Our outing to Winchester on 4th July has been cancelled, instead we are taking a trip on the steam train from Norden to Swanage, having lunch at Swanage returning home





THE BENEFICE OF PUDDLETOWN, TOLPUDDLE AND MILBORNE WITH DEWLISH PART OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN THE DIOCESE OF SALISBURY

Dear friends

I hope you have been enjoying some of the pictures on our television screens and in our newspapers of the Olympic torch as it is carried through so many communities throughout the UK. The Olympic flame arrived in this country on 18th May and since then is being passed through 1,000 communities in its 8,000 mile journey to the Olympic Stadium in London. There have been some inspiring pictures of special people chosen by their communities to carry the torch and crowds have gathered to cheer them on.

The Olympic flame was lit from the sun's rays in a traditional ceremony among the ruins of the home of the Ancient Games in Greece. The Flame is then delivered to the Host Country, where it is transferred from one Torchbearer to another, spreading the message of peace, unity and friendship.

Less well publicised is that special prayers have been written to accompany the flame on its journey. Here are two of them:

Loving God, as this torch travels our nation, preparing us to celebrate the skill and determination of those competing in the Olympic and Paralympic Games, strengthen us to love you and serve our neighbour with all the skill and determination you give us, through Christ, the light of the world. Amen.

As this light travels our nation, may your light, O God, shine in the hearts of all who gather to celebrate the energy, skill and dedication of others. Send your Holy Spirit to light up our lives and set our hearts on fire with love for you; through Christ our Lord. Amen

The Bishop of Truro, the Rt Revd Tim Thornton was the first to use one of the new prayers at a special event marking the arrival of the torch at Land's End at the start of its journey through the UK. A large beacon was lit to symbolise the Gospel coming into Cornwall via the first Celtic missionaries and there was a special ceremony of blessing for a Prayer Relay baton, which is to be handed over from community to community alongside the flame.

We are excited that the Olympic Torch and the prayer relay baton will be carried through Milborne St. Andrew and Puddletown on the 12th July. As we gather to wave it on to the next community with its message of peace, friendship and unity you may like to say one of the Olympic prayers.

Olympic Torch Relay Comes to Light up Milborne St. Andrew

LIKE it or not, love it or loathe it on 12th July 2012 at 12.17pm the Olympic Torch Relay will pass through the village leaving the village at 12.30pm.

The Torch Relay will start at the top of Blandford Hill by the factory and then progress to the Square where a changeover of the Torchbearers will take place and then move on to Dorchester Hill. Then it is back onto the transport to take the Torch to Puddletown, finishing that evening in Weymouth, the site of the Olympic Sailing competition.

This event will not be seen again in our or our children's lifetime. It is therefore fitting for the people of Milborne St. Andrew and those of the many surrounding villages to enjoy and celebrate this unique occasion.

We have no idea how many people will want to witness the event but it has been suggested that up to two thousand people could witness the Torch Relay in our village. Arrangements are being made to ensure that crowd control/marshals will be in place to help people stay on the limited available footways. However, it is important that everyone consider theirs and their children's own safety. The Torch Relay is formed of a convoy of up to 12 vehicles, in front of and behind the Torchbearer. The Torchbearer will be flanked by a team of specially trained officers from the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS) known as the Torch Security Team (TST). This event will, by the time you read this, be well practiced and honed to a fine art.

In front of the convoy and a little ahead in time will come the Olympic Sponsors vehicles providing entertainment, followed by the Torch Relay security and other vehicles for the Torchbearers and the changeover and of course a back up flame to re-ignite the torch in the case it goes out.

Practical Issues for the day

Car Parking

It is hoped the majority of people will arrive on foot but for those who have to drive that day, please consider car sharing. Parking in the village is limited but arrangements are in hand to provide car parking, subject to confirmation from the landowners and Village Hall Trustees. at:

- 1. The Factory car park in Lane End at the top of Blandford Hill.
- 2. Limited parking at the Village Hall.
- 3. On the track in the Grove by Chapel Street.

We wish to thank Mr Ferguson of Camelco and the Village Hall Trustees in anticipation of their assistance and Mr Marc Frampton of Manor Farm who has agreed that visitors can park from the blue gate up to the pillars at The Grove but requests nowhere else on his land.

No parking will be allowed along the route of the Torch Relay and the Police may remove vehicles if parked on the road, footways or inappropriate locations. Be warned!

Toilets

Extremely limited public availability, however The Royal Oak will be open and it is hoped to have the Village Hall available also.

Refreshments

The Royal Oak will be open for refreshments, it is also hoped to have an ice cream van and the Fish and Chip wagon on site during the event.

Remember to bring water if the weather is sunny.

Competitions

Best decorated house in the village. A competition to be judged by our County Councillor Mrs Hilary Cox, District Councillor Mrs Jane Somper and Chairman of the Parish Council Mrs Janet Allen. A meal voucher for the sum of £30.00 has been generously donated by Sarah Fox of The Royal Oak for the winner.

Competitions are being arranged for the children of Milborne St. Andrew First School and a separate competition for those attending Ladybirds.

Decorating The Village

It is hoped that as much as possible of the route of the Torch Relay will be decorated with flags and bunting to show off our village as we are going to be on national television.

Crowd Control/Marshals

A number of volunteers have already put themselves forward for the important role of crowd control/marshals on the day. There will be a training session for those who can attend but advice and training will be provided prior to the event for those who cannot attend the official training. Insurance will be given to those who have signed up.

Fluorescent vests will be provided for the event to be returned.

The Police will control road junctions by means of rolling roadblocks and traffic wishing to use the A354 between Puddletown and Blandford and vice versa will be seriously delayed. No one will be allowed to overtake the Olympic Torch Relay Convoy along its route.

Litter Picking

Following the event later that day it is hoped that volunteers will give their names forward to Councillor Janet Allen, telephone 837551, so that we can help clean up the village from the inevitable dropped litter. Bags will be provided.

It is hoped that everyone has a great and memorable time and will join in the spirit of the moment.

'Best Ever' May Fayre raises over £1,100

THIS year's May Fayre and Dog Show was branded the 'best ever', with good attendance and raising over £1,100. Dodging the unseasonal weather May had seen, the event was even blessed with some sunshine.

The fayre was opened by Wessex FM's Steve Bulley and Blandford town crier Jean Wells. At her side was protégé Dick Pointer, who blasted Milborne with his horn. They both arrived at the Recreation Ground courtesy of the new community transport, Bus2Go. By the end of the afternoon, Dick was announced as Milborne's official crier.

Wessex Karate Academy gave a display of their style of karate, goju ryu, to an enthralled crowd. Sensei Peter Thompson led the 22 strong group through basic moves, then moved on to other kata (sequence of moves) in smaller groups. One of these included Amber Clark and Harry Hamilton, both seven years old and from Milborne, who have recently excelled at a Southern Counties competition, winning medals. More senior members then demonstrated their prowess with kobudo (Okinawan weapons), which included a display of bo combat, using six foot long staffs.

Entrants in the dog show competed across a range of Olympic themed classes, including Hurdles, 'Total Recall' and Fancy Dress. A spectrum of skill levels was displayed over the hurdles, with top spot on the podium going to Bee, an eight year old Border collie owned by Jill Pitman. (See separate dog show report).

Dorset Search Dogs gave a wonderful display of their dogs' finely tuned sense of smell, and search skills. Many fayre goers took up the opportunity to 'get lost at no cost, get found for two pounds' by one of the five dogs the team brought along. The willing participants hid, under cover, above the bank behind the MUGA and waited to see if an excited canine nose would find them. Once detected - as they always were - the 'lost' person heard a short bark and the search dog would return to their handler to 'tell' them that they had found their



quarry, and lead them to it. Many thanks go to Dorset Search Dogs for giving a great demonstration. All proceeds go towards the valuable work the team of volunteers do assisting police forces across the south finding missing persons.

Keeping the crowd informed of the afternoon's entertainment was Jon Riddle, who did so with great humour to universal agreement. He provided a comedic running commentary during the dog show and plenty of banter as he roamed the fayre stalls. He may well have earned himself a residency . . .

Amongst a variety of stalls and sideshows were the Food and Wine Society's raffle for two locally sourced 'foodie' hampers; 'splat the rat'; a huge bouncy giraffe slide, the WI jarbola stall, fishing game, Gerry's plants stall, football target game, a jewellery stall and D-Fur dog accessories. The barbecue proved very popular, and with cream teas, the Church cake stall and ice creams also on offer, fayre goers were certainly kept satisfied.

A big 'well done' to all those that took part and made this year's May Fayre a success once again.

Great Sports at Olympic Dog Show

THE 'Olympic' Dog Show at this year's May Fayre attracted a record 53 canine entrants from Milborne and surrounding areas. Competing across six classes, the Hurdles and the Recall classes proved most popular – and provided the best entertainment for spectators.

The Fancy Dress class saw dogs dressed as Olympic competitors and included a synchronised swimmer and a rower, both Jack Russells. But the winner was Georgie, a tacked up 'show-jumper' (English springer spaniel) and her rider, three year old Samuel Richards.

Twenty two dogs of all shapes, sizes and varieties were paraded in the 'Adonis and Aphrodite' class (best adult). Judge, David Harding, of Damory Veterinary Clinic cast his eye among the

contestants and picked out a beautiful and elegant whippet, Lola Garcia, as the winner. In the Junior Olympian class, open to dogs up to the age of 18 months, the gold rosette was awarded to Lucy owned by Blake Langhorn. Joining him on the podium was Bramble, a three month old pointer pup and bronze winner Merlin, a seven month old



Leonberger, who struggled to fit onto the podium – not surprising, since being a relative of the St. Bernand and Pyrenean mountain dog.

A spectrum of skill levels was seen during the Hurdles class, providing both laughs and spectacle for the crowd. Timed against the stopwatch, each competitor had to jump the series of three hurdles, turn, and then return back over them. Some were obvious novices,



but loved by the spectators all the more for it. Others showed real agility and speed and flew over the hurdles. Finishing times ranged up to 49 seconds (including penalties added), but the winner, clocking an impressive 7.47 seconds, was Bee, an eight year old Border Collie owned by Jill Pitman.

Next was the turn of the veterans in the Ancient Olympian class and this saw eleven entries. Winner of this class was Olive, a Labrador owned

by Isobel Meadows. Silver rosette was taken by Molly, a nine year old Westie owned by Toni Pall and third was Ruby, a Briard owned by Sue Benn.

To round the show off was "an Olympic test of recall" – all the handler had to do was call their dog to them when released by judge, David Harding. The only thing between their dog and them was a minefield of distraction – dog toys, tennis balls and sausages. The Total Recall class tested the entrants' obedience to the limit; was he to be waylaid by a sausage or return to his master's feet immediately? In all but a handful of cases, it was the sausages what won it! A number of 'DNF's were recorded (Did Not Finish), as the sausages were systematically hoovered up from the grass without a second look to the waiting owner. There were three clear winners, split by less than a second. Gold winner by a whisker was Lucy, her second of the day. Taking silver was Ozzie, a six year old Labrador (yes, a Labrador) owned by Sarah Fox; and third was George, a collie cross retriever, owned by Hazel Ingram.

Many thanks to all who entered in the spirit and took part in the dog show, making it successful and enjoyable. Thanks also to the *Reporter* for their support and Wagg Foods for providing treats for prizes. Once again thanks go to David Harding of Damory Veterinary Clinic for giving his time and expertise in the tricky task of judging the classes. 

More than a Movie with

'The Help' (12)

at Milborne St. Andrew Village Hall on Friday 6th July and the event starts at 7.30 pm

THE story of this film, which is adapted from Kathryn Stockett's book, is set in Mississippi during the civil rights movement of the 1960s. It is about Skeeter (Stone) who is a southern society girl returned from college who is determined to become a writer. Possessing observation skills and humanity that her lifelong friends can't comprehend, Skeeter desperately wants to write a book detailing the African-American maids' point of view on the white families for which they work, and the hardships they go through on a daily basis. As expected, the maids are hesitant, but Aibileen (Viola Davis) does relent. The stories begin to flow and soon the robust Minny (Octavia Spencer) joins in. From their improbable alliance a remarkable sisterhood emerges, instilling all of them with the courage, but not before everyone in town has a thing or two to say, when they become unwittingly and unwillingly caught up in the changing times.

This incredible film is phenomenally cast, with strong writing and direction from Tate Taylor. There are so many fantastic details in the film with classic cars, wardrobe, hair and make-up, which perfectly shows up the class differentials from the late 50's and early 60's, not forgetting the TV and radio segments which provide context and timing with the deaths of Medgar Evers and JFK. "The Help" may not tell the whole story of black domestic workers, but it offers a more personal spin on the Civil Rights Movement than most of us have seen.


School News

May Weather in Milborne St. Andrew

THE first three weeks of May were damp and gloomy with daytime temperatures struggling to get above mid-teens but, in contrast, the last week of May was dry, warm, and sunny with temperatures in the upper twenties which brought the average temperature for the month to 13.4° C. The Central England Temperature for May was 0.3° C above the 30 year mean.

Total rainfall in May was 52.9mm which was 95% of average. At the time of writing on 12th June the rainfall for June has already been twice the average for the month and the prospects for the summer weather are looking bleak; but the weather in May and June is often inversely related to the weather in July and August. After a wet May and cold June in 1983, there were only nine days of rain in the following two months and July was the hottest July of the last century with an average temperature of 21.5°C.

We can be consoled by the old saying from Weather Lore;



London Olympics 1908 and 1948 by Janie Hampton

THIS author wrote the excellent *How the Girl Guides Won the War*, and when I heard about her latest book I asked for a copy to review. At 48 pages, it's more of a pamphlet than a book, but it is packed with information, history, pictures and anecdotes.

Although the book doesn't compare 1908 and 1948 with the forthcoming events in London 2012, it's inevitable that any reader will.

Both the 1908 and 1948 events were conceived, planned and delivered in two years. 1908 was moved from Italy after Vesuvius had erupted in 1906, and 1948 after the IOC decided that Britain was the only country that could possibly organise it after the traumatic events of 1939-45.

Venues for the 1908 event were built or refurbished in ten months at a cost in today's money of £5 million. Tickets for the opening ceremony cost a guinea (£1.05p). Lord Coe please note!

The difference between 1908's amateur age and current times is emphasised by the three swimming gold medals won by a miner's son who learned and practised his swimming in the local canal. And how fabrics have changed – the ladies' diving team wore woollen costumes! Some events are also no longer contested – standing long jump, standing high jump and motor boat racing.

In an echo of current times, the 1948 event when announced was not popular with the public, press or government in a bankrupt nation suffering serious unemployment, rationing, and lack of housing. In those austere times, competitors were asked to bring their own towels and soap, but their bed linen was provided. The author lists the countries which sent food for the athletes to share, and what they sent (France sent several railway waggons of food and one of wine). In the absence of telephones, schoolboys who owned bicycles volunteered as messengers.

Seventy nations took part, with the Germans and Japanese excluded (although there's an interesting tale of German PoW Helmut Bantz and the British Gymnastic Team). The description of the opening ceremony is very moving, and captures the sense of relief felt by everyone after recent history.

Advertising was becoming more sophisticated, and I particularly liked the idea of the free pair of white Y-fronts given to each male competitor in the British Team. As soon as other teams saw them they went and bought their own! The difference from the current multimillion pound global corporate marketing extravaganza is very apparent.

Costs for the 1948 Games were estimated at £743,000 and were actually £732,268 (around twenty million pounds at today's prices). They made a profit of £29,000. Not much, but one can't help comparing that to the taxpayers' millions being wasted in building and dismantling temporary facilities for 2012.

The author includes a brief and interesting chapter on 'what happened next' to the various people and venues. As well as the people (Emil Zatopek, Fanny Blankers-Koen, Helmut Bantz), I was intrigued to learn that when I attended concerts at the Empire Pool Wembley in the 1970s and 80s, I was standing on a floor suspended over the 1948 Olympic Pool, only removed when Wembley Arena was created on the site.

1948 was the first year that games for disabled people were held, at Stoke Mandeville, mostly for wounded service personnel. In 1952 that event became International, and now we see the Paralympics running at the same venues as the Olympics. Not all change has been for the worse!

This is an interesting book, which I'd recommend to all – it doesn't take long to read, but will provide excellent conversation points on a range of topics.

And when we see the next Zola Budd, Mary Decker, Nancy Kerrigan/Tonya Harding or Dwain Chambers, and wonder whatever happened to the Olympic spirit, I shall remember Jim Halliday. Jim had been a PoW on the Burma-Siam Railway and weighed five stone when freed in 1945. He worked at Kearsley Power Station shovelling coal to get fit. In 1948 he captained the British Olympic Weightlifting Team and won a bronze medal. Despite the modern corruption of sporting ideals, it truly isn't the winning, but the taking part, that matters.



More than a Movie Matinee with

Far from the Madding Crowd (1967) (U)

at Milborne St. Andrew Village Hall on Wednesday 25th July the event starts at 2.00pm

'Far from the Madding Crowd' is based on Thomas Hardy's 19th century novel about Bathsheba Everdene, who is a wilful, passionate girl, never satisfied with anything less than a man's complete and helpless adoration. She unexpectedly inherits a large farm and becomes romantically involved with three widely divergent men: Gabriel Oak, a sheep farmer who is captivated by her beauty and proposes marriage; William Boldwood, a prosperous man in his early forties and a confirmed bachelor; and Sergeant Frank Troy, a handsome, reckless swordsman given to sudden fits of violence. Each of these characters is very well developed and even the performances of the minor characters are masterly. Julie Christie is beautiful and her Bathsheba is a precise mixture of headstrong independence and vulnerability; Terence Stamp's repulsive Troy is a triumph of casting and Alan Bates is wonderful as the simplest of her suitors while Peter Finch portrays a Boldwood who is so eligible, so tragic, so lost and helpless.

This version of Far From The Madding Crowd was filmed, mainly on location in Dorset, by John Schlesinger, where the spacious landscape is photographed in stunning beauty that is realistic rather than idyllic, beautiful but sometimes cold and foreboding and broods over the tragic proceedings. This is further enhanced by a remarkable soundtrack by Richard Rodney Bennett which lends the film a good deal of its emotiveness. There is something quintessentially English about this film not to be found anywhere else, for this reason alone it should not be missed.

at Milborne St. Andrew Village Hall on Thursday 26th July the event starts at 2.00 pm



In your Garden

Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of *Designer Gardens* **Your Garden in July**

I WAS looking back at some of my old articles, and rain in June (not Spain!) is actually quite a common occurrence. I think we desperately want the sun to shine ALL summer, but the fact is it never has, even when we remember those halcyon days of our childhoods.

After all that heavy rain, we need to remember to check our plants as they may need to be re-tied into position. We were away during the high winds and several roses had been quite badly damaged where they had been blow down from their supports.

The Allotment

I now have an allotment down near the river — the soil is deep and very fertile and after an initial rabbit problem and a hurried weekend of surrounding the entire plot with rabbit proof fencing, everything is growing away like mad. Although I have completely run out of space because I don't like throwing seedlings away but really! Can I eat all those veg?! Sadly some things don't freeze well so it is only worth growing what you know you can use — or that you can give away to friends. The potatoes have just about filled the entire allotment and so next year I shall be much more circumspect and allocate a smaller area for the spuds. Then I will be able to grow some more unusual vegetables that you can't readily buy in the shops.

The key thing to remember is that preparation of the soil is essential before you attempt to grow anything (ornamental plants or veg) and although I haven't actually reached chalk on the allotment, I will still add organic matter to keep the soil in as good a condition as I can. In my own garden the soil isn't very deep and I constantly have to improve it with the addition of organic matter ie home grown compost or well-rotted manure.

Looking Good

Often people will say that the garden starts to look a bit tired in July so here are a few perennials that will keep it looking colourful:



Agapanthus with their wonderful blue or white flowers will come back reliably year after year and flower from July to September; Penstemons of all varieties – just keep cutting out the flowered stems regularly; Phygelius; Salvia 'hot lips' stunning all summer; Geranium 'Rozanne' flowers till the frost but is completely hardy; Lavender and Cistus – there, that should give you a few ideas for colour in July.

Jobs to Do

There are a few jobs to keep you going in July:

- ⇒ keep your patio displays going by deadheading regularly to encourage more blooms and use a liquid feed towards the end of the month even if you added slow release fertilizer at planting time.
- ⇒ If your pond is full of blanket week, I found a marvelous treatment and it really does work. It is called Evolution Aqua Stop Blanketweed. You just add a little bit to your pond over 3 weeks and the blanket weed dies. I got it from Tincleton Koi.
- Cut back flowered stems of weigela and philadelphus, lightly trim hebe and lavender after flowering and you will probably get another flush of flowers.

In addition we visit dentists, opticians, chiropodists plus we carry out regular trips taking people shopping (or even do their shopping for them), to village lunch clubs, coffee mornings and other social activities helping to get the elderly and infirm out of the house for a few hours and reduce social isolation.

In short, we are very busy. But we believe it will get busier as local residents are still registering with us – and that's where you come in.

Can you spare any time to come and drive for Neighbourcar? We need more drivers to relieve the pressure from our existing team. You will find it personally rewarding and can develop new friendships along the way. The amount of time you commit is purely down to your personal availability – even if it is only the occasional trip it helps.

We reimburse you at a rate of 45 pence per mile to help cover the cost of running your car – this is currently the limit HMR&C will allow before classing it as "declarable income" for income tax purposes.
