Handbells have been around for many years and are the descendants of tower bells, used to summon churchgoers and developed so that ringers could practice indoors away from a cold church. A handbell choir rings music with melodies, as opposed to the change ringing of large church bells. There are various sizes, the smaller ones having the higher pitch tones and the larger bells the lower bass tones. The team's handbells had originally been donated by a GP in Puddletown 100 years ago and were discovered fairly recently by Jenny, the church organist. Money was raised to renovate them and the team meet once a week to practise. Starting with their signature tune, 'The Bells of St. Mary's' the ringers treated us to a repertoire of well-known songs and hymns.

Then it was our turn, and nine volunteers, under Jenny's instructions, gave us three more tunes - and produced a recognisable 'Jerusalem'. Well done, ladies - perhaps there is scope for a second team here? All in all, a very entertaining evening.

#### Gratitude

There are many ideals that the Bible sets out for Christians to follow. One of the most important and yet one that many find difficult is found in a passage in the First Letter to the Thessalonians: "rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thess. 5.16-18).

Giving thanks can be very hard when it seems as if our lives are falling apart or we are going through difficult times. How can we give thanks for something like cancer? Or relationship break-up? Or the death of someone we love? It sounds impossible.

Paul, who wrote these words, is someone who suffered - persecution, shipwreck, illness, imprisonment, isolation from friends - which helps me to take these words more seriously than if I knew they had been written by someone who had sailed through life.

Even in the darkest times, there is always something we can be grateful for, whether it is the family and friends who support us, the home in which we live, the care of doctors and nurses, the beauty of our countryside, or something

Sometimes there are days when it can be hard to find anything to be thankful for, but, if we think hard, I am sure even on those days, we can find something that gives us joy. Thankfulness lifts our hearts and helps us to focus on something bigger than ourselves and our problems.

I have much to thank God for, including the churches of our benefice. And I'd like to thank not just God, but all who contribute to their life and worship. So many people give of themselves, their time, their talents and their money to ensure we are able to have a Christian presence in our villages through our churches.

Once a year at our annual meeting, I have a formal opportunity to thank those in our congregations who do so much for church life, as churchwardens, PCC members, taking part in services, cleaning, flower-arranging, arranging social and fund-raising events, praying, and so on.

But there are fewer opportunities to thank those who are not church members, who also support us in many ways. In the past six weeks (as I write), all the four churches have had special events: cream teas, flower festivals, open gardens and so on. None of these could have taken place, if it weren't also for the help of those who do not worship with us on Sundays but join with us on these occasions, either as participants in their organisation or attending them, helping us eat our cream teas, visiting our gardens, coming to our concerts.

#### More work to do in the churchyard

Our Churchyard Working Party has made a good start removing ivy and elder from the yew trees. The churchyard is for everyone in the village so we would welcome help from anyone who can spend an hour or two on the first Saturday morning of each month from September.

In line with the new diocesan churchyard regulations we are starting to clear away material left on graves that has passed its 'use by' date. Dead flowers give a neglected impression of the whole churchyard as well as the individual graves, and while we may leave convincing-looking silk flowers for a time, they must be taken away when they start to fade. If you are thinking of adding a permanent feature to a grave you MUST seek advice from the vicar or churchwardens.

#### Ride and Stride event coming soon

On 10th September we will be taking part in this Dorset Historic Churches Trust event where participants are sponsored to cycle or walk to as many churches in Dorset as they can. Half the proceeds we collect go to DHCT and half is given to Milborne church. Last year we collected £447; perhaps we can get nearer to Dewlish's amazing (record breaking?) total of £2,111 this year! 

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
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#### A Good Read by Shirley Dunkley 'Party Animals' by David Aaronovitch



THE journalist David Aaranovitch is well known to Radio 4 listeners, readers of The Times and other journals and viewers of television current affairs programmes. Less well known is the fact of his childhood, spent in North London among members of the Communist Party for whom his parents were devoted workers. His early memories are of events with significance for the Party, particularly the triumphant visit of Yuri Gagarin, the first man in space. The young David even thought that the word

'cosmonaut' used to describe Yuri must be an abbreviation of Communist and astronaut! North London had one of the strongest local parties and Sam Aaronovitch, his father, was a full time organiser so the whole family was governed not only by the ethos of Marxism, but particularly Soviet and Stalinist history. The author dissects the shock effect of Stalin's death followed by the exposure of his cruel tyranny, and the difficulty his parents had in revising opinions they had always trusted. The Hungarian and Czech uprisings caused similar painful heart searchings. Gradually David comes to realise that the belief in ideological myth to which his family subscribed was also embedded in closer personal relationships. His father, he learns, has been a serial womaniser, but his mother, Lavender, when faced with evidence of this, preferred to stick to the myth of the good and faithful husband often called away by work. This juggling of truth and story and the sense of never being as valued by his parents as much as they valued their Party led to many years of therapy for him, but the book is still full of the painful love he feels for his misguided parents and the hilarity which Communist fund raising efforts aroused. A jumble sale provides the same possibility for catastrophe whether organised by Marxists or Boy Scouts, and many will recognise the similar experience. This is a compelling book about a time, post war, familiar to many but a creed known and shared by very few, yet it makes for a very diverting and informative historical read.

The fencing is not high enough to stop balls being kicked into the road, the stream and into residents' gardens. #### Spectre (PG-13)

AFTER the events of Skyfall, Bond has come out a troubled man. His mentor, M, is dead. MI6 is crumbling under a newer, high-tech organization led by the mysterious Max Denbigh. As "Spectre" opens, we find James Bond (Daniel Craig) in Mexico City, hunting down an assassin, Marco Sciarra (Alessandro Cremona), that the late M had unofficially ordered him to find. After a major scuffle, Bond returns to London where the current M (Ralph Fiennes) removes him from active duty. However, this doesn't stop Bond from continuing with his investigation. His search leads him to a group known as SPECTRE and their mysterious leader, Franz Oberhauser (Christoph Waltz), a man who has a connection to Bond's past. Meanwhile, M has to deal with a power struggle with another government official known as C (Andrew Scott), who not only manages to get the 00 program shut down, but is also trying to bring Britain into a global surveillance network, that just might be connected to the case Bond is currently working on.

Where Skyfall went for emotional depth and a harsh examination of Bond's bruised psyche, Spectre just goes all out on a classic and spectacular Bond adventure. It looks and feels different to its predecessor, in part because of the work of cinematographer Hoyte vanHoytema, but mainly because Mendes and Craig, wisely, take their Bond to new territory.

Ralph Fiennes (M), Ben Wishaw (Q) and Naomie Harris (Moneypenny) all return, and have plenty to do in this particular outing, and that's no bad thing. Lea Seydoux's performance as Madelinne Swann, is easily the most captivating Bond girl of the Craig era. The story not only comes with plenty of drama, but also works extremely well as a mystery that unfolds as the film goes on.

#### **Yorkshire Day**

"Tha can allus tell a Yorkshireman - but tha can't tell 'im much"

IN 1975 the 1st of August was designated "Yorkshire Day" by the Yorkshire Ridings Society as a protest against the government reorganisation of Yorkshire and Humberside in 1974. So this month's recipe hails from Sheffield which used to be in the West Riding but is now officially in South Yorkshire. The word "Riding" comes from the Norse word for "a third". The only Riding left is the East Riding of Yorkshire, renamed in 1996, although with slightly different boundaries. The recipe calls for Henderson's relish (produced in Sheffield), which can be bought at Waitrose or Morrisons, but you can substitute Worcestershire Sauce which is guite similar – just don't say that to anvone from Yorkshire.

Whenever I make this pie I think with affection of the late Deirdre Barlow in Coronation Street who uttered the memorable words "My husband will eat owt if it's covered in a layer of pastry".

#### **Meat and Potato Pie**

For the filling

1lb (500g) braising steak (or steak and kidney if you prefer) 1lb (500g) potatoes cut into large chunks

8oz (200g) onion

3 tablespoons(50ml) Henderson's Relish or Worcestershire sauce 2 tablespoons (30g) Bisto original powder (or gravy granules)

A little oil For the pastry 8oz (200g) plain flour Pinch of salt 2½oz (70g) lard 2½oz (70g) butter 3 tablespoons (50ml) cold water



Fry the chopped onion gently in a little oil for about 5 minutes then add the cubed beef or steak and kidney and fry for another 5 minutes. Add the Henderson's Relish and enough water to cover the meat. Cover and simmer until tender (about 2-3 hours depending on the cut and quality of the meat). Mix the Bisto with a little water and stir into the meat mixture until thickened. Drain off most of the gravy and reserve. You will need plenty of gravy to layer with the potatoes and some to pour over the finished pie and vegetables. Meanwhile, boil the potatoes in lightly salted water until very nearly tender but not falling apart. Drain and slice them thickly. Put a layer of potatoes (about a third of them) in the bottom of a greased pie dish, then top with half the meat, repeat the layers of potato and meat, ending with a layer of potato. Pour a generous amount of gravy over each layer of potato as you go, it will be absorbed by the potatoes as it stands.

Chill the pie thoroughly in the fridge before topping with pastry. Make the pastry by rubbing the fat into the flour, add the water and knead gently into a ball. Cover with cling film and chill in the fridge for 30 minutes before rolling out and covering the pie. Decorate with pastry trimmings then finish with a glaze of beaten egg or milk.

Bake at gas mark 6 for about 45 minutes until the pastry is golden brown and the filling bubbling hot. Serve with vegetables and the reserved gravy.

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#### **Turning back the** clock

CAR 'clocking', the practice of rewinding a car's mileage reading is estimated to have increased last year. For unscrupulous traders it is an easy way to make money as a car's value can increase up to £10,000 by reducing the mileage of a vehicle by using a digital device that plugs into the car's electronics. If you buy a car with an altered mileage then the timing for necessary services and safety checks will also be incorrect.

Trading Standards up and down the country investigate complaints of cars having been 'clocked'. A Warwickshire car dealer was recently jailed for twelve months after admitting to 'clocking' cars and his mechanic for six months for forging documents such as MOT certificates. These days cars that have been 'clocked' are less likely to be found on the forecourt and more likely to be found on auction websites, social media and small ads. such as Ebay, Facebook and Gumtree.

When buying a second hand car there are things that you can look out for:

- Chips on the paintwork may indicate lots of motorway driving;
- Worn rubber pedals and steering wheels indicate lots of use.

The average car travels 10,000 miles a year so if the car looks like it has more wear and tear than expected it may have been 'clocked'. Checking a vehicle's paperwork such as the service record and MOT history can help determine genuine mileage. Check MOTs on line at https://www.gov.uk/ check-mot-history. Information held by the DVLA about a vehicle's identity can be found at https://www.gov.uk/get-vehicleinformation-from-dvla.



#### Norman's social conscience hits its stride

NOT FOR nothing has Norman Beggs entitled the third part of his autobiography New Beginnings. Like millions before him he completed his National Service (having served in North Africa and the Canal Zone of Egypt) with no prospects and no job, full of apprehension and worries about the future but seeking a well-ordered and regulated life. As he writes, he couldn't very well tell the Labour Exchange interviewer, "Well, I can use a rifle and Sten gun with accuracy. Is there anyone you want shot?"

Initially he opted to train as an aircraft detail fitter, working closely and precisely from blueprints, and learning a new camaraderie. Norman recounts many in-work experiences including helping to rescue two women from a crash between their car and a small locomotive and the day a sub-Kray twin character called Arthur took his revenge on a nit-picking supervisor by shooting a gun (in fact, a starting pistol) at him at close range.



Aching to get back to grass roots, and armed with a new qualification, he returned to the Isle of Portland and took a job at Whitehead's Torpedo Works and soon learned how unionism and management often clashed. It was the birth of his deep-seated convictions about socialism and social conscience.

Deciding that life had more to offer than being on permanent nights at Whitehead's, he moved on to HMUDE (Her Majesty's Underwater Development Establishment, later to become the Underwater Weapons Establishment) where he had the great good fortune to meet up with his mentor and lifetime friend Tom Stokes. It was at UDE that the so-called Portland Spies, Ethel Gee and Harry Houghton, infamously did their work, traitorously passing on their intelligence to Russia via Gordon Lonsdale.

Through Tom and Laura Stokes, Norman engaged himself in the Portland Labour Party, and he also took roles as a shop steward with the General and Municipal Workers' Union, a member of the Weymouth and Portland Trades Council and chairman of the Labour Party League of Youth and recalls amusingly attendances at Labour Party Annual Conferences. He himself had the microphone switched off by an irate chairman when he overran his speaking time!

#### **Meeting Jennifer**

Norman's leisure time was filled with many happy hours dancing and playing euphonium (virtually self-taught) with Portland Band, of which he became secretary. His involvement with the International Friendship League brought his first contact with a demure-looking young woman called Jennifer Ann Tucker. It didn't go well . . .

"Would you like to buy a ticket for the dance on Saturday?"

"No thank you."

"Oh, go on," Norman insisted. "I'll be there."

Lead balloon time!

In fact, Jennifer did turn up at the dance, and Norman processed another jocular faux pas.


"Look, I don't know what I've done to upset you but, whatever it is, I'm sorry. I'm not really a bad sort of chap, just ask my wife." Fortunately the silly joke broke the ice, and Jennifer smiled at him for the first time. Before that Jennifer had told friends that Norman was "arrogant, selfopinionated, pushy, oh, and big-headed".

They became engaged inadvertently. Norman and Jennifer attended a reception in Portland in honour of the officers and senior ratings of the American nuclear submarine USS Nautilus where Jennifer was introduced, wrongly, as Norman's fiancé. Jennifer denied "the charge" at which Norman received a hard prod in the back and the question, "When are you going to ask this charming girl to marry you?" Norman took the hint, and, with much clapping and whooping from the assembled company, dropped on one knee and proposed. They married on January 2nd 1960.

Norman served 14 years on Portland Urban District Council and, with Jennifer always at his side, did duty as UDC Chairman. He served for six years as a Justice of the Peace and his charity work brought him into contact with the underprivileged, social misfits and the deprived. Then Beggs' social conscience was stirred deeply, and this signposted another new beginning: in 1970 he was appointed Inspector with the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. The next 23 years of service with the NSPCC, during which time he took holy orders, will form the fourth part of Norman's fascinating autobiography, and will doubtless be related, as here, in inimitable and heart-warming style.

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#### Ladybirds survey: playgroup is at heart of the village

IN a recent survey carried out by Milborne Ladybirds, 90% of locals thought the playgroup was an important asset to the village with a similar number believing that Ladybirds is integrated into the community. The survey, conducted in June and July, canvassed the views of its current parents and carers, past users and the wider community and also asked questions about the employment it offers and how well it communicates.

It was clear from the responses that the vast majority of people believe that Ladybirds is an important asset, with over 80% in strong agreement. Those surveyed also felt that as an employer, Ladybirds offers good job opportunities - this borne out by three of the current staff living in the village. Our present users felt that we were great at communicating with them but we're not as good as we could be with the wider community. This will be a focus for the committee and we will look to improve this, for example through social media. We hope this report goes some way to improve that too.

In the survey, Ladybirds' current parents and carers unanimously agreed that their children enjoyed coming to the playgroup and that their children felt safe. Everyone was satisfied with the educational progress of the children, reporting it to be good as expected, and that children were 'school ready' when they left Ladybirds.

We are aware, and the survey has shown to be a need, that parents would value flexibility in being able to choose a combination of morning, afternoon and full day sessions. At present, we're limited to extending only into the Monday and Tuesday afternoons. It is encouraging to know there is the demand for this as we plan to have our own, purpose-built premises in the future and would then be able to offer a more comprehensive service.

It was also clear that many of you would be interested in information and workshop sessions to help and support you as a parent, and also the opportunity to experience new pursuits with your child - such as craft and music activities; fun events during the school holidays and trips to local attractions and so on. This is very useful feedback and we are keen to develop this further.


Many of you (71%) said that a community-run nursery/preschool such as Ladybirds was your preferred type of childcare setting; alongside more 'alternative' approaches such as forest school and Montessori/Steiner. Play-based learning is exactly what Ladybirds can offer and we will work to ensure that this continues and is developed; we're particularly inspired by the ideas around increased outdoor education and forest schools and the huge benefits this can bring for children.



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#### In your Garden

#### Seasonal notes and tips from Maureen Lock of designerGardens

#### Late summer colours

I always wish the days were the longest in August and not June as it is often too cold to sit outside in the evenings earlier in the year. But in August the warmth of the day seems to collect in the stone walls and paving and we get the lovely fragrance of late flowering perennials in the air as well as the yummy smell of the barbeque.

By this time of the year the big, tall perennials are starting to make an appearance. Rudbeckia 'Herbstonne' has yellow daisy like flowers on tall stems and starts to grow rapidly in early August.

Sanguisorba 'Red Thunder' grows about two metres tall and likes to grow through other plants - the flower is dark red and tightly packed with flower stems branching



in every direction. It will flower until the end of September. It looks good when grown with Panicum virgatum 'Squaw' (a colourful grass) as



the leaves turn the same deep red colour as the Sanguisorba flowers.

If you like hollyhocks but can't stand the rust that develops on the leaves, there is an alternative you can try. It is called: x Alcathaea suffrutescens 'Parkallee'. It takes on a shrubby appearance and has creamy apricot flowers

which continue through to autumn. Well worth a search if you like the sound of it.

Purple Verbena bonariensis planted in drifts through the border will

give late summer colour and attract butterflies and hoverflies. It waves around in the breeze and looks quite spectacular when planted with red Dahlias.

You also have the many varieties of Sedum which are at their best in



late summer as well as heleniums (similar to Rudbeckia but more orangey), echinacaea and asters.

If you wish to see colour pictures of some of the plants mentioned here you will need to visit the Reporter website (www.milbornestandrew.org.uk/ Reporter) to see them in all their glory, or you can look them up in Google Images for a better idea of their colours and habit.

Even if you are not ready to plant anything in the garden at the moment, a trip to a garden centre will give you lots of ideas of what is 'looking good' at the moment. Make a note and try some next year.

If your garden is a little on the small side, make sure that you choose plants carefully and put in some foliage plants to give you something to look at in the winter. Deciduous shrubs can be underplanted with bulbs which will have died down by the time the leaves appear. If you can hide your boundaries with planting, it will make your garden appear



larger. Another trick is to keep your fences below the usual six feet so that you can 'borrow' views from your neighbours' gardens – if they are nice gardens that is!!

#### A few jobs to do this month

Keep deadheading to encourage more flowers. Knautia macedonia and penstemons will just keep on flowering.

You can take softwood cuttings from fuchsias and penstemon - especially if a friend has one that you like.

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#### This Month In History: August

#### Births

August 3rd, 1963: James Hetfield was born in Downsey, California. The singer and songwriter is known for being the co-founder, lead vocalist, rhythm guitarist and main songwriter for the American heavy metal band Metallica. Metallica have been recognised as one of the greatest metal bands of all time; credited with the revival of metal in the 80's.

August 13th, 1888: John Baird, Scottish electrical engineer and pioneer of the television, was born in Helensburgh. In 1929 his mechanically scanned 30-line apparatus was used by the BBC for its first television programmes. Inventor of the first publicly demonstrated colour television system, he successfully broadcast across the Atlantic in 1928.

August 15th, 1888: T.E. Lawrence, a Welsh soldier and writer better known as Lawrence of Arabia, was born in Tremadog, Wales. He is most famous for his handling of the Arab Revolt against the Ottoman Empire and was dubbed 'Lawrence of Arabia' in 1962. He recorded his exploits against the Turks in The Seven Pillars of Wisdom.

August 25th, 1724: George Stubbs, a self-taught animal painter reckoned by many to be the greatest of all horse painters, was born in Liverpool. The son of a leather merchant, his career was secured as a painter after his sketches were examined by aristocrats who soon commissioned him. The record price for a Stubbs painting was set by the auction of Gimcrack on Newmarket Heath, with a Trainer, a Stable-Lad, and a Jockey at Christie's in London in July 2011. It sold for £22.4 million; not bad for a self-taught artist!

#### Deaths

August 2nd, 1922: Alexander Graham Bell, a scientist, inventor, engineer and innovator who is credited with patenting the first practical telephone, died of complications with his diabetes at his private estate in Beinn Bhreagh, Canada aged 75. Ironically, Bell considered his most famous invention an intrusion on his real work as a scientist and refused to have a telephone in his study.

August 23rd, 1305: William Wallace, was a Scottish knight who became one of the main leaders during the Wars of Scottish Independence. Wallace defeated an English army at the Battle of Stirling Bridge in September 1297 and served as Guardian of Scotland until his defeat at the Battle of Falkirk in July 1298. In August 1305, Wallace was captured in Robroyston, handed over to Edward I, and hanged, drawn, and quartered for high treason and crimes against English civilians.

August 31st, 1997: Diana Spencer, better known as Diana Princess of Wales, was fatally injured in a car crash in the Pont de l'Alma road tunnel in Paris, which also caused the deaths of Dodi Fayed and the driver, Henri Paul, security manager of the Hôtel Ritz. The initial French judicial investigation concluded the accident was caused by Paul's drunken loss of control. In February 1998, Mohamed Al-Fayed, owner of the Ritz, claimed the crash had been planned, accusing MI6 and the Duke of Edinburgh. The day following the final verdict of another inquest spanning 2004-08, Al-Fayed announced he would end his 10-year campaign to establish that it was murder rather than an accident, stating that he did so for the sake of the Princess' children.

corner of East 105th Street and Euclid Avenue in Cleveland, Ohio. It was developed in 1912 by Lester Wire, a policeman in Salt Lake City, Utah. His idea was an electric powered copy of a French traffic light, which was installed in Paris in 1912. August 12th, 1981: IBM introduces it's first personal computer (PC & PC-DOS Version 1.0). The generic term "personal computer" was in use before 1981, applied as early as 1972 to the Xerox PARC's Alto, but because of the success of the IBM Personal Computer, the term "PC" came to mean more specifically a desktop microcomputer

August 5th, 1914: The first ever electric traffic light was installed in the USA on the

compatible with IBM's PC products. Within a short time it was responsible for standardizing a platform for personal computers and "IBM compatible" became an important criterion for sales growth; only the Apple Macintosh family kept significant market share without compatibility with the IBM personal computer. This first model was discontinued April 2nd 1987.

August 30th, 1139: European leaders outlaw crossbows, intending to end war for all time. Canon 29 of the Second Lateran Council under Pope Innocent II in 1139 banned the use of crossbows, as well as slings and bows, against Christians. The authenticity, interpretation and translation of this source however is contested. Of course this canon did not have much impact, as crossbows were used in warfare up to around the 1500s. Today, the crossbow often has a complicated legal status due to the possibility of lethal use and its similarities to both firearms and archery weapons. While some jurisdictions regard crossbows the same as firearms, many others do not require any sort of licence to own a crossbow. Mark Ferguson



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

#### The future of mobile libraries has been decided

DORSET County Council's Cabinet has voted to maintain one home mobile library service van and withdraw three mobile library service vans.

This decision follows a consultation with library users and local town and parish councils to look at alternative ways to access the library service.

People who are unable to access a library due to a disability or frailty will continue to have access to books, and other reading material delivered to their homes through a partnership with the Royal Voluntary Service (RVS).

The council are also encouraging community transport to help people have access to libraries. We will continue to take the home mobile library service van to residential homes.

Cllr Deborah Croney, Dorset County Council cabinet member for learning and skills, said: "These changes will help us focus provision of the mobile library service on people of all ages who cannot get to a library building.

"The consultation has given us a clear understanding of the issues and we will use this information with the local knowledge gained from the mobile library officers to work with local communities."

The consultation identified that social isolation is a concern for some people and the council's Partnership for Older People Programme (POPP) community development team has started working with communities to address the social aspect that the mobile library currently serves.

Dorset's library service has joined the LibrariesWest consortium which means customers will be able to access libraries, 'coast to coast' from the Bristol Channel to the south coast. In some parts of Dorset the nearest library is in Somerset, and being part of the consortium means they can still access library services.
