The Primary Care Commissioning Strategy

SOME of you will be aware that Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) has published a draft Primary Care Commissioning Strategy (PCCS) which sets out proposals for the future of General Practice in Dorset. http://www.dorsetccg.nhs.uk/aboutus/primarycare-strategy.htm

Of significant concern to many is the implication that patients will have their care delivered from larger sites and that smaller, local GP Practices may be closed. Please be assured that this is not a 'done deal' and although the national agenda is focused on 'delivery at scale', we know this will not work for rural communities like ours where transport issues are significant.

Please do not be concerned about there being changes to where you access your care. We are looking at local solutions that, rather than adopting 'one size fits all', focus on what we collectively want our local health care services to look like and how GP Practices can meet the challenges of delivering modern models of care.

Holidays4Heroes at Wednesday Club

ON Wednesday 2nd November Susan Wilson came to talk to the Wednesday Club about the work of Holidays4Heroes. It has no connection with the large charity, Help for Heroes, which we were surprised to learn is only able to help servicemen and women from the Afghanistan conflict.

Holidays4Heroes receives no outside funding and depends entirely on donations and offers of assistance from the general public.

Serious injuries of, or the death of a serviceman or woman affects the families severely and at a time when a break is most needed it is far away from being a priority and within a faster timescale. For those injured in military operations and their families and the bereaved, Holidays4Heroes steps in and offers to provide a break away from it all. They raise funds to cover flights, transfers, insurance and even some spending money. They work with the expatriate and holiday community and obtain large discounts or even free holidays given out of kindness. They also work with Regimental family support and welfare officers to identify suitable cases and sort out all the administration.

In addition they provide a unique niche capability in the welfare arena providing immediate respite accommodation and assistance before the established charities are able to take over. Activities are varied and include such things as getting homeless veterans off the streets, helping with job applications and buying back medals that have been sold due to financial crisis.



Susan brought with her six teddy bears that are part of a 'troop' that have been extremely useful in raising funds. They were dressed in various military uniforms and have travelled all over the world collecting money. Some have even been on active service to places such as Afghanistan.

The club was able to give Susan £50 for their funds as well as us all putting our loose change into the collection box! Susan gave us some goodies from the Holidays4Heroes collection for our next raffle. We would like to thank her for such an informative and interesting talk.

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
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




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A New Year, a new you, with a little help from food labelling

COME the 1st January 2017, after the excitement and excesses of Christmas and all of that wonderful food; chocolates, cakes, turkey, Brussel sprouts! Many of you will be making your New Year's Resolutions, one of which may be to 'go on a diet' or 'eat more healthily'.

Changes in the requirements for food labels policed by Dorset Trading Standards that come into force this month may help you meet your goals.

From 13th December 2016, most packed food you buy in the shops will need to be marked with detailed nutritional information. This information includes the all-important number of calories the food contains, along with the amount of other nutrients such as carbohydrates, sugar, protein, fat and saturated fat.

For those of you who are concerned about the amount of salt in your food, that information will now also be given.

As long as there is space on the label, the nutritional information will be given in a table, usually on the back or side of the package. The figures quoted will be per 100g/ml to make comparisons between different foods easier and some manufacturers may also give information for 'servings' or 'slices'.

So if you want to make informed choices about the food that you eat or you are just watching your calories, take a closer look at the labels on your food in the New Year.

It's Christmas time

It's Christmas time, there's no need to be afraid. At Christmas time, we let in light and we banish shade. And in our world of plenty we can spread a smile of joy; throw your arms around the world at Christmas time.

But say a prayer, pray for the other ones.

We live in a divided world, divided for all sorts of reasons: wealth and poverty, colour, race, religion, sexuality, disability, political opinion, and so on. These divisions sadly often lead to injustice and affect the vulnerable most, since those with power often work hardest for themselves and those like them.

In sending Jesus into the world as a tiny child, born into poverty, laid in a borrowed manger, away from home, God offers hope for each and every person. Access to Jesus is never restricted as it might be for a king who lives in a palace.

And when Jesus grew up, he showed that he was for everyone; he spent much time with the poor and outcast, because he wanted them to know that they too were precious and treasured, and that God's love is for all, regardless of how other human beings categorise them.

This Christmas, as we celebrate that we too are included among those who are treasured by God, let us thank God for loving us so much that he became one of us, so that we might share his life in all its fullness.

Let us "spread a smile of joy" and "pray for the other ones", while celebrating our own good fortune that we have a Saviour like no other, a man for every people, a God whose gift to the world is himself.

There were many villagers, including the Scouts and Cubs, who came together in St. Andrew's church and at the memorial to remember the men and women who lost their lives as a result of wars and conflicts.

The Scouts' and Cubs' flags were solemnly carried to the altar during the first hymn. The Rev. Sarah Hillman brought the reality of the Battle of the Somme to those present as part of her sermon. We were asked how many died during the battle then given a comparison that for every week nearly the total population of our village died. This was a shock to all present. She gave details of the three servicemen, who have War Commission Graves in St. Andrew's churchyard, of their families and of the health problems that they died of as a result of the conditions that they had to endure during the war. Sarah went on to say how conflict is not the way that God wants and that we should all pray for peace.

After the church service Sarah and the congregation joined others at the secular memorial at the bottom of Church Hill to honour those service people who died fighting for their country. Wreaths were laid and everyone present kept the two minute silence.

We will remember them.

Ten things no one tells you about divorce

- Only a small part of your history is relevant to Family Court Proceedings. However, using Mediation or collaborative ways to resolve your issues allows you to talk about everything, even how you will deal

A Good Read by Shirley Dunkley "I Let You Go" by Clare Macintosh

THIS is a very good thriller but because it features some quite astonishing surprises, is not easy to describe without giving the game away! The starting point is a hit and run accident which causes the death of a five year old boy. We follow in detail the police investigation by Detective Inspector Ray Stevens and his new Detective Constable, Kate, and are also introduced to Ray's family and glimpse the tensions it contains. We are invited, too, into the lives and feelings of others intimately affected by the accident, especially Jenna, whose story runs parallel with the investigation. Bristol and Wales are the locations and the evocation of an out-of-season Welsh seaside resort is particularly vivid.

Clare Macintosh was herself a police woman and her inside experience makes the investigation particularly convincing. However, the strength of the novel lies in the power of the narrative – the reader is constantly driven to find out more. A word of warning – there are some scenes of violence but it is never gratuitous, always a necessary part of the plot. If you are prepared to cope with that, then I can recommend this book for its adroit plotting and cunning surprises.

Do you care about hedgehogs?

YET again this year's weather has been described as 'unusual', but particularly following a period of wet weather early in the year it has stayed warm and dry until quite recently. The result of this is that wild animals, particularly hedgehogs, have continued to breed quite late. This has resulted in a number of young, and more specifically, underweight, hogs in the wild. It is reckoned that hedgehogs need to be at least 600 grams in weight to survive hibernation, so many of these small hogs will die of cold before the spring. It is possible to save any that are below this weight by taking them in and keeping them on a diet of puppy food or commercial 'Spike' hedgehog food (available from Mole Country store, and elsewhere), possibly with the addition of live mealworms, garden worms and beetles. Unfortunately, although they can be brought up to this weight, the shock of putting them out to hibernate late in the year would also result in them not surviving until spring so they need to be looked after until then.



In order that an ongoing assessment of the state of the hedgehog population can be understood in Milborne it has been suggested by the Dorset Hedgehog Preservation Group (an offshoot of the Dorset Mammal Society) that there should be a co-ordinator in the village. This would help to make our village a hedgehog friendly village. Bere Regis, Dorchester, Blandford Forum, Bridport, Halstock and Piddletrenthide are already set up as hedgehog friendly, so I believe we should become one too. I am prepared to take on this job, but need support from others in the village. To this end I would be grateful if anyone who is interested to become champions for their road or area or reporting sightings of hedgehogs and their size, alive or dead, and where they have been seen. A map of sightings will be created with a mark for each sighting which will be constantly updated. Advice will be available as how to make gardens more hedgehog friendly especially considering they may travel up to two miles each night of foraging.

It is proposed that a meeting will be held if enough people show an interest, with an introductory talk by a representative of the Dorset Mammal Group, as well as further information for those interested. Occasional meetings will be called so that people can be updated on a regular basis.

To the Editor

Milborne Broadband

I read with some interest the report on Milborne's woes with BT Openreach Broadband and thought it worthwhile to report on my own experiences in the hope that it might just provide some help to any with ongoing problems.

On June 1st I upgraded to a BTHub5 after a number of reasonably successful years with a BTHub2 and BT Youview box, powered through Line adapters. Following the upgrade everything seemed to work, WiFi, Broadband (including BBC iplayer on the Desktop and laptop computers, mobile phones and android devices) – that is everything was working except iplayer playback on the TV via the Youview box. However I also noticed that the BThub was a frequently dropping service – going from green to yellow on a daily basis.

Between June 1st and July 20th, I had four visits from BT engineers, two deliveries of new power line adapters and numerous discussions over the phone as I was taken through reboots, resets and goodness knows what else, sometimes by people I could barely understand. However no real progress was made until I lodged a formal complaint, via the website sometime in early July. After three fruitless visits by BT engineers it was determined that the equipment was OK and the fault lay outside the house.

The main problem was that the new Hubs (BtHub5) are more sensitive than the old hubs and are susceptible to the vagaries of old existing wiring systems, DIY extensions and need to be installed on the primary (main) telephone socket, which in our house was difficult to determine. The original hub was connected directly to the main computer via a convenient telephone socket extension in our study and had not proved to be a problem in the past. Once the main telephone socket had been determined and the new hub connected via that socket all problems disappeared and it has worked non-stop since July 20th with no reboots, resets or any outside intervention – even through electrical power cuts.

Telephone line crackles in the past had been traced to frayed sheath on the telephone input cable, caused by incorrectly raised scaffolding.

The conclusion is make sure you use the main telephone socket to connect your hub, make a formal complaint and demand financial reimbursement for loss of service, get the right engineer (not always possible) to visit to ensure that there are no equipment failures, and no line problems external to your property. Although the engineers said that often new equipment is faulty this was not so in my experience, and I now have spare powerline adapters. But they will take that option first! If you have had a good service and now this has disappeared with an upgrade, herein may be some help.

Cooking Christmas dinner for a large family gathering

EVERY year there are so many new ideas for Christmas food, many of them promising a "twist" on a traditional recipe. My view is that as we only have Christmas dinner once a year, there is no real need for novelty. With so many flavours on the plate – turkey, stuffing, bread sauce, cranberry sauce, gravy, pigs in blankets, roast potatoes, roast parsnips, carrots etc. why would anyone want to complicate things with a "fancy dan" recipe for sprouts combined with some unheard of and exotic ingredient? Fresh sprouts, cooked lightly to perfection, are delicious and do not deserve the bad press they sometimes have. Keep it simple.

Preparing Christmas dinner for a crowd is very hard work but it's no secret that you should try to prepare and cook as much as possible the day before and then there is slightly less to do on the big day. Also there are lots of good quality convenience foods to buy which will save on work, but of course they cost a lot more money. Sort out the number of plates, glasses, cutlery, large saucepans, chairs etc. that you will need – don't leave it until Christmas Eve. I have used a wallpaper-pasting table to give extra table space, or borrow a table from a neighbour.

If you are choosing traditional turkey, I find it works well to buy two smaller birds rather than one monster-sized one. I cook one turkey a day or two in advance, carve and put the slices on a foil covered heatproof platter and keep it in the fridge, then heat it up in the bottom of the oven while the roast potatoes and parsnips are cooking. Doubtless the "health and safety" police would disapprove but I haven't had a disaster yet! The other turkey can be cooked on the big day, so the whole house still smells delicious and there will be less carving to do at the last minute. Cooking ahead means you can make the gravy ahead too with the turkey juices from the first turkey. A smaller turkey will take a lot less time to cook and take up less oven space on the day; also it will probably fit in a normal sized roasting tin. If you haven't already got one, then I would strongly recommend buying a meat thermometer. It takes a lot of the guesswork out of knowing when your roast is cooked to your liking – all the year round.

If you would like to serve goose, then I would still recommend cooking a small turkey the day before. A goose is delicious but there won't be masses of meat for everyone, the turkey will make the goose "stretch" to feed more people (and goose is rather expensive!) It's better to have a bit too much poultry rather than be panicking that there isn't enough to go round, also turkey is great for the inevitable sandwiches on Boxing Day. You can always freeze any leftovers and use them up in the New Year. If your family has any teenagers, then there certainly won't be a problem with leftovers . . .

If you are used to cooking for two, it may be a surprise to find how much longer it takes to cook a large quantity of anything. The challenge is to balance leaving enough time to cook everything with keeping everything warm if it is ready too soon. Again, see if you can borrow any hot trays etc. A pile of clean towels will insulate foil-covered food. Don't worry about the turkey; it will keep warm for ages.

Guests will usually offer to help. Decide beforehand whether your policy will be "many hands make light work" or "too many cooks spoil the broth"!

The main piece of advice is to pin a smile on your face and ignore any culinary disasters, the happiness of the guests is more important than perfection with the food. The chances are that, after a glass of sherry or two, no one will even notice. Although tempting, it's best for the cook to stay alcohol free until the cooking is complete, you will need all your wits about you coordinating the whole show.

Also I never serve a "starter" at the table but prefer to offer a few very simple nibbles before we all sit down.

Christmas pudding and mince pies are easy to organise. If you want to make a simple and cheap alternative to Christmas pudding then simply mix some slightly softened vanilla ice cream with half a dozen crushed mince pies, squash the mix into a pudding basin and return to the freezer until ready to unmould it. After all that hard work you can relax and put your feet up with a well-earned glass of something – let someone else do the washing up . . . Merry Christmas!

In your Garden Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *designerGardens* Plants to brighten up your December

IT'S always good to have some evergreens in the border to provide you with some colour and structure - even if it is green over the winter months. They are not all dull and boring however as some may have flowers or interesting foliage. One such is Viburnum tinus 'Eve Price' (right). As viburnums go, it is fairly compact growing to a maximum of two metres height and spread if you don't prune it. It flowers from December to March and in autumn has bunches of metallic blue berries. Its dark leathery leaves are the perfect foil to the flat clusters of pink buds and



white scented flowers. As well as a stand-alone shrub, it can be grown as a hedge and I have seen it alternating with a beech hedge making a striking formal hedge.

Foliage plants to plant are Heuchera 'Silver Scrolls' – silver leaves with purple on the reverse side; Nandina domestica which turns a gorgeous red in the winter and has red berries in the winter which can be used in flower arrangements; Euphorbia amygdaloides 'Purpurea' has deep purple leaves and lime green new growth – a hardy old thing



lovely variegated golden holly Ilex 'Golden King' is actually female and Ilex 'Golden Queen' is male. Other good female hollies to try are: Ilex 'JC Van Tol' (*bottom, left*), Ilex 'Alaska' and Ilex 'Ripley Gold' – which is variegated. Hollies can get rather large but can be kept in check by pruning. The bright red berries are a good source of food for hungry birds too.

Apples and pears, currants and autumn-fruiting raspberries can be pruned any time from leaf drop until March, but never prune stone

fruit in the winter, as the retreating sap can draw in the airborne fungus, silver-leaf.

Other things to do this month include planting out your tulips, this is the last month in which you can do this; prune your grapevines now as they are fully dormant; force rhubarb by

> covering the crowns with a layer of straw and exclude light by covering with



an upturned bucket; keep your ponds clear of fallen leaves by removing them regularly and keep feeding the birds. Maureen Lock

which will grow in sun or part shade. Then we have the coloured stems of the dogwoods. Cornus 'Flaviramea' has yellow stems and contrasts perfectly with the darker stems of Cornus 'Kesselringii' and the red stems of Cornus 'Sibirica'. Cornus do need to be pruned hard back in late March just as the new growth is developing.

Hollies, of course, look fabulous in the winter with their glossy foliage and berries. To guarantee berries, you will need to have a male holly nearby – however, not all names can be relied upon for example the





November 2016

On to the next stage, with guidance from Richard Macnair at a workshop, we will be trying transfer all the research, the questionnaire analysis, and all the answers in the comments in that questionnaire, into a detailed list from which we may be able to put together a draft plan, or unfortunately we might find other areas we have to still research. Many thanks to Richard for all his help.

Fears about wholesale building in MSA? All your comments, and all our research, demonstrates the need for our Community to have a strong Neighbourhood Plan in place to get our views firmly in place in any new developments. Parking – the planned parking meets county standards for smaller dwellings, the group feels this may not be enough, there was no parking provision for visitors.

Flooding – Sewage could be linked into Fox View, with a soakaway to slow down any rainwater impact.

Affordability –as they are smaller units, it is envisaged that they should be affordable in the private market.

Design – the design of the building may possibly follow on from Fox View in type (brick and flint).

Sustainability – They hope to investigate the viability of fitting solar tiles (panels) at time of building.

Privacy – The design of any building should endeavour to ensure existing buildings are not overlooked.

Bin storage – not yet designed in, the road would probably be unadopted, (bins taken down to Little England). Mr Miller was asked to look at the issues surrounding this issue.

Quenton Miller was thanked, and once again informed that all information submitted would be shared. *Full details of all the*

IN Thomas Hardy's time, before the coming of organs in village churches, it was normal for the accompaniment to be provided by a village band made up of a few amateur musicians. They would sit in a gallery at the west end of the church and, hence, their style of music, and their Christmas carols in particular, became known as West Gallery. You can read of their sometimes less than reputable activities in Hardy's 'Under the Greenwood Tree'.

West Gallery music has undergone something of a revival in recent years with professionals such as the Mellstock Band and many amateur groups like the Ridgeway Singers and Band. The Ridgeway Singers first got together in 2013 to present Christmas concerts at a number of churches along the Dorset Ridgeway as part of the Artsreach Ridgeway Project, led by Phil Humphries and Tim Laycock.

Tim is a well-known folksinger and concertina player whose singing

is inspired by his native county, Dorset, and has a distinctive West Country flavour. Phil is a classically trained trombone player but, perhaps, best known locally as serpent player with the Mellstock Band.

These concerts were a great success from the outset with both performers and audiences alike and the group now performs throughout the year and has grown to some forty singers and eight or more musicians.

This Christmas, the Ridgeway Singers and Band are coming to Winterborne Whitechurch with a seasonal celebration of all things Dorset. They will be at **St. Mary's Church on Friday 9th December**, **starting at 7.30pm** when there will, of course, be appropriate refreshments available.
