of stolen goods, received a one-year community order with a rehabilitation activity. Mr Sanderson commented that despite a window being smashed and evidence of a thorough search "there wasn't a lot to take" as all valuables are locked in a secure room and no money is kept on the premises. Unbelievably, due to a certain degree of incompetence and misunderstanding, the window was not replaced until 5th November. Earlier in the day he had spotted a white Ford Transit van parked outside the gate but thought it was a dog walker. A phone call from Malcolm Aplin, groundsman, later informed him that Bournemouth CID, who had been following the gang using a helicopter, were at the Club. The Brights had entered via veranda windows on the far side using a breeze block to break the round, toughened glass window. Fingerprints were found and all three arrested. CID Officers told Malcolm Aplin that the gang's activities had been filmed. They all admitted a 'string' of other burglaries.

Mr Sanderson recalled another burglary of £12,000 worth of timber whilst the Club was being built in 2001/2002 when a fourwheeled vehicle had driven up onto what is now the football pitch from the lane. Insurance covered the cost on that occasion but completion of the building was considerably delayed. Four years ago, however, the Club suffered a great deal of criminal damage. A sad reflection on an excellent facility originally built with £285,000 donated from the FA.

Mr Sanderson expresses the view that the Club is the most underused property in the village and he believes that only a few residents have ever seen inside it. Over the years he has overseen alterations and enlargements. Calling this incident simply 'an annoying blip' Mr Sanderson continues his chairmanship with the same energy and zeal which he has invested in the Club since its beginnings. Carole Fornachon

A Good Read by Shirley Dunkley The Casual Vacancy by J.K.Rowling

THIS book was originally credited to one Robert Galbraith, a pseudonym adopted by the author of the immensely popular Harry Potter stories to try to avoid false assumptions and publicity circuses on its publication. This proved a vain hope! It is a truly serious and adult novel, a dissection of many lives and relationships affected by the death of Barry Fairbrother and the consequent gap he leaves on the Pagford Parish Council. The machinations surrounding the election of a new councillor form one part of the plot, and the time span follows the process of filling this 'casual vacancy', but that is only a fraction of the narrative which covers a range of parent/child, husband/wife, friend and foe relationships which are touched by Barry's death.

It is not a novel for readers who like their heroes and villains clearly distinguished – we meet a plethora of fallible human beings from the impoverished and criminal Wheedons to the self-important and manipulative Mollisons - he the chairman of the Parish Council, she is 'lady wife'.

Rowling creates vivid and recognisable people – indeed so good is her characterisation that the plot is sometimes held up by description in detail of someone who has no meaningful role to play. The plot moves slowly at the beginning but gathers power as it moves towards an unexpectedly tragic climax. As is to be expected from the writer of Harry Potter, Rowlings is brilliant at describing adolescents taking them seriously, "respecting their dignity, sensitive to their pain". She delineates small-town life with crispness and insight, though seems to find little to enjoy in it. At times the reader longs for a character who is inarguably 'good', but her interest is in the fallibility of human nature, so any triumph of goodness is a cause for celebration.

Slow to start, but powerful in its final effect, this is a book for those who cherish complexity. I suspect that lovers of Dickens would hopefully find it their kind of book.

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Baby Noah inspires Hollie's great run

HOLLIE JEANS recently ran the Great South Run, raising £1,000 for the hospital unit that cared for her seriously ill baby nephew from



Blandford. Even impressive is that Hollie, who lives on Chapel Street, completed the ten mile event in Portsmouth after having battled with a chronic illness for over ten years. The race was at the end of October and attracts athletes from across the world, running a route that takes in HMS Victory and the historic dockyard.

She tells us more . . .

"I ran the Great South Run in aid of the charity 'Friends of PICU' – the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit Southampton General Hospital. What inspired me to take part was that this time last year my baby nephew, Noah, was critically ill after contracting a new strain of E.coli, 055.

He was admitted to PICU, where he remained fighting for his life for almost two months, enduring many complications. Without the incredible staff and facilities on PICU he would not be with us today. Taking part in the Great South Run was a small way I could raise awareness and funds for this fantastic unit so that they can keep doing this good work for other poorly children.

The run was a huge challenge for me personally, having battled with a chronic illness for over ten years, but it went well and I really enjoyed it. The sun was shining and the support was enthusiastic all around the course. The high fives from the children and the samba reggae drummers kept me going! It was a wonderful experience running alongside thousands of others each taking part for their chosen cause.

Friends of PICU are also asking for small quilts to keep the children on the ward warm, as well as adding a bit of colour - so I have also made a patchwork quilt which I will be donating soon.

I'd like to say a huge thank you to everyone who has sponsored me. It means a lot knowing the donations will help maintain the exceptional care for other babies, children and families that find themselves in PICU."

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'Learning the Ropes'

How hard can ringing a church bell be? Pull rope downwards, listen out for chime from somewhere up above in bell tower, release rope, repeat. However I can't stop being very wary of the rope, as it hurtles upwards, then jerking it back down abruptly, all the while remembering the Monk Mars advert and being hoisted into the air!!

Honestly? If anyone had said to me two years ago I would learn to bell ring I would have said they were having a laugh! Even my Christian mother thought a miracle had happened! Her daughter was actually going to go to church?! It is probably worth mentioning at this point that you do not have to 'believe' to become a bell ringer or campanologist as it is known in the trade - meaning the art or skill of ringing bells musically. Belief in yourself is probably advantageous though, as I found out!

So on one dark Tuesday evening I took myself off to St. Andrew's Church, much to my husband's amusement and met Pip who introduced himself as the Tower Captain in whom I took some sort of weird super hero comfort and immediately felt like I was in safe hands. As it turns out he also has the patience of a saint so clearly is a superhero!

Having been handed a method booklet with a collection of indecipherable diagrams with names such as Plain Bob Minor or Grandsire Doubles – I begun to question what I was actually doing!

So, bell handling and control was the first thing that was explained and demonstrated – to control the rope and the bell, so you can get the bell to go just up to the balance, or, to be on the safe side, just over it but without hitting the stay and bouncing off or, God forbid, even breaking! Easy-peasy – the latter has occurred three times to date!

And I am glad to say that afterwards there were no 'MMa' dramas (Monk Mars ad) and actually, after a few minutes into my first session, I begun to get quite a satisfying feel for the hefty weight at the other end of the rope (the bell, not me!) and to understand what motivates 40,000 people in Britain to ring church bells.

Now 18 months on I have mastered rounds and call changes, contributed to ringing at two weddings and a harvest festival and continue to enjoy the weekly camaraderie. I've also talked about it so much that one of my sisters has also taken it up!

Obviously I still have a lot to learn but I read somewhere that once gained, bell ringing is a skill for life you'll never forget and can open up a lifetime of experiences and enjoyment, which I believe is true and the sense of achievement with something so different feels really quite rewarding.

Unfortunately campanology isn't exactly thriving, so if I can get just



one extra person to come along and give it a try after reading this then it's been worthwhile. Hopefully you will be pleasantly surprised?! Interested? Give Pip the Tower Captain a bell!!! His number is in the Reporter.






goods and to taste some of the delicious homemade sausage rolls, cakes and biscuits. There was also an excellent raffle on offer which many people entered.



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In your Garden

Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of designerGardens

December in the Garden

What a lovely autumn we have had. The leaves on the trees have been just glorious this year and as I write this, many of our perennials still have all their leaves on.

We have been lulled into a false sense of security, so keep an eye on the weather forecast and check that any tender plants are protected and pots raised off the ground to aid drainage. If you have a pond, throw a rubber ball onto the surface to create an air hole for the fish should it freeze over (saves having to smash the ice). Don't forget to wrap up your water pipes and outdoor taps – an easily forgotten little job!

Here are a few other jobs you can be getting on with:

Clear any rotting vegetation from your pond and rake up any remaining leaves on the lawn to avoid dead patches.

In the vegetable garden, this is the perfect time of year to do a bit of digging and work in some organic matter so that the winter frosts can break up the soil. Mature borders don't need to be dug over, apply a good layer of mulch (well-rotted compost or manure) to your borders and let the worms do the work. December isn't all heavy work, there are still a few things to prune if you haven't done so already.

Some woody plants can 'bleed' if pruning is left until the new year so prune these now. Acers (which I expect you will have in a pot) and vines fall into this category. Prune vines back hard to two buds of last year's growth.

Apples and pears, currants and autumn fruiting raspberries can be pruned at any time until leaf drop in March but NEVER prune stone fruits in the winter - this will encourage the airborne fungus - silver leaf. Only prune stone fruits when the sap is rising.

You can lightly prune roses to prevent 'wind-rock' – they can be pruned properly in March/April. Climbing and rambling roses should have already been pruned by now.

PLANTING A NATIVE HEDGE

Winter is the best time to plant a native hedge – you can plant any time up to March. Use a good mix of native plants – the majority will be Prunus spinosa (blackthorn), Crataegus monogyna (Hawthorn) and then a lesser mix of Cornus alba, Rosa canina, Viburnum opulus for example.



The nursery will often make up a mix for you once you let them know the length of hedge you require.

You will need to plant at five plants per metre in a staggered row. Don't plant them any deeper



than the soil mark before they were lifted or they are likely to rot.

If you have visitors to the garden, i.e. rabbits, then you will need to protect the plants with canes and plastic spiral tubes. If anyone wants any more detailed advice I have a produced an advice sheet which I can email to you if you let me know.

Keep an eye out for Viburnum bodnantense and Hellebores which are just coming into bloom and relax and put your feet up.

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NOT EVERYONE USES THE "INTERNET", EVEN FEWER VENTURE INTO THE UNKNOWNS OF "FACEBOOK", SO WHAT HAS BEEN HAPPENING ON THERE SINCE OUR LAST NEWSLETTER?

19th October - Building above Huntley Down?

David Wyatt and colleagues came to our October meeting. They had asked to speak to the NPG and to the Parish Council. Sorry it's so long, but we wanted the village to be kept informed. (Information from the minutes taken)

Informal presentation and preliminary discussion of ideas from the architects for possible development of land above Huntley Down - David Wyatt, Andy Ward and Tom Smith attended. They've worked with Charminster residents at a early stage of design, and wish to match this approach with MSA. It is described as in easy reach of the village with "plug into" existing services. They have ideas for street layout, styles, considering existing properties i.e. the properties nearer Coles Lane would be smaller, the view from Huntley Down would include properties matching existing houses. They plan to match the adjacent housing density.

We asked why they wished to see us, and what they sought to gain out of this meeting. They replied that they wished to put forward their ideas, and how it had been thought out, that they wanted to make sure they matched any research we had done, and involve the community from the start.

What are your plans to fulfil the affordability requirement - this could be Shared Equity or Rent. We requested they consider restrictive covenants to retain young people in the village.

Our concerns were that the new properties could add to the difficulties with flooding in lower areas. Could they investigate the use of grey water systems, use of non moveable permeable material, and type of drainage. We pointed out the existing poor sewage capacity. They will be doing a preliminary assessment for flooding. We requested they share any environmental studies, if carried out.

We have problems with off road parking in some areas, what have they designed in? Mostly 2 car parking, some with garages. We requested that parking must go with the property (as opposed to open communal space) and be convenient so that residents do not park nearer their houses rather in the designated area.

Ensure Design is in keeping with village properties. NPG team commented that thatched properties should be rendered, as is most common here.

The David Wyatt team were thanked for attending; no comment was made about disapproval/approval or compliance/noncompliance with our research. Question from a villager: I thought this area was outside the planning

envelope for the village. Please would you confirm the status of the land? Our Answer: Yes the land is currently outside the Settlement Boundary - the local planning authority can make amendments during this local plan revision time. There is also "rural exception" which is geared towards social and other community type developments. The school was built on land outside the envelope using these rules

14th Sept. - Flood prevention

NDDC in its proposed modifications to the Local Plan (LP) intend to make it easier for developers to avoid issues such as flood prevention and mitigation. The Neighbourhood Plan Group have replied that we should be treated differently from urban areas. Our special circumstances should be taken into consideration, developers should provide a Sustainable Drainage system even if they are only building one new home.

Comment from villager: Sustainable drainage is a must and recognise that we have springs along the valley bottom, which not only adds to the normal problems but makes houses on the flood plain almost non-insurable

Our resident expert (Jo) answers your questions

Q. Why is the Neighbourhood Plan important for village

It's the best way for local residents to shape how their villages will grow over the coming years, and what changes may take place in the countryside, as it will set in place the planning policies for the type, location and design of new buildings.

Q...how many houses can we expect during its life?

We need to work this out, by considering who needs houses (for example, young families wanting to stay in the village, older folks looking to downsize), what is affordable, whether our local facilities such as the shop or school could benefit from more people living locally.

Q Where are they likely to be built.

We will be asking local landowners to tell us if they would like their land to be considered. After we have ruled out sites that have real problems (like flooding) we will ask local residents which sites they prefer, and any issues that need to be factored into the designs.

Q And with the plan in place is it still possible for someone to come along and persuade the council to let them built 200 houses somewhere. ...

There is no such thing as a 100% guarantee, but I really can't see that happening here, it would go against the district local plan as well as our neighbourhood plan.

Fears about wholesale building in MSA?

As part of the modified Local Plan, at present we may be asked to accommodate a minimum of 41 dwellings in the life of the plan (15 years) outside of those already planned. The Neighbourhood Plan should enable us to put strong guidelines on place, amount, and style of any building. But we have to know where, in the village, is available. As part of this, we hope to include a "Call out for sites" for local landowners.



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Know your new consumer rights!

THE run up to Christmas is a busy time for shopping, but did you know that from 1st October 2015, consumers' rights were changed under the new Consumer Rights Act 2015?

So, how have your rights been affected? Well, as before, anything you buy must be:

- of satisfactory quality
- fit for its intended purpose
- as described

Perhaps the biggest change is that your right to ask for a refund if the goods are faulty is now limited initially to the first 30 days after you bought them. So make sure any presents you buy are examined within 30 days if you can.

Once 30 days has passed you are entitled in the first instance to ask for the goods to be repaired or replaced. This must be done at no cost to you, within a reasonable time and without causing you significant inconvenience. After just one attempt at repair or replacement, if the goods are still not satisfactory, then you are entitled to a refund. You do not have to give the trader more than one opportunity to repair or replace (although you can if you want to).

If repair or replacement is not available, or is unsuccessful, then you can choose whether to keep the goods or return them. If you keep the goods, you can claim a reduction in price. If you return them you are normally entitled to a full refund, although it may be reduced to take account of any use you've had if it's more than six months since you bought it.

For the first time, consumers' rights relating to 'digital content' are also set out. This will include for example, computer programs, smartphone apps, e-books, CDs, DVDs, etc. It will also include digital content included with goods such as cars or washing machines, as well as that provided by direct download or streaming via the internet to your own equipment.

For digital content your rights are roughly the same as for ordinary goods, except that you do not get the initial 30 days to reject faulty digital content alone, and get a refund, unless the digital content is supplied as an inherent part of physical goods, such as computer systems, smartphones and washing machines.

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Julie Johannsen?

Have you met . . Julie was born in Harrogate, Yorkshire, in September 1951. Her father was in the Royal Air Force and she travelled overseas rather a lot, so she started school, aged four and a half, in Cyprus. Her parents decided not to send her and her older sister to boarding school, so she ended up going to seven different schools and left her last school just before her 18th birthday.

During this time her parents bought a house in Mudeford, and the family spent time there between postings – hence Julie's affinity with Dorset.

Julie has a very small family. Her father died ten years ago, just two weeks after celebrating his 60th wedding anniversary. He collapsed cutting the grass and it was such a shock there was no warning and no illness. Julie's mother, who will be 93 this year, was absolutely devastated and misses him every day. She lives in Coombe Bissett and Julie's sister, who is five years older, lives in Salisbury. Both sets of grandparents died before Julie and her sister were born, so they never experienced that bond.

Julie started working in London in 1969, initially as secretary to the editor of Design magazine in The

Haymarket. During this exciting time Julie decided that publishing was for her and for 27 years she worked for the British Tourist Authority. She started as editor of their main promotional guides, which took her to New York for two weeks every year, and ended up as quality assurance manager for all the National and Regional Tourist Boards. Just before her father died, she decided to move back to Dorset. Rather than change job and move house at the same time, she moved to Tarrant Hinton and drove to West London for two years. Everyone thought she was mad (including herself!), but I couldn't have made both changes at the same time.

Eventually Julie found what was for her the best job in the world! She worked in clinical trials in the Oncology Department at Yeovil Hospital, doing all the IT for two wonderful Macmillan nurses. There was never a miserable face in the unit! She took early retirement after two years, to support her mother after she was bereaved.

Julie has lived in Milborne St. Andrew since November 2003. She thinks the best thing about living in Milborne St. Andrew is the friendliness and acceptance of everyone. Since becoming chairman of the Food and Wine Club three years ago, she has got to know many lovely people.

For Julie, the only downside to living in Milborne St Andrew is the terrible state of the house at the approach to Milton Road!

The thing she would like to change about the village is that she would like to see traffic bumps or 30 mph beacons in Milton Road. Having three cats, and losing one to the road last year, she can feel very angry at the ignorance of some drivers!

Julie's pet hates are litter and cruelty (particularly to animals). Julie has one claim to fame – producing an annual 36-page promotional guide in ten editions (for different overseas markets) in 24 languages single-handed and achieving 99.7% accuracy throughout all the 12 Regional Tourist Boards' print. Julie found it very rewarding to witness the pride which shone through from all those people who contributed, due to her hard work and dedication.

Julie couldn't think of anyone 'famous' for her fantasy dinner date, but would have welcomed the opportunity to meet her grandparents. When Julie worked at Yeovil Hospital she abseiled down the side of

the building to raise money for charity. She says she has never been so scared in her life but, once she had managed to walk backwards into the unknown, experienced the most wonderful euphoria!

The surprising fact that Julie shared with us is that she was once the inter-school springboard diving champion. She lived in Singapore for two and a half years when aged eleven. She was always a good swimmer, but was afraid of diving from a springboard - probably because she was used to swimming in the sea and not swimming pools. Her parents belonged to a golf club which had a wonderful swimming



pool, where Julie and her sister spent many hours awaiting their return from the 19th hole. A few wealthy Indonesian children took diving tuition and Julie used to stand at the back of the diving board, listening. The coaching was obviously useful because much to the surprise of her parents, before she returned to the UK she became the inter-school springboard champion!

Julie went to school at Peterhead Academy for two years – the unhappiest time in her school life, because she was constantly called a 'Sassenach' by the pupils and teachers (she was 13 years old) and was bullied because of her English accent.

However, her geography teacher was very kind and during one of the lessons she spoke about tea plantations. Julie happened to mention that she had been to a plantation when she lived in Singapore and that her father had taken several slides. The teacher asked Julie to give a presentation to the class the following week! Without knowing where she got the strength from, Julie did it. It went really well and some of her classmates even asked questions afterwards. Julie felt they had actually started to accept her, then the blow came! The teacher stood up in front of her class and said "Well done Julie - now don't you all wish you could speak as beautifully as Julie?" Two steps forward, three steps back!

Julie's hobbies and interests are gardening, decorating, cooking for friends, walking and making jewellery from semi-precious stones and

This Month in History: December

1st December 1935 – Allen Konigsberg, better known as Woody Allen, was born in Brooklyn, New York. A director, actor, and comedian, his career spanned over 50 years and resulted in him receiving nine BAFTA awards and being nominated for 24 Academy Awards, winning four.

7th December 1761 – Madame [Marie Grosholtz] Tussaud was born in Strasbourg, France. She is especially famous for creating the Madame Tussaud's Wax Museum in London, which she set up permanently in 1835. Marie learned to sculpt wax from a Dr Curtius, whose housekeeper was Marie's mother. 16th December 1775 – Jane Austen, one of the most celebrated novelists in British history, was born in Winchester, Hampshire. Austen penned her first full length novel – Elinor and Marianne – in segments in letters to her family. Without surviving original manuscripts, there is no way to know how much of the original draft survived in the complete novel published in 1811: as Sense and Sensibility! Austen then immediately began work on a second novel, First Impressions, in 1796. She completed the initial draft in August 1797 when she was only 21, and this would later be re-titled as Pride and Prejudice. 21st December 1117 - Thomas Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury from 1162-

1170, was born in Cheapside, London. He is venerated as a saint and martyr by the Catholic Church and Anglican Communion. He engaged in conflict with King Henry II over the rights and privileges of the Church and was murdered by followers of the king in Canterbury Cathedral on December 29th 1170. Soon after his death, he was canonised by Pope Alexander III.

Deaths

2nd December 1547 – Hernán Cortés, Spanish Conquistador who defeated the Aztec Empire, dies of pleurisy at 61/62. Cortés' conquest was never actually officially sanctioned by Spain until he wrote directly to the King demanding reward for his successes in South America rather than punishment. He returned to Spain in 1541 as a Marquis and died quietly yet bitter six years later as the higher rank of Viceroy was granted to a higher nobleman in his company. 6th December 343 – Saint Nicholas, a Greek bishop who became the model for Santa Claus, dies at 73. He had a reputation for secret gift-giving, such as putting coins in the shoes of those who left them out for him, a practice celebrated on his feast day—St Nicholas Day (6th December, Gregorian calendar, in Western Christianity and 19th December, Julian calendar, in Eastern Christianity), and that's how he came to be associated with Santa Claus. 19th December 1848 – Emily Brontë, an English novelist and poet who is best known for her only novel, Wuthering Heights (now considered a classic of English literature) dies of tuberculosis aged 30. Emily was the third eldest of the four Brontë siblings, between her brother Branwell and little sister Anne. She wrote under the pen name Ellis Bell, like her sister Charlotte who wrote under Currer Bell.

Events

5th December 771 – Charlemagne becomes the sole King of the Franks after the death of his brother Carloman. He would go on to unite most of Western Europe under his sovereignty and laid the foundations for modern France and Germany. He took the Frankish throne from 768 and became King of Italy from 774. On December 25th 799, he was crowned as the first ever Holy Roman Emperor.

13th December 2003 – Former Iraqi President Saddam Hussein is captured near his home town of Tikrit. The move was code-named Operation Red Dawn and was headed by the 4th Infantry Division, in addition to Special Forces from Task Force 121. Orders were to capture or kill Saddam Hussein, and he was captured with no attempt at resistance.

15th December 1877 – Thomas Edison patents the phonograph while working on improvements to the telegraph and the telephone. Edison figured out a way to record sound on tinfoil-coated cylinders and in 1877 he created a machine with two needles: one for recording and one for playback. His invention would later become more popularly known as the gramophone.

25th December 337 – The earliest possible date that Christmas was celebrated on December 25th. One theory to explain the choice of 25th December for the celebration of the birth of Jesus is that the purpose was to Christianise the pagan festival in Rome of the Dies Natalis Solis Invicti which means "birthday of the Unconquered Sun", which was celebrated during the Winter Solstice -December 25th. 
