



Christmas market raises funds for church roof

THE annual village Christmas market was held this year on Saturday the 28th November in the village hall. A wide range of goods were available for purchase at bargain prices ranging from new and pre-owned bric-a-brac; home-made cakes and preserves and arts and crafts items. Those who fancied trying their luck could try a

well stocked tombola or buy a raffle ticket. Hot drinks and soups (including a tomato and pepper soup that I can personally recommend) were available to warm folk up.



All the proceeds from the Christmas market go to support St. Andrew's Church. This has become particularly important this year as it has just been discovered that the church is in need of repair to the tune of an estimated

£40,000. The repairs do not need to be done all at once, but the most urgent to the roof are going to cost between £15,000 and £20,000.

Having heard about the church roof, Father Christmas agreed come and support the market. Due to a lack of snow and the strong winds, Santa tells me that the sleigh was proving difficult to control. Help was at hand from one of Santa's little helpers who







gave Father Christmas a lift in a nice red open top sports car. So despite the sleigh problems, Father Christmas arrived at the village hall at 12 noon much to the delight of the children who were in attendance.

At the end of the day a profit of £746.17 was raised for the church funds. Pete Constant

WE are pleased to announce that after a long process and planning a dishwasher has been ordered; as I write, arrangements are being made for its installation for use by hall users. Thanks to the Village Lunch, the WI, the Reporter and Sarah's coffee morning for making contributions towards the cost of the dishwasher. Once it is installed and ready to go all users will need to be instructed as to its use, so watch this space!

Hopefully our bid to develop the 'top field' into an area which can be used by walkers and cyclists will be accepted. The plan is to create paths for walking, paths for cycling, shelters, benches and picnic tables within the wildflower meadows and recently planted trees (including the royal oak).

Now the sad news; our bid for lottery funding for the children's play park has been rejected. However, we will try other funding sources but sadly the scheme doesn't seem to fit most of their criteria. Therefore, the committee are considering scaling down the original plans so that something can be put in place, especially as the hall's fundraising efforts have reached £4,500 towards the play park redevelopment.

As with all rent increases there will be a small rise to £8.25 to hire the hall; the cost of the committee room is to remain the same. If you are planning to hire it next year you can get it at the current rate if you book before April when the new price comes into effect.

The village quiz finally happened and all who came really enjoyed the evening. Our Bingo was very noisy but a fun night. There were some wonderful prizes which were well received by the lucky winners.

Don't forget that the hall will be hosting a Blues Night on 16th January, profits from which will be shared between the play park fund and the Riding for the Disabled school; get your ticket now as they are selling out quickly. Of course there will be more films and look out for information about the May fayre.

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
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Going Underground – next stop Milborne!

Milborne St Andrew is Oxford Circus. Well, that's according to an ingenious recent reworking of the London Underground map, where our village appears on the Central line in the Oxford Circus position. The map is an almost-replica of the London Underground cartographic classic, but with the towns and villages of Dorset replacing the more familiar capital stations.

The Dorset Underground map was the brainchild of Dorset-born, Charlie Slade, who now lives in London. He says, "One evening, during a particularly slow journey home on the Victoria line I wondered how big the Underground was, and therefore how big Greater London was. I couldn't picture in my head the sort of an area it covered. I needed a familiar comparison to be able to visualise it."

So once finally home, he used online mapping tools to overlay London with Dorset. "The result", he says, "was the observation that entirely accidental positioning of Cerne Abbas on that particular configuration of underground lines."

What is quite striking, however, is how few overland train station symbols appear next to town names. Geographically, Dorset may be similar to Greater London but we do not share even a fraction of the connectedness that London boasts. When this map appeared on the Reporter Facebook page last month, a member commented that it was a shame our public transport wasn't as well connected as is depicted on the map. Indeed!

Print copies of Dorset Underground are available to buy, with 10% of all proceeds going to the Somerset and Dorset Air Ambulance. A3 copies are £20 and A4 at £12

Dorset-sorted.co.uk has kindly donated two copies of the map to



the true scale of the London Underground would fit nicely inside the Dorset county boundaries." He then set to work, and more "timeconsuming tinkering" led to the production of the Dorset Underground map.

On the map, original London Underground lines such as Circle, Central and Northern are mixed with Dorset-inspired ones like Durdle, Jurassic and Piddle Valley. Most of the routes follow actual roads - so the 'George III' line from Milborne travels north to Dewlish and south to Bere Regis - others are linked by rivers ('Stour line') and there are historical connections too (the aforementioned George III, which terminates in Weymouth). There are Dorset oddities such as the village of Tyneham, which has its name struck through in red, in the style of a disused station.

In a cheeky representation of Cerne Abbas' claim to fame, the map uses the line configuration of the real Northern line route from Euston to Camden Town. As the map-maker says, it was "not an

This Month In History: January

15th January 1929 - Martin Luther King was born in Atlanta, Georgia. As an African American civil rights leader he spoke eloquently and stressed non-violent methods to achieve equality. He received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. He was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee, on April 4th, 1968.

27th January 1832 - British novelist Lewis Carroll was born in Daresbury, Cheshire, England (as Charles Lutwidge Dodgson). Although best known for Alice's Adventures in Wonderland and Through the Looking Glass, he also lectured in mathematics and was a pioneering photographer.

30th January 1882 - Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the 32nd U.S. President, was born in Hyde Park, New York. Despite crippling polio, he led America out of the Great Depression and through World War II and is widely considered to be one of America's three greatest presidents (along with Washington and Lincoln).

Deaths

22nd January 1901 – Queen Victoria of England died after reigning for 64 years, the longest reign in British history until this year, during which England had become the most powerful empire in the world.

24th January 1965 - Winston Churchill died. He had been Britain's wartime prime minister whose courageous leadership and defiant rhetoric had fortified the British during their long struggle against Hitler's Germany: "I have nothing to offer but blood, toil, tears, and sweat", he stated upon becoming PM at the beginning of the war.

25th January 1947 – Gangster Al Capone, who once controlled organised crime in Chicago, died in Miami at age 48 from syphilis.

28th January 1547 – King Henry VIII of England died and was succeeded by his son, Edward VI. Henry had ruled since 1509 and had broken all ties with the Roman Catholic Church over the issue of divorce.

Events

1st January 1622 - The Catholic Church adopted 1st January as the beginning of the New Year (instead of March 25th).

3rd January 1924 – English explorer Howard Carter discovered the sarcophagus of Tutankhamun in the Valley of the Kings, near Luxor, Egypt. The tomb of the boy-Pharoah had been discovered in November 1922.

10th January 1863 – The world's first underground railway service opened in London, the Metropolitan line between Paddington and Farringdon. The track was 3.7 miles long, and the tube cars at the time were wooden.

20th January 1649 – At the end of the English Civil War, King Charles I was brought before a high court of justice at Westminster Hall on charges of treason. In the trial that followed, Charles was condemned as "a tyrant, traitor, murderer, and public enemy" and was beheaded several days later in front of Whitehall Palace.

30th January 1972 – In Londonderry, Northern Ireland, thirteen Irish Roman Catholics were killed by British troops during a banned civil rights march. The event became known as Bloody Sunday.

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

From all at school we would like to wish all readers a very Merry Christmas and health and happiness in the New Year.





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In your Garden

Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *designerGardens* **Gardening tales**

JANUARY is just about the worst month of the year – wet, often very cold, windy – you name it, we get it. And the gardens can look as attractive as a wet breeze block and pretty awful. The garden looks bare, so what can be done – ah ha – a glimmer of interest creeps in. Think about plants you can use to make the garden interesting all year-round by using some evergreen plants that will keep their shape and perhaps give a bit of colour during the dullest days.

Garden Architecture

A garden can be made interesting

throughout the year, not only with evergreen shrubs, but also by the use of architectural plants. Architectural plants are defined by their distinctive and eye catching shape. The plants have their own 'architecture' – spectacular shapes that bring a distinctive year round presence to a garden. Some are spiky, some have big leaves, some look tropical, some look absurd but all are evergreen.

Take care how you use tropical or exotic plants such as the hardy

bananas (musa basjoo) or palms and yuccas. They need a sheltered, wind free site or the leaves will turn brown and get shredded. A good hardy plant with huge leaves that grows in just about any soil is Fatsia japonica – a good doer as they say.



Palms and more palms

Having said all that, don't fill your garden with architectural plants, one or two spiky plants in a sea of foliage can look fantastic, more can look overdone.

Maintenance is important with many of the exotic architecturals. The old foliage turns brown and limply hangs upside down next to the plant looking messy, or blows all over the garden. You can pull off these dead leaves easily to make the plant look tidier. You can also raise the crowns on trees to expose their lower branches, thin out bamboo plants and remove their lower leaves to give the plants an architectural and interesting dimension.



Fragrance in the winter

Plants such as Viburnum tinus 'Eve Price' will flower right through from December to March or beyond; Sarcoccoca hookeriana has the most scented flowers imaginable albeit very small. The Viburnum's are a good bunch for winter colour and fragrance – there is the enormous Viburnum rhytidifolium, or the deciduous Viburnum bodnantense 'Dawn' with scented pink flowers from October to

What else you can do now

Check any large shrubs and trees to

make sure that the wind has not loosened them. If this has happened, put the plant back into position and refirm the soil around the roots with your foot. You may even need to put a stake in the ground to hold it up — even though this may mean damaging some of the roots of the plant. It may be a case of stake it, or lose it.

Hellebores are just about to flower now, so remove those old large leaves around the flowers and the flowers will put on a great show.

Snowdrops in flower – It is an ideal time to move or split snowdrops – while they are 'in the green'.





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Have you met...John Sanderson?

JOHN was born into a military family in Knotty Ash, a suburb of Liverpool, in 1960. His father was a Petty Officer, working as a submarine engineer in the Royal Navy (RN) and his mother a Sergeant, training recruits in the Women's Army Corps (WAC). When his father, a strong influence in his life, moved south to work at Wallsend Slipway (which became Hamworthy Engineering) he was flown all over the

world to deal with faulty engines. So his son inherited a strong desire to join the Royal Navy. At the age of 17 years he completed a year on a Sail Training Ship, Malcolm Miller. He describes the exhilaration he experienced even when 200 foot aloft up the mast in gales off the Isle of Wight. As a permanent crew member he trained other young people to sail, to steer and to furl sails. All of which stood him in good stead when he joined the Royal Navy in January 1979, aged 18 years.

Following a 16 week basic training at HMS Raleigh in Plymouth and having chosen to be a marine engineer, he spent 30 weeks at the Marine Engineering School, HMS Sultan, taking diesel engines apart and putting them together again, sometimes with a puzzling excess of nuts and bolts left over at the end of the process! His final posting for the rest of his service in the Royal Navy, was to a flat bottomed, steam driven Landing Craft support ship, HMS Intrepid. John describes this as a bit smaller than an aircraft carrier which carried a contingent of Royal Marines. Whilst aboard

he trained to be a diver, diving all over the world, even fighting with a shark in poor visibility whilst removing a rubberised wooden "blank" from the bottom of the HMS Intrepid in the Mediterranean Sea. Thinking his diving buddy, the Chief Petty Officer, was playing about he pulled it to and fro finally regaining it and climbing aboard. Once studied, it was found to be edged with teeth marks! Up to then, he had been told, if confronted with a shark to squirt air into its nostrils to frighten it away. But, as he pointed out, this would require removal of his face mask, not something he would be keen to do in a vulnerable situation! Although with the Intrepid for seven of his nine years in the RN he only once requested a transfer. This, however would have been to HMS Fearless the HMS Intrepid's sister ship with whom they shared parts due to the age of them both. So he stayed with the Intrepid where he was a highly trained fire fighter.

In 1982 he went to the Falklands for the duration of the War anchored in San Carlos Bay. Their only weapon of self defence was a hand operated Sea Cat which had a range of three miles. He was "locked down below" during battles hearing the thuds and crashes overhead whilst flat on the deck but knowing that what he could hear was at least closer than three miles. Their only damage was caused by an over zealous SAS man who, whilst shooting at an enemy aircraft, forgot to stop when he reached their funnel, leaving a neat line of holes near the top! On board was a contingent of Gurkhas, The Scots and Welsh Guards plus the Royal Marines, the SAS and the SBS. He went ashore once to clear up the appalling mess left to farm buildings by Argentinian soldiers. The enemy pilots, John explains, were brave men who flew 'below the radar' to drop bombs on our shipping, specifically destroyers and frigates. However, the mechanism of each weapon was not triggered unless dropped from a greater height. Unfortunately, press officials embedded with the MOD on board, reported this failure. This led to more 'successful' raids leading to great loss of life and vessels.

After the War, John was shore based on the old HMS Intrepid. This went for a three year refit in Plymouth followed by service for the RN at sea throughout the world but is now broken up and the parts sold to

the French Government. In 1988 he left the RN to become a Police Officer in Dorset. Having made his pitch at his initial interview extolling his diving career he was informed that Dorset Police didn't have a diving division, they used the RN divers when necessary! However he completed a 16 week initial training course in Surrey to be a dog handler gaining his certificate of competency with Zac, his first dog.

> That career lasted 15 years. Five years previously he had married Jane, his first wife, and they have two daughters Laura and Kate. This marriage ended in 2000. He has since married Denise in 2005, who has four daughters and one son.

He was diagnosed with cancer following an operation to remove a kidney. It spread to his lungs and then his brain. Two tumours were removed from the latter so they married in Dorchester Hospital believing his life would end in four months. He was transferred to the Royal Marsden Hospital where he was given a revolutionary new drug called Interferon. After two years self injecting this medication he took a personal decision to give it up, having lived with the flu like side effects for that long. He has now been declared clear of cancer.

Recruits to the police force are placed on a two year probationary period. If found to be unsuitable during that time they are asked to leave. No reason is required to be given. As a serving police officer the only reason they can be sacked is if they commit a criminal offence.

John tells me he has been a keen sportsman all his life in particular football, hockey and canoeing. He has played as a semi-professional for Wimborne Town and Gosport Borough as well as for Dorset Police and was paid to go to games. Now, due to lack of manpower there is no official police football team. He played hockey for the RN as a very fast striker. He attended Colehill Primary School and QE School, Wimborne running the 200 metres for Dorset as a schoolboy and playing football and hockey for the school. John describes being 'blase' about education although he completed both lower and upper VI by concentrating on English and Maths purely to gain entry to the RN. In 1993 on a posting to the Police Dog section in Dorchester he moved to Milborne St. Andrew living in Stileham Bank initially followed by a brief period in Melcombe Bingham and back to Milborne via a rented property on the Dewlish Road.

In 2011, having retired from the Police after 30 years service, he and Denise moved to Weatherby Close and he started work as a parcel courier for Hermes. With some astonishment he comments that his daily delivery used to consist of 25 parcels a day which has now risen to over 90! On his round he covers Winterborne Whitechurch and Stickland, Belchalwell, Ibberton, Wooland, Hilton and Milton Abbas.

His most embarrassing moment was being bitten twice by his own Police dog during a fight with a drug dealer. This took a year of jokes and ribbing from his colleagues before it died down!

His hero and inspiration in the football world he names as Kenny Dalgliesh and someone he would liked to have met, is President John F. Kennedy. The charity he supports is Macmillan, commenting on how well they supported him during his illness.

John says he loves Milborne St. Andrew and wouldn't want to live anywhere else. He was one of the main movers and shakers in setting up the Sports Club and is its chairman and bookings secretary. If he could change anything it would be that more residents would come up to the Sports Club to see and use its facilities. So far next year he has only one booking, a wedding. He asks that when thinking of somewhere for that special occasion locals would think of his club.

The magi knew the importance of the moments they had with the Christ-child. They used that time wisely before moving on to the next stage of their journey.

May 2016 be a year when we learn to appreciate the present moment in all its fullness, as a gift from God to be lived not rushed through at 90-miles an hour.

The Imitation Game (PG-13)

shown by 'Milborne Movies' at Milborne St. Andrew Village Hall (DT11 0JX) on 8th Friday January 2016 at 7.30pm

THE IMITATION GAME is a gripping, acclaimed thriller that tells the incredible true story of unsung war hero Alan Turing (Benedict Cumberbatch), the British mathematician responsible for cracking the German Enigma code during World War II, with help from fellow mathematicians including fellow code-breaker Joan Clarke (Keira Knightley).

Historians estimate that breaking Enigma shortened the war by more than two years, saving over 14 million lives. It remained a government-held secret for more than 50 years. Turing's work inspired generations of research into what scientists called "Turing machines", now known as computers. These accomplishments did not prevent Turing's post-war prosecution for homosexual acts (he agreed to "chemical castration" for his crimes), nor his eventual suicide in 1954 at the age of 41. Much of the goings-on at Bletchley and in Hut eight have been excised or modified to make the narrative more sinewy, but early hardships suffered by Turing as a schoolboy as well as the difficulties he encounters with not just British military, but his own co-workers, help complete our portrait of the man and Cumberbatch gives a performance that is, by turns, awkward, triumphant, and heart-

This is clearly a rich field for an often tense and moving drama, which also manages to include a good deal of humour that sandwiches the wartime events between scenes of his school days and ultimate arrest. In 2013 Queen Elizabeth II granted a posthumous royal pardon, honouring Alan Turing for his achievements during the war. Unfortunately, despite the pivotal role he had played during the war, Turing was never really recognized as a national hero, because of his homosexuality. This film is a solid historical drama about someone who changed the world but is relatively unknown today.

A Good Read by Shirley Dunkley A Spool of Blue Thread by Anne Tyler



I MAKE no apologies for recommending Anne Tyler yet again - she is one of the most distinguished women writing today. This contender for the Man Booker Prize is, as usual, set in Baltimore and tells the life of a family house from the 1920s to the present day. The main narrative focusses on Abby and Red Whitshank, in their 70s at the beginning of the novel, and their family of two boys and two girls. The book moves back and forth in time illuminating the changes brought about in old age when the children became the 'minders' of their parents' lives; it

explores the effects of a difficult 'outsider' child on family dynamics and the consequent amounts of emotional energy he sucks up; it highlights how parents create a family myth which can be very different from the adult children's perception. It deals with death and loss, anger and reconciliation with Tyler's usual understated elegance and keen insight creating a satisfying and rich experience for grown-up readers everywhere.

Focus on Small Businesses in Milborne St. Andrew No. 2 - The Burger Bar

DAREN Christopher, who owns and runs the Burger Bar, was born and raised in Blandford, attending Milldown Primary and Blandford Upper School until 16 years and currently lives in Parkstone. From the age of



12 years he worked for Brian Smith on a market stall selling sweets, taking over from his brother. On leaving school he was employed by Ferndown Wholesale Confectionery as a van driver for 24 years, then for Panda Pops (Hall and Woodhouse), market stalls full time selling pots and pans, kitchenware, bedding then eventually a variety of sweets. During the latter period he had 200 jars of sweets on his stall!

The Burger van has been operating on the industrial estate in Milborne St. Andrew for the past three years and is one of. between 10-20 Units. They are

inhabited by carpenters, Environmental Services, a boat builder, kitchen utensil outlet and someone who works for Amazon. Daren sometimes works at Wareham Market on the Quay, and on Sundays runs car boot sales in Poole Stadium.

The burger bar opens at 6.30am until 3.30pm Monday to Saturday selling extra large and 'monster size' baps. His ingredients are all West Country sourced. The burgers from Gold Hill Farm Supplies, baps from Cowdreys in Ferndown, bacon from Hunts of Sherborne and Charles Saunders in Bristol. Over the years he has built up a regular customer base and says he 'knows their preferences'. This was borne out whilst I was there when one man said nothing but still received his bacon bap! Another customer commented 'he does a mean burger'. Other food held are a selection of sweets, cakes, biscuits, crisps and fresh fruit, bananas, apples and oranges from his fruit stall colleagues. He caters

for all tastes with fruit juices, water, coffees, teas and hot chocolate. The Burger Bar also has the distinction of holding one of the few five star hygiene ratings in Dorset, which is displayed in his van.



This has to be renewed every three years. Every six months he undergoes a gas and electricity check to renew his certificates. North Dorset District Council (NDDC) come every year to check his Public Liability Insurance and to do temperature checks. There are tables outside painted red, white and blue by Daren to match the stars and stripes already on the van when he bought it, and one for a variety of sauces; plenty of parking spaces; hand wash and a toilet. In summer he attracts a large number of holidaymakers on their way west, often to Weymouth with its carnival and other attractions. Some return each year. His busiest times are between 7-9am and 12-2pm. Many customers come from the industrial estate but there are an equal number travelling to work. He is often asked to provide food for parties and fetes. These can be booked with him. Although he occasionally has to take a day away, Daren believes that his customers have built a relationship with him and want that continuity of very personal service. He comments that a combination of increased rents and the advent of Morrisons and Iceland killed many local businesses and injured his own. However, Daren appears a happy man, successful in both his business and diverse customer base. Carole Fornachon

Advice on winter driving by **Dorset Police**

THE winter weather is here and we would like to remind you all to check the tyres on your car regularly to make sure they have sufficient tread and are inflated to the correct pressure. The legal limit for the depth of car tyre tread is a minimum of 1.6mm and the correct tyre pressure can be found in your vehicle's handbook. We would also like to remind you all to check the lights on your car regularly to make sure they are all working. Regularly on our patrols, we see vehicles travelling with only one headlight or we follow vehicles with brake lights not working. If this is the case you are liable to be pulled over and delayed on your journey, you could potentially cause an accident, or be subject of a fine of £100 and three penalty points on your licence or more!

It is also an offence for number plates to be obscured in any way, even by mud so please make every effort to ensure they are clean. Thank you.

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The Piddle Valley Players' production of CAROUSEL

RACHEL Olley is the Director of the Piddle Valley Players' winter season's production of 'Carousel', reputedly one of its author's, Richard Rodgers', favourite musicals, and voted the best musical of the 20th century by Time magazine in 1999. He and his partner Oscar



Hammerstein adapted the 1945 version from Ferenc Molnar's 1909 play 'Liliom' transplanting its Budapest setting to the Maine coastline. The story revolves around the romance between carousel barker Billy Bigelow and millworker Julie Jordan, A secondary plot deals with another millworker, Carrie Pipperidge, and her involvement with ambitious fisherman, Enoch

Snow. The show includes the well -known songs "If I Loved You", "June is Bustin' out All Over" and "You'll Never Walk Alone."

The Piddle Valley Players have been in existence for 30 years. Rachel has been involved as Director for nine years and before that a member of the Bournemouth and Boscombe Light Opera Company and the Cromer and Sheringham Dramatic Society taking lead roles in most productions, treading the boards from the age of 17 years. She played Julie Jordan at the same age, 19 years, as her daughter who is playing that part in this show! They have been in rehearsals for two hours twice a week since September. All 25 members of the Players are in Carousel, their ages ranging from ten years to 70 years. There are ten men in this show. Usually, she tells me, men are more reluctant to take part, feeling uncomfortable with performing, but once bitten by the theatrical bug they tend to stay. Annual subscription is £25 per year. Members come from Charlton Down, Buckland Newton and Dorchester as well as those from the villages in the Valley. There are no auditions as she says she is aware of everyone's capabilities and what role would suit which person. She describes it as very 'physical' theatre with lots of challenges due to the small size of their venue, Piddletrenthide Memorial Hall. It holds sixty people which makes for an intimate experience. There is nowhere for the cast to change and it is 'pretty tough at the back' and very few props. The costumes are hired from Ringwood Musical Society.



Rachel describes the rehearsals and shows as exhausting for the cast and most take time off from work in the run up to their opening night. This year for the first time they are putting on five performances, 16th-20th February 2016, instead of the usual four. Refreshments served (included in the ticket price, £10) are suitable for the show. This time they are a secret! For 'The Boy Friend', the cast served the audience with Pimms and cucumber sandwiches in a French Café setting. This is an innovative and ambitious group performing a colourful show only a short drive from Milborne St. Andrew.

So, the Piddle Valley Players await your attendance at their proudly presented production of Rodgers and Hammerstein's CAROUSEL, 16th-20th February 2016 at 7.00pm. Piddletrenthide Memorial Hall, £10 including refreshments. Tickets from Old Chapel Stores, Buckland Newton and Piddletrenthide Post Office from January 2016.
