



James gave us a most interesting and entertaining talk about the history of the farm and his family's five generations long association with it. Along with the old, there was also an update about some of the modern technology used in farming nowadays, all fascinating stuff.

After the talk we had the opportunity to browse the farm shop and make our purchases before strolling round the estate. The highlight for me was the visit to the ancient St. Mary's church dating back to the fourteenth century, set amidst the farm's beautiful gardens and surrounded by idyllic Dorset countryside, looking at its very best in the warm sunshine.

We then drove a couple of miles down the valley to the Langton Arms at Tarrant Monkton which Barbara has been managing since they bought the pub over thirty years ago. A delicious leisurely

John Ryall 14th June 1933 - 8th September 2021

John spent his childhood in Swanage, which coincided with the war, and the arrival of the Americans which gave lots of

down the slopes at Durlston just above the cliffs, play football, explore the countryside and, in the process, collect all sorts of war paraphernalia, were all part of the wartime adventure. The latter were stashed under his bed unbeknown to his parents! Going forward to his call up time he joined the RAF and surprisingly joined the bomb squad of 417. After leaving the RAF he took up engineering and draughtsmanship which covered everything from forklift trucks, aircraft, industrial washing machines and oil refineries.

John met Sheila and they married in 1960. It was "the beginning of their wonderful life together",

Two children followed. John and the family spent the next six years in Western Australia, which was an eye opener in many ways, getting used to a different kind of life and having to deal with spiders and snakes, all of which could kill. Returning to England, the family set up home in Dorset and settled into village life in Milborne in 1974. The family has lived here ever since.

John was a dedicated small bore rifle shooter, both in England and Australia, and passed on his experience and knowledge to others. John became state captain in Western Australia and a role model, and with his ability to help and coach others he raised the State team to higher stakes than they thought possible. It was all about encouragement and enthusiasm which in the end achieved a bronze medal in the Australian Championships and he was put forward as shooting's representative for the Australian Sporting Association Sportsman of the year. These things carried him through life to cope with many challenges as those who knew him will vouch for.

Although ill health had to see him give up his shooting he

JOHN RYALL was born at Durlston, Swanage on 14th June 1933. then turned his skills to archery which he continued to shoot until the last couple of years, buzzing up and down the archery field on his scooter. Again he took to this sport jumping opportunity for play, sport and 'adventure'. Being able to sledge in with both feet, often learning the hard way but never would

he give up.

He enjoyed taking part in competitions and this rubbed off on his family where all became archers with his same enthusiasm. Although not a coach he imparted a lot of knowledge to others and was often asked for advice which he loved to give.

Anything John undertook he completed to the highest standards he could, his skills were far ranging, and he has passed on his skills to his children. He would give his time freely and was never happier than when helping others achieve and succeed. He was a true 'coach' and his approach embodied the belief that you didn't actually tell people what

to do, but you told them how to do it so they could achieve the results themselves.

He loved art and his talents soon revealed themselves during his time in the RAF. Very quickly he was in high demand using his skills to decorate and paint pictures and motifs on the backs of leather flying jackets. All through his life these artistic skills and his great sense of humour led to many caricatures and cartoons of colleagues - no one was safe! When not shooting his bow he loved painting - no, not decorating, but he loved the challenge of painting portraits, landscapes and racing yachts. He was a perfectionist, so was never really happy with the outcome even though the rest of us thought they were perfect. Mixing colours was such a skill, and to see him build a picture was amazing – his drawing skills he has passed on and his sense of humour too. We have many happy memories, John was always there for his family and those around him and he has left a huge gap.

We are so lucky with all the friends we have made and are so thankful that we chose to live in Milborne St. Andrew.

Riding for the disabled - at the October WI

'IT'S what you CAN do that counts': It was to address this core message from the Riding for the Disabled Association (RDA) that we welcomed Sue Hodder and Barbara Rawlings to our second meeting of the vear in the Village Hall. Sue and Barbara took us through the work of the RDA both nationally and locally, its aim being to try to enrich the lives



There are 500 groups nationally, supporting adults, children or both. All are individual charities, there is no funding and the costs have to be found by each group. With 18,000 volunteers and three million-plus hours of support for 25,000 RDA participants this is a huge and valuable enterprise.

The Milton Abbas group has been around for over 25 years and Sue and Barbara have been involved for much of that time. They offer therapeutic riding for children only, although adults are catered for elsewhere in Dorset. The children have a variety of disabilities, many on the autistic spectrum, some physical and some non-verbal.

Benefits for the children include an increase in mobility, core strength and muscle-tone, as well as improved co-ordination. Many will talk to a pony when they will not communicate with an adult! Sue took us through a typical session of activity: each child would have the same pony and the same helpers every time so that often a valuable rapport is built up between the rider and the pony.



Needless to say we were all captivated by the stories Sue and Barbara told, of them very emotional, and they spent much valuable time answering our queries. However, it is clear that the needs of each child be very labourintensive and volunteers are always being sought to

assist. Such volunteers do not need to have experience with horses or disabled children, and will be made very welcome.

Business Matters: After refreshments, Josie reminded us that essentials for the Food Bank were still needed and could be brought along to the WI, St. Andrew's Church, or any supermarket. Linda reported on the new arrangements for Remembrance Sunday on 14th November. She will organise a wreath from the WI. Any cakes for the refreshments afterwards in the Village Hall will be welcome.

We have been operating for over 10 years covering the numerous villages in the surgery's catchment area, and while we have over 30 drivers, only three of them hail from Milborne St. Andrew – the biggest village by population that we serve. There used to be six drivers and slowly this number has diminished so it really is time to ask the good people of Milborne St. Andrew to step up to the mark and support your fellow community members who are without basic transport to get to and from their medical appointments.

We will cover your mileage costs at 45p per mile, and you can offer as much or as little time as you wish. We understand that volunteers have a life outside of Neighbourcar but all support will be gratefully received. It will be necessary for us to conduct a DBS check but our Recruiting Officer can go through that detail when she meets up with you.



Finding the still centre

November is a month when a number of occasions remind us of the uncertainty and fragility of life. At All Souls' we remember those who have died and are now at rest with God, and Remembrance Day faces us with the tragedies of wars past and present and the loss and damage they have done, and that conflict still brings to the lives of people in our world.

Coronavirus has also brought much uncertainty into our world. None of us knows how long the pandemic will last, how many mutations the virus will undergo, the length of time that vaccines will remain effective and so

And for many people the rising costs of living, fuel prices, tax rises and so on have left worry and anxiety in our minds.

And then there is the speed at which our world runs, and the busyness and over-high demands and expectations we put on ourselves and others.

There are few people who can say they truly don't know what it feels like to be stressed or anxious.

One really good way of ensuring we stay grounded and centred in this vastly uncertain and ever-changing environment is by having a still centre to our being. How do we achieve that?

There is a long tradition of Christian prayer that enables people to do just this, to find a still centre in their souls, as the world rushes on around them. Knowing that whatever happens, God is holding us and providing a firm foundation for our lives really can help us to withstand the demands and vagaries of 21st-century expectations and stresses.

Contemplation and meditation have long been used by Christians to help find this calm centre that leads to the ability to stay unflustered and unhurried by life and its burdens.

Retreats and quiet days are positive ways of finding time for cultivating a still centre. But we can't be on a retreat or quiet day every day, much as we may like it. Times away from the hustle and bustle are wonderful and we all need them, but the real skill is in cultivating a still centre in the midst of every day.

It's a skill, but it's one we can all learn. The first step is desire, wanting to find that space within us that keeps us rooted in God and then making opportunities for that to happen in our daily lives. We can do it anywhere - standing in the shopping queue, waiting for someone in the car, five minutes' peace before the children get up or after they go to bed, a lunch break away from your desk.

We've become a society that finds silence and stillness very difficult. We've also become a society where mental health is poor. I am sure the two are linked.

Our church buildings are open every day, so if you have nowhere else to find quiet and stillness, please use them. It's one of the gifts we can offer to everyone in our communities.

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News from Trading Standards

CONSUMERS wanting to avoid financial fraud now have a secure and easy-to-remember phone number to contact their banks on in order to avoid painful scams. It could prove to be the safest way for many to contact their provider if they have suspicions or concerns about any of their accounts.

Stop Scams UK and Global Cyber Alliance have launched a UK-wide 159 call service, which is designed to guarantee consumers a safe route to contacting their banks about any products they hold with them.

The scheme is urging people to "stop, hang up and call 159" to check calls are for real. The idea is to help those who believe they have been contacted by scammers claiming to be their bank, or by fraudsters who encourage them to transfer money.

According to Stop Scams UK, criminal gangs stole over £470 million from individuals and small businesses last year by pretending to be a bank or other service provider, encouraging consumers to falsely make a payment or transfer money.

Currently, banks that cover over 70% of UK current account customers are signed up to the scheme at launch, although more are expected to follow.

People are being urged to call 159 if they encounter the following:

- Someone contacts you claiming to be from your bank even if they do not seem suspicious.
- You are contacted by someone claiming to be an authority figure (such as the police) and told to transfer money – even if the request seems genuine.
- You receive a call about a financial matter and it appears suspicious.

If you have fallen for a scam and you want advice on what to do then call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline freephone 0808 223 1133 or visit their website at Citizens Advice Consumer Service.

PC works through bulging inbox at **October meeting**

MUCH of October's Parish Council meeting, attended by four councillors, was taken up by discussion of the 16 items of correspondence it had received from a variety of sources. Some were swiftly dealt with, such as the refusal of the request from Blandford Town Council for a donation towards its public toilets, quickly flushed away by councillors.

Other items created a lot more discussion; a number of emails from the Sports Club were considered, including that of the canopy shelter that had been previously discussed. Chair, Cllr Macnair was concerned that it looked different to the original proposal; now it looked bigger and fully concreted in, comparable with the large, metal barn on Water Barn Lane. An email from the Sports Club regarding a new electronic code gate lock drew concern about data protection, security issues and the practicalities of the system. Since each user had an individual code, Cllr Stephens wondered if there may be an issue with blame being wrongly apportioned to the last user in an untoward event happening. Cllr Macnair agreed, saying it was a GDPR minefield and would want full, formal details of how it was intended to work, noting that the PC had joint responsibility - and cost - of any new system.

Further talk about the Sports Club with reference to its newsletter about its future plans, including an outside toilet, started a discussion that drew strong opinions from councillors that became personal towards Mr Lock, chair of the club, who was not present at the meeting. Cllr Macnair stated that the PC sees the relationship between itself and the Sports Club as a "mutually supportive relationship rather than the characterisation of a landlord-tenant" one where power is one-sided. He said that correspondence to the PC was taken at face value and any request was considered on its own merit.

Cllr Stephens had spoken with the Huntley Down site manager following correspondence about 'Milborne's three peaks' at the building site. She was told that the heaps will be staying for the foreseeable future but will not be increasing in size. The contractor has dug trenches to act as attenuation and a 1.2m bund is in the plan as flood prevention which the spoil will be used for, as well as distributing around the site.

A planning application to enlarge the Village Hall car park (see page 23) came too late to be included on the agenda so will be discussed at the next meeting if an extension to the planning deadline was not agreed. An extraordinary meeting would be called if not.

A donation of £100 was agreed for refreshments at a Remembrance Day buffet at the Village Hall after the official service at the Memorial Stone. Mr Lewin – as a resident – said that it would be returned if not needed since donations of food and drink were being offered by others. The clerk had confirmed earlier that the new bench would be in place at the stone before the day, a donation from an anonymous resident. It will be installed free of charge by Mr Lewin and the PC's grass cutting contractors.

A resident had asked, via the Reporter's Facebook page, if council meetings could be streamed live for those who could not attend in person. It was agreed to include the item on the next

Applications for grants for community purposes are now being accepted by the PC, with the grant funding window ending on 24th November. Continued on page 29

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
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More parking planned at Village Hall

THE Village Hall hopes to increase the car parking at the venue by extending the existing car park into the recreation ground. Plans have been submitted that will increase parking by over 65% of the present 16 spaces with the tarmacking of approximately 250m² of the park. In its application, the Village Hall says the current parking is frequently inadequate for popular clubs and events hosted at the hall, hence the need to increase capacity to 27 spaces. It is intended that the infrastructure for up to six charging points for electric vehicles will be created during the construction. 





Attagirls by Paul Olavesen-Stabb



THIS book tells a fictional story, based on an actual lady pilot of the Air Transport Auxiliary. She was a scion of the Marshall family of Cambridge, so plenty there to interest this particular reader, who hails from that fair city, and whose grandfather was given an award for his assiduous firewatching at Marshalls airfield during the period of the book's story.

The book gives a lot of detail around the setting up of the ATA, the

difficulties faced by the pilots (not just the ladies, those considered 'unfit' due to injuries incurred in the previous unpleasantness) and its attempt to prove itself as a true part of the war effort. I found the description of the logistics of flying 50 spitfires up to Scotland to be loaded onto the USS Wasp for delivery to Malta extremely interesting. Without the ATA to move aircraft around, fighting pilots would have had to be diverted from their task.

This could have been an excellent book, but sadly it was written for the American market, and the constant use of the word 'license' for a permit to fly didn't sit right with this reader, who believes that a licence licenses one to do something. Nor did referring to the British Empire as the Commonwealth, which wasn't actually created until 1949. Simple research into this kind of fact was missing, yet a whole load of research into the female struggle for recognition has been included.

The fictional story and writing style are a bit 'Mills and Boon' for this reader. The gang of girls who became friends, and how they coped with the loss of loved ones in accidents when navigation aids and radio were denied to the pilots had a heavy overlay of shallowness. The ending was utterly predictable, and the descriptions of gossipy old village ladies who add no value to the progress of the sisterhood somewhat trite. Many of the gossipy old village ladies I have met did wonderful and interesting things in their heyday, and have useful things to say about life today; I can't believe this was different in 1941.

The book took two evenings to read. It might fill a sunny afternoon sitting under a tree in the shade, but you would neither learn from it nor put it down feeling 'that was a corker'. I shall now re-read 'Spitfire Women of World War II' by Giles Whittell. It's not fiction, but it's a cracking read. Susan Wilson

Busy roundabout closed in **November**

RESURFACING works will close the A35 Poole Hill Roundabout, Bere Regis, for four nights and one day in early November.



Dorset Highways is carrying out structural repairs as well as applying a new road surface as part of its ongoing maintenance work across the county. Due to the treatment

being used – where the foundation layers will need to cure – the work includes a 24-hour daytime closure.

The road closures are:

- Roundabout and approaches closed 8.00pm Monday 1st November to 6.00am Tuesday 2nd November.
- Roundabout and approaches closed 8.00pm Tuesday 2nd November to 6.00am Wednesday 3rd November.
- Roundabout and approaches closed 8.00pm Wednesday 3rd November to 6.00am Friday 5th November.
- The roundabout and approaches will be closed all day Thursday 4th November.

The signed diversion uses roads of the same classification as the road closed, so drivers travelling from the east or west will be signed to use the A35, A350 and A31, and drivers from the south will be signed to use the A352 and A351 to join this route.

Drivers can choose their own alternative route suitable to their vehicle.

A statement was issued following correspondence with the internal auditor, Rosie Darkin-Miller.
