



RDA needs more volunteers and you could be one of them

ARE you comfortable being around horses? Would you like to help and support children with disabilities?

If your answers are "Yes" and "Yes" you are just the sort of person Milton Abbas Riding for the Disabled (MARDA) is looking for so please read on.

We operate two groups – one on Friday morning between 10.00am and 12 noon and another on Tuesday between 5.00 and 6.00pm. Each group session is held at Luccombe Riding Centre.

The Friday group works with children with learning difficulties from Beaucroft School, Wimborne, whereas on Tuesdays we have a smaller group of private, individual children with similar conditions.



Each child usually needs three volunteers - one who leads the horse and two side-walkers who are looking after the child.

You will, no doubt, be aware that multiple Paralympic Gold Medallist, Sophie Christiansen, began by riding at her local RDA group when she was six years old. Clearly, not all our children are going to be Olympic Champions, but they will benefit so much from the time they spend with our horses.

The joy of seeing a child who may initially not even wish to be anywhere near a horse and is gradually encouraged (as much by the horse as the volunteers) into mounting and riding the horse is very satisfying.

We have only recently re-started MARDA after a lengthy layoff as a consequence of Covid and, inevitably, some volunteers have not returned to us, so we need new people to come and join us. This way we can ensure continued support for the children who are trusted into our care, and in time give more children this great opportunity to take part in riding therapy.

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

We're here for you

I've been thinking recently about funerals, having had rather too many to conduct in the past couple of months.

Funerals come in all sorts of shapes and sizes. The church has been conducting them for hundreds of years, and this country has moved from a time when we had a near monopoly on the burial of the dead to today when there is much greater choice: about what sort of funeral you have, where you can hold it, who leads it and so on.

In times gone by what the church offered was very inflexible, but I wonder whether you know that is not the case these days. Very little is set in stone: there will be a Bible reading and some prayers, but everything else can be tailored to your particular needs.

You don't have to be a regular churchgoer to have a funeral in the parish church where you live, or to be buried in the graveyard of your community. And funerals don't just have to be in church; many of the ones I lead are at one of our local crematoria.

The main alternative to having a local Vicar conduct your funeral is to use a celebrant. A funeral celebrant's work is confined to the funeral service itself. They will probably meet with the family once to plan the service itself but once the funeral has taken place, their input ends.

What the church can offer is someone who already has links to your community. We can talk with you about your funeral wishes long before you die and provide ongoing care for those left behind, if they want it. We build relationships with people that go much wider than the funeral itself. Children find it easier at funerals, when they are being led by someone they know through school; a friendly face at the front can make all the difference.

We also have much experience in talking with people about death and dying, a subject that can be really difficult to face for some people. Families often find it hard to have deep conversations with someone before they die because it seems too painful to contemplate the time when they will no longer be here. Often the dying person is more reconciled to their own death than those around them. I'll never forget being round a bedside in a hospice more than 20 years ago with a lady who was ready to go and wanted to talk about that, while her family standing there forbade her from doing so, as if somehow a conversation would make the inevitable come all the sooner. It made a deep impression on me. Though their stance was understandable, it made things worse rather than better for all in that room.

The Vicar and the church congregations in our benefice are here to serve not just churchgoers but the whole community. All you need to do is ask. My contact details are below in this magazine - do get in touch, if you'd like a conversation about what I've said here or anything else.

A Good Read "The Buddha in the Attic" by Julie Otsuka



BACK in September 2019 before Covid hit, before the words furlough and lockdown and booster became common parlance, the MSA book Club read this tragic, yet compelling tale of the fate of Japanese women taken to a foreign land to be wives/slaves/"stoop labour". They were what could be described variously as "picture brides"

or "mail order brides". Boatloads went to America, mainly California, in the early 1900's to marry men they had never met, most of whom didn't match the descriptions they sent. Some became migrant labourers, others domestic servants living in their employers' homes. Each chapter describes aspects and the history of their lives which changed even more dramatically after the Pearl Harbour attacks. It is, unusually, written in the first person plural, none of the stories are individualized but each one is vividly described in a sentence or two. This was the author's second novel written in 2011. She writes in a dark, personal style, a stream of consciousness, a tribal plurality, a chorus of a thousand unified voices with harmonious and dissonant themes. We read of generic characters, eloquently capturing the essence of their experiences. It is a difficult to characterize style. There are no denunciations but an intimacy based not on pity but on understanding. An incantation which is challenging and satisfying. For me it had a lingering effect with cinematic images plumbing the depths of experiences that were physical, emotional, psychological, with heart wrenching misery, pity and shame. Was America built on such grinding misery? The taking of lives whole; diet, beliefs, manners, dress, clash of cultures; all there. The sexual episodes were the most distressing. However it is poetic prose, poems of distress, lyrical in its intensity. It is an Epic Poem with its contents concentrated like stock cubes. These are searing, humiliating survival stories. It is representative, lots of small stories, a sweep of images and emotions with no closure, dark and personal. They "stopped dreaming, stopped wanting". It is intimate yet expansive. There are themes of loyalty, of belonging (ties to mother country) but women were "bill(s) of goods". There is direct, powerful language without metaphor, intertwined voices, understated, sparse, touching, rich and visual. It feels like a muffled scream. There is a shocking change of perspective at the end. Suddenly they were voicing their perspective as a group. Even more of a shock was the perspective of their neighbours/employers/friends/ schoolmates . . . the "whites". The repetitious style only jarred at this point. It was a sad fading out of a tumultuous time. The Buddha is a symbol mentioned when internment overcame them. One left an alarm clock ringing in her luggage,"Haruko left a tiny laughing brass Buddha up high in a corner of the attic where he is still laughing to this day".

The New York Times believes that the story and its style imitates the Japanese art of sumi-e. Characterised by strokes of ink brushed across sheets of rice paper, the play of light and dark capturing, not just images, but sensations. Not just surfaces but the essence of what lies within. Simplicity of line is prized in this form, all extraneous detail discouraged. It is what is described as an "incantatory" style. So is the author's use of 'frozen moments'. It is a totally different way of telling a story and one which I believe you will find captivating especially with the turbulence of our current existence so much on our minds.

NOW is the time to register your intention to enter this fun competition, which is open to all in the village. The many and varied entries will be a celebration of the Jubilee and also make Milborne look really attractive. There will be a few rules, as follows:

- The display must be created principally with plants
- Plants need not be grown from seed, they can be bought in.
- The display must be created by the exhibitor, who must be individual, not a club or organisation. One entry per person.
- Entries should have a royal theme and be positioned to be easily visible from the front of the property. Judges will not enter gardens.
- Judges will welcome imaginative containers, including hanging baskets, or window boxes, that enhance the display, but they will prioritise planting when judging
- There will be three categories:
 - ♦ Small containers up to 30cm/12in across
 - ♦ Large containers over 30cm/12in across
 - ♦ Novelty containers.
 - ♦ There will be a prize in each category and one for 'the best in show'

Judging will take place during the week commencing 29th May. Judges will initially be Gardening Club members, but a professional horticulturist will do the final judging.

Springtime fun and learning at Ladybirds

THIS month has gone so quickly, and we will soon be starting the summer term. Preparation is underway to help the older children transfer to school in September. Life is still affected by Covid with many youngsters and their families catching it. We hope this year to do visits between school and preschool which have sadly been lacking over the last few years.

It's sad to say that many two year olds have only known Covid times and have not had the benefits of mother and toddler groups or extended social interaction. This has a knock on effect of needing adult support, being less independent and support needed for sharing. We are prioritising social interaction while playing and having fun as it is a fundamental life skill.

This month we have learnt about beetles; discovered they lay eggs in the ground and like to hide in the garden. We have planted peas and beans indoors and watched them grow. And thirdly we have been watching tadpoles develop (they now have legs - so hoping they will not be escaping frogs before we return after Easter). For Mother's Day the children made a card for Mummy - or Nanny - and planted two sunflower seeds in a pot to take home. Hopefully, these will grow, and we will see whose is the tallest.



The weather has been surprisingly mild and water play became very popular outside. The babies have been bathed many times and their clothes hung out to dry. Pegging is a difficult skill to learn - the little girl has achieved this and each day hung washing out and collected it in later. It was becoming a losing battle stopping the children digging holes in the grass so we





have provided a fenced area where they can do so. The structure is removable so can be taken away and returfed when needed. But in the meantime it's a very busy construction site.

We are very excited to announce that for the summer term, we will be spending Thursdays in the woods. Chloe of The Woodland School Dorset is kindly allowing us to use her Woods while her new venture gets up and running. Some of us were lucky to spend time and enjoyable day there on 12th April. Looking forward to exploring with the Ladybirds.

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

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Halbe 1945 - Eyewitness accounts from Hell's Cauldron by Eberhard Baumgart translated by Eva Burke



I CHOSE this book because I had never heard of the battle of Halbe. I now know more about it than I ever did, and am remembering the saying 'be careful what you wish for'. It's an excellent book, translated into English for the first time, and a story that must be told, as it has particular relevance to events in Ukraine and the fate of Ukrainian citizens at the moment. However, I do most of my reading at bedtime, and this is not a bedtime story. I believe it was worth several disturbed nights' sleep though, to be reminded of man's inhumanity to man, and how close we are to this all happening again.

The book tells the events of the German

Ninth Army's final struggle against Soviet Russia as the inevitability of the war's outcome became obvious, and the Germans were trying to retreat. Through the detailed experiences of soldiers and civilians, told in their own words, the enormous human cost of this battle and the impact on the town of Halbe, south east of Berlin, and its citizens who survived after 1945 become apparent.

For the first time I read the phrase 'raped to death', the horrifying fate of many women and girls during the battle and afterwards. There are mentions of the terrible things done to wounded and dying men, and to survivors both civilian and military. It's a story of incompetent German leadership, lack of communication to and from their central HQ, confusion on the battlefield, lack of maps, lack of direction, fear and terror for the soldiers, of whom at least 30,000 were killed, along with around 20,000 Soviets and 10,000 civilians. The stories of wading and squelching through piles of dead bodies are particularly harrowing and the author and translator must have had nightmares for months after compiling the book.

There are descriptions of the fate of citizens who survived the battle and loss of their homes, farms and families, but who had been Nazi Party members (remember if you wanted a job you had to be a party member in 1930s–40s Germany). These folk were on lists held by the Commissars who travelled with all Soviet Soldiers. They were found, separated, interviewed and terrified. Many were deported to Russia and few returned.

There is a chapter on graves and memorials – the civilian citizens, some as young as 11 or 12, were made to bury the dead in mass graves, and re-bury corpses from battlefield burials. German soldiers were buried without dogtags, paybooks or anything that could identify them, as the Russians wanted them to be forgotten forever.

There are photographs in the book, which is its most disappointing aspect. Captions like 'one of the forest roads leading to the autobahn' mean that there's nothing of relevance to the book in the picture. I realise that too much of its content couldn't be photographed, and photographs of the aftermath are not available, but this reader would prefer no picture to several generic pictures of wartime Berlin, or Soviet Artillery which may or may not have been involved in the events being described.

Eberhard Baumgart, the author, was a young man during the events his book describes, and his Epilogue is heartrending. He describes the battle as a nightmare filled with horror and murder which defined the rest of his life. I can believe that.

His final paragraph may explain some of the events we are seeing in Germany today 'May the gods be gracious, may they ensure that Russians and Germans never again stand opposite each other in a battle of such magnitude. By letting eyewitnesses get an opportunity to speak in these chapters, I hope I have achieved my aim.'

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

New Legislation Comes Into Effect To Restrict Access To Dangerous Weapons

Dorset Police is welcoming new legislation that makes it harder for people to buy dangerous weapons and become involved in knife crime.

Changes to legislation brought about by the Offensive Weapons Act 2019 mean that from Wednesday 6th April 2022 it will be harder for young people to buy weapons, both at the point of sale and delivery.

Retailers and couriers will now be legally obliged to do more to ensure that knives, corrosives and other offensive weapons are not sold or delivered to those under the age of 18. The new restrictions will also make it an offence to possess a corrosive substance in a public place.

The move comes after the first part of the act came into force in July 2021 banning the possession of certain dangerous items in private, including zombie knives, shuriken or death stars and knuckledusters.

Dorset Police and partner agencies will be working together to educate the public and the business community regarding these changes in legislation.

Unwanted knives can be disposed of at local recycling centres or safely packaged in your household waste.



Spymaster – The man who saved MI6 by Helen Fry

THIS book tells the story of Thomas Kendrick, a South African who helped to set up and operate the Secret Service from its



beginnings in South Africa (who knew?) until after the Second World War, when he retired to live quietly in the English countryside.

As many spies were, he worked as a British Passport Control Officer in Vienna, and in that role, facilitated the escape of thousands of Austrian Jews, whilst building up a comprehensive picture of German activity across Europe.

On recall to the UK, he set up the 'M Room' (Miked Room), as

listening service which gathered a huge amount of information from German PoWs. Houses were bugged intensively, and the conversations of prisoners from Private Soldiers to Generals were analysed, giving Britain early warning of developments from the V2 rocket to submarine and tank building programmes, and an understanding of morale in the German forces as the war progressed. He felt that the approach of listening in to relaxed people chatting between themselves would generate more information than the torture and shooting practices

carried out by the German Authorities. It worked.

This man of American/South African heritage served Britain through three major wars, and used his experience in the Second Boer War to set up protocols for spy networks that are still in use today. He recruited people from all walks of life to pick up snippets of information, including Prince Michael of Kent's mother Countess Marianne Szapary and officials/citizens across 1930s Europe, all reporting back to him in Vienna. He was arrested by the Gestapo and released, but was on a list for immediate arrest in the event of a successful German invasion of Britain.

This book is a fascinating insight into the man, how much information he gathered, how he kept it together and disseminated it to the right people. Churchill trusted him so much that he had a virtually unlimited budget for his miked houses and recruiting of German speakers (many of them refugees looking to help the fight against those who had persecuted them).

The author has had access to a huge number of records, and the glossary is extensive. Much information has yet to be released into the public domain, and I do hope I live to see the full extent of his achievements. Helen Fry has taken all this and made a very readable, pleasurable, informative book. She has written other books about intelligence, espionage, prisoners of war and the social history of the Second World War. I shall look out for more of her work. Susan Wilson



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
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Rosie and Katie explore the east Devon coast
